

Stockman native

Last month, Brian Arnold and I enjoyed meeting and interviewing several assist these females candidates for the field staff position. These meetings and interviews brought many people that are very passionate about the activities and programs provided by the National Swine Registry and the National Junior Swine Association. Each candidate brought different thoughts and new ideas. Their ideas gave us an opportunity to see how others view what we do.

One of the candidates mentioned during his interview that he was a 'digital native.' His term referring to the change in how most of our members do business with the different social media platforms struck a chord with me. I'll admit that while I can navigate the digital world, I'm far from a native. But I was fortunate to grow up in the purebred swine industry, so I'd call myself a 'stockman native.'

I have seen all the type changes in our industry over the years and some have repeated themselves more than once. Today, I hear rumblings in this country about the number of gilts that will not breed or cannot have pigs naturally and require a C-section. Folks, I'm not telling you what type of animals to raise, but I do want to provide a brief history lesson with the different trends I have seen over the years, and the issues we created by going to extremes with each type.

We raised heavy-muscled, smallerframed pigs in the '60s and sold them on a ham/loin index. (Remember, we marketed animals at 200 lbs during this time.) My father was glad he had sons

with smaller arms to delivering their litters. When we realized that we went to the extreme with this small, heavy-muscled

type, we made a concerted effort to breed taller-fronted, longer-bodied animals.

We were successful in breeding taller-fronted pigs in the '70s, but they were also flat ribbed and flat muscled. Once again, we went to the extreme edge of type and produced animals that did not have the ability to get up and down in the crates. Without having the correct curvature to their rib, these females came out of the farrowing rooms in poor condition, and many wouldn't rebreed. Again, we realized that we went to the extreme edge with this type, so we started using more moderate, heavy-conditioned boars.

We continued this trend in the '80s, until we pushed the type too far, yet again. Once more, we had females that were unable to farrow litters and raise their pigs productively. To top it off, the market demanded a leaner product.

Striving to meet this demand, producers imported animals from Europe that moved our genetic lines off center to reach the goal of leaner hogs with higher cutability. But we made animals too lean, too tight gutted, and they grew too slowly. These females did not have the ability to consume enough feed to stay productive and moved out of our herd too quickly.

Take time to evaluate your breeding program and how you select your next herd boar or foundation female. Instead of simply selecting the '-est,' try searching for the 'best.'

Today, I'm concerned that we have moved too far with this type of animal. When we hear the terms like, "widest coming at you," "heaviest structured," "deepest ribbed" and "softest made" to describe our females. I'm afraid that these terms relate to those sows that can't breed or have pigs on their own.

Maybe, it is the '-est' part that concerns me most. I realize that to make a change in your breeding program, you might need to reach out and incorporate some of the '-est' traits, but vour whole herd does not need to fit in the '-est' box. Take time to evaluate your breeding program and how you select your next herd boar or foundation female. Instead of simply selecting the '-est,' try searching for the 'best.'

As I mentioned, I may not be a digital native that can navigate through all the latest gadgets, but as a stockman native, I have seen enough industry trends and change to navigate through genetic improvement.

Hoge inducted into the National Barrow Show® Hall of Fame

Dan Hoge of Cambridge, Ill., was inducted into the NBS[®] Hall of Fame at the 67th National Barrow Show[®] held in Austin, Minn., on Sept. 10.

For more than 40 years, Hoge has served as an educator and livestock judging team coach at Black Hawk East Community College (BHE) in Kewanee, Ill. During this tenure, he has been an undying supporter of the National Barrow Show[®] Judging Contest and an icon of the annual Pilgrimage.

When he was a child, Hoge followed his father and legendary Duroc breeder, Elmer Hoge's, every step on their Walnut, Ill., farm. It was there that Hoge developed a drive to pursue his passion for the livestock industry. He judged for the University of Illinois, where he received his bachelor's and master's degrees.

After a short time in Extension work, Hoge found a home at nearby Black Hawk East Community College. In 1974, the BHE team won the first junior college division title at the NBS[®] contest, led by high individual Dave Steck. Over the next 39 years, teams coached by Hoge captured 30 team wins, with more than 20 high individuals.

From the time Hoge and fellow coach, Lee Denzer, cooked SPAM[®] with a team in the school's auditorium, to the beginning of each school year, when he hands each judging student a copy of the official "Welcome to the National Barrow Show[®]" postcard, Hoge's passion for the Barrow Show is contagious. Each fall, he coordinates multiple weekend workouts with fellow coaches, in the Midwest, to help prepare students for the NBS[®].

Today, former judging students from across the country still remember their trip to Austin, Minn., and many recall lessons learned from Hoge at a workout on the way to the contest. These same lessons have proved invaluable in the professional careers of countless students that were fortunate enough to study under Hoge.

Even more important to Hoge, than his own NBS[®] success, is seeing his son, Dr. Mark Hoge, share the same passion for the event and guide students to wins in the Truckload Show and University Judging Contest at Western Illinois University.



Hoge would agree that having a chance to coach talented young students hasn't been the only reason for success. His wife, Deanna Broer-Hoge, and the Broer family have supported the BHE program, from its inception, by hosting countless pre-Barrow Show practices as well as animal science labs at the farm. As a former educator, Deanna shares Hoge's love for developing young people.

Hoge is known for his quotes, but none are more famous than, "You're never done, your roles just change." At some point, Hoge will retire from coaching, but his role as a mentor and educator will forever live in those he's coached over the years. The National Association of Swine Records (NASR) and the National Barrow Show[®] are honored to present this Hall of Fame award to Dan Hoge of Cambridge, Ill.

Goodwin presented with National Barrow Show[®] Distinguished Service Award

The NBS[®], the National Association of Swine Records and the past and present NBS[®] exhibitors and participants recognized Goodwin and expressed their gratitude for his years of service and dedication to the event.

Rodney Goodwin received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Association of Swine Records (NASR) during the National Barrow Show[®] in Austin, Minn., on Sept. 10.

The National Barrow Show[®] Sire Progeny Tests were developed as a 'Genetics of Meat Quality' industry research project, in 1990. Design of the project was led by Dr. Lauren Christian of Iowa State University, Bob Wells of Hormel Foods and the breed secretaries of NASR. Meat quality testing was supported by a \$220,000 Pork Checkoff research grant from the National Pork Producers Council (NPPC). Goodwin was the NPPC director of research and a PhD student at Iowa State University, so he was assigned the duties of data management and analysis.

The 'Genetics of Meat Quality' research project ended, after three years, and the participants agreed to continue the progeny tests with support from Hormel Foods, NASR and NPPC. The structure of the Progeny Tests makes them useful for providing additional research information. Research grants from NPPC supported several enhancements to the Progeny Tests. In 1992, all pigs were entered at 14-24 days of age to examine results of commingled pigs in a segregated early-weaning (SEW) program. All pigs tested from 1996 to 2007 were evaluated for Rendement Napole genotype as well as HAL (stress) genotype. Some carcasses from the 1996-1999 Tests were used in total carcass separation projects

to develop lean prediction equations. Purebred sire EPDs for meat quality traits were published by NPPC, in 1996. Goodwin managed the data for these projects, as well as calculating sire indexes for each NBS[®], from 1991-2008. More than 30 scientific and industry publications have been based on the NBS[®] Sire Progeny Test results and the associated projects.

Goodwin received a bachelor's degree with distinction in farm operation from Iowa State University. In 1989, Goodwin received a master's degree in animal breeding from Iowa State University. He received the J. Morrissey Memorial Award for Outstanding Swine Breeding Student, in both '86 and '87. Goodwin received a Doctor of Philosophy in animal breeding with a minor in genetics from Iowa State University, in 1994. His major professors were Dr. Lauren Christian and Dr. Jeffrey Berger. Goodwin also received the Charles Stanislaw Distinguished Service Award, in 2000, from the National Swine Improvement Federation.

Goodwin is owner of Kurobuta Berkshires LLC, a 300 sow Berkshire herd. They also market 100 percent Pure Berkshire Pork certified by the American Berkshire Association domestically and internationally.

Congratulations to Goodwin for receiving the Distinguished Service Award.



On a small piece of Nash & Nash Lean Pork letterhead, "from the desk of Dick," came this note neatly written with only one small scribble in the last sentence.

Common sense is the knack of seeing things the way they are, and doing things as they ought to be done. – Joel Billings, 1818-1885

If all else fails, try this. Sincerely, Dick Nash ational Swine Registry CEO Mike Paul stashed that little reminder away and still has it nearly a decade after it was mailed from Nash's Sharpsville, Ind., home. For those that know Nash, the note rings true to his nature. He has an innate way of seeing things the way that they are, doing things the way he believes is right and telling you just what he feels about an issue.

No, Nash isn't a man of flowery words. In fact, he's a man of few. But throughout his five decades in the purebred swine business he created a legacy in the belted breed that still remains today, more than five years after he sold his last sow.

Nash had commercial swine roots. His father, William G. Nash, raised commercial pigs on their farm for as long as Nash can remember. But when he started showing pigs in 4-H, in the early-'50s, he knew exactly what kind of swine project he wanted – Hampshire. He doesn't quite recall what led him to the belted breed, but if Nash had to guess he'd tell you it was because they were so much prettier than the others. Something he believes still holds true today.

Operating as William G. Nash and Sons Hampshires, the Nash family soon made a reputation as the go-to place for Hampshire seedstock, and Nash made a name for himself in the show ring.

In 1954 and 1956, Nash exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow at the International Livestock Exhibition in Chicago. Those were some of his proudest moments as a youth exhibitor.

"I even got to go downtown with the girl who had the Champion Steer, and we were on TV," Nash recalls. "And I got to miss a week of school, so that was real nice."

But, it wasn't the ribbons that meant the most to Nash; it was the people he met along the way. This was an inherited trait from William G.

Nash recalls, his father taught him it was best to conduct both business and life with an honest, no-nonsense approach, and Nash believes that is part of what made their seedstock business so successful.

"My dad always treated every-

one like he'd treat his own mother," Nash says. "I guess his feelings on that always stuck with me, and long term, there wasn't any question that it paid off in big dividends."

But others will tell you it was the Nash family's ability to breed good hogs that made them a force in the purebred industry for decades. And who could argue? Before AI became commonplace and a piece of the best boar in the country could be shipped to your door overnight for just a couple hundred dollars, purebred breeders had to put together their own herdsire battery. They scoured the country for the best boars their money could buy, and for many that boar was raised by Nash.

The William G. Nash and Sons crew showed some of the best in the nation during that time. In 1962, all of the Junior Champion Hampshire Boars and Gilts at the Illinois, Indiana and Ohio State Fairs, with the exception of one winner, were raised by Nash and sired by their herdsire Tabulator, which they purchased from Ruben Edwards. Since the family farrowed every month to meet the high demand for their stock and ran anywhere from 70 to 250 sows, they had enough prospects that they could show a separate string of animals at each state fair, before offering them at their annual fall sale.

Not only were Nash's hogs proven winners in the ring, but they also proved they could perform in test stations in the '70s and '80s. This lethal mix of performance and phenotype caused breeders to travel from across the country to buy Hampshires in Sharpsville.

Retired Michigan State University animal science educator, swine farm manager and judging coach Al Snedegar recalls a time when Nash genetics were in such demand that the sales would last well into the night.

"There were years, when their boar sales were so good that they had to start bringing them out of lots to sell, still covered in mud and not even numbered up," he says.

During the heyday of purebred, offthe-farm boar sales in the early '70s, the Nash family was able to sell more than 100 boars at two of their farm sales. And they would always sell 100-150 head of commercial gilts, bringing the females in the ring in groups of 10 with the option to have choice or take all - most took all.

Although commercial boar and gilt sales were their bread and butter for years breeding stock from the family, his first and years, the Nash family always had a soft spot for 4-H kids. In fact, they had one of the first club pig sales in the country and decided to sell gilts first.

"The value of the 4-H project was to get a female and raise her, then keep her and raise your own pigs," Nash says. "That was just one of our philosophies."

Darrell Drake, owner of Drake Purebreds and longtime friend of the Nash family, was one of the 4-H members who purchased seedstock from Nash. He purchased a boar to breed his project gilts to, when he was just 10-years-old. Since that purchase Drake has considered Nash a mentor.

"I've got as much respect for him as anyone I've met," Drake says. "He's always been honest and up front with me, and he has always treated me well and given me advice. I've talked to him constantly, since I was 14-years-old, and I still talk to him on a regular basis today. He's always been a mentor."

Drake is just one of many established purebred breeders that refer to Nash as a mentor, a changer and

someone that they've looked up to.

Although Snedegar is just a couple years Nash's minor, he has always considered Nash a mentor, as well. In fact, to this day, Snedegar will not judge a major show without calling Nash to prepare, and he calls knowing that Nash will tell him exactly what he thinks.

"Those who know Dick pretty well will tell you that you never have to guess what he is thinking," Snedegar says. "He isn't real into political correctness and never has been, but he can analyze pigs and analyze them real fast. I've always had him talk to my judging teams - not just about animals, but life in general."

Snedegar always appreciated Nash's frank talk and honest opinions, but as an educator he appreciated the way Nash guided young people even more.

Mike Watson, of George and Mike Watson Hampshires, was one of those young people Nash took under his wing. In fact, he credits Nash for getting him where he is today.

Although he'd known Nash since he was a 4-H member, often buying true Nash experience was when Nash called him out of the blue and asked him to ride along to Austin, Minn., to the National Barrow Show[®].

The then 21-year-old Watson pumped questions at him the entire trip, and since that time he's traveled with Nash quite often.

"For an established man in the business to take time and spend it with me at that age was great," Watson says. "He took the time - and he didn't have to - to pass along information."

Nash has never minded visiting with young people though.

"I don't know if I've mentored them, but I've given them lots of free opinions," laughs Nash. "I just try to give them some things and tell them about some of the mistakes I've made along the way."

Out of all the banners, plaques and photos that remain of Nash's years in the show and sale ring, perhaps one of his greatest honors was presented to him on July 21, 2009 by the 4-H youth of his native Tipton County, Ind.

There's no mistaking the hint of pride

in his voice as he reads the inscription.

"Your vision and leadership for making better hogs is only overshadowed by your passion for making better people," it reads.

Today, there are no Hampshire sows on the Nash family farm. There haven't been for six years this fall. After the tremendous days of selling seedstock throughout the country, the Nash dynasty hit its first major hardship when it was struck with pseudorabies in the early '80s. After clawing back from the disease, they watched the demand for herd boars slowly dwindle with the use of AI and commercial genetic companies. And, slowly, they reduced their numbers.

When the last sow left the farm, Nash not only sold her, but all of the feeders and waters as well, before he pushed down the hog buildings. He says that way he isn't tempted to get back into the business.

Today, he's busy chasing his wife, Nan, and grandkids around. He's even bought a couple Boer goat does to raise some projects for the grandchildren. Nash has always been a fan of the horse track and partners with some other pig breeders to buy yearling pacers, each fall. With everything on his plate, he says he has no regrets - not about the time he spent in the industry, the hours he spent helping others learn about it or the fact that he decided to get out.

"Everyone asks me if I miss the hogs, and I tell them no because I've done about everything you can do with them," Nash says. "We went to every show you could possibly go to. We've won anything you could possibly win, and I met the greatest group of people that God ever blessed with breath. That is what makes it all worthwhile."

Nearly one-third of a pork carcass is considered waste, but it doesn't just get thrown away. Instead, it is converted into pork by-products that can show up in the most unexpected places in our homes. But, what is most significant about these by-products is the contribution they make to a swine producer's bottom line.

By-products are all the parts of the pig that are not included in the dressed carcass. They include the skin, blood, fat and other edible and inedible parts. Pork by-products make up about 30 percent of the liveweight of hogs and contribute more than six percent to the market value of hogs, according to a 2011 report by the USDA. During the last ten years, the demand for pork by-products has caused the overall value of live hogs to increase, which means a higher price for producers.

U.S. pork by-products are even demanded by other countries, adding more value to market hogs. On average, edible by-products make up 30 percent of the volume of U.S. pork exports, while inedible by-products make up one-fifth of U.S. pork exports. Both the total amount of pork exports and their value have steadily risen for the past two decades. In 2010, edible pork by-product exports from the U.S. were valued at \$700 million. Mexico is the largest importer of U.S. pork edible by-products, receiving 42 percent of the exports, according to the most recent report from the USDA.

Inedible by-products are processed, and then, used in various household and industrial products. In processing, the tissues are first heated so the fats and oils can be skimmed off. Then they're converted to a form which can be further used to make products such as buttons, chalk and shoes.

Inedible by-products are also used to advance human medicine. Glands from pigs can be removed at slaughter and used for medicine, serums, vaccines and antigens. Human transplants are also done using pig skin, heart valves, brain cells and lungs. Pig intestines are used for surgical sutures; bones provide calcium and phosphorus; and bone cartilage can be used to repair damaged human cartilage. For most of these medical uses, synthetic products do not produce the desired results as well as the pork by-products.

Edible by-products make up about 14 percent of the liveweight of hogs. They are commonly called variety meats and edible fats. Variety meats include the brains, heart, kidneys and other organs. They are considered delicacies in some parts of the world, especially Asian countries. Variety meats are good sources of essential nutrients and vitamins A, C, D and B complex. The edible fats are usually further processed and used in products like ice cream or jellied foods.

Although we may not realize it, pigs have many more uses than providing the bacon for our BLTs. Almost everything you use on a daily basis includes a pork by-product, even this paper you are holding, which is made from the bones. In fact, there are more than 99 products made from pork by-products, and lucky for swine producers, these many uses add value to market hogs. Take a look for yourself, and you will be amazed at what you find.

Size and scope of operation: Steve, along with his father, Joe; brother, Phil; and son, Spencer, run an operation consisting of 40-50 Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, Spotted and crossbred sows. Their focus is to produce the best breeding stock and showpigs they can.

Rural Development Board, S.D. Master Pork Producer and provides several hog classes for evaluation by college judging teams each year.

Other leadership activities: 25 years on StarTownship Board, six years on the Wakonda School Board, 15 years on the Wakonda Development Board, 10 years 4-H leader, six years Clay County Fair Board and lifetime member of St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

Pork leadership activities: Founding member of the Illinois Purebred Swine Council, Illinois Duroc Board member, Illinois Hampshire Board member, Illinois Chester White Board member, County Pork Producers member, 4-H leader for 25 years and current Executive NSR Board member.

Other leadership activities: President of Marissa School Board for 20 years.

Please describe what you feel the NSR and/ or UDSR's role should be in assisting purebred breeders compete in today's market: We need to continue to stress the importance of youth shows and other activities in order to develop leadership and communication skills in young people. I also strongly value the importance of purebreds and the need for purebred pedigreed shows, and also the importance of purebreds for export markets.

ELECTION-VOTING PROCEDURE

As a result of the uniform By-Laws created by the Long-Range Strategic Planning process, all four breed associations have adopted the following procedure for the upcoming election. If you are an active senior member of the American Yorkshire Club, the United Duroc Swine Registry, the Hampshire Swine Registry or the American Landrace Association, you will receive a ballot in November.

ARTICLE 6: BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

- 6.1 Number. A board of directors consisting of seven (7) members shall manage the affairs of the AYC, UDSR, HSR and ALA. One director should be elected from each of the three districts, with four directors serving as at-large representatives. The boundaries of each district will be based on membership, recordings and geography, and will be established by the NSR Executive Committee. District boundaries will be reviewed every three years thereafter, and after such review, the NSR Executive Committee shall revise the boundaries as it deems appropriate. At no time shall more than three directors be elected in the same year. No more than two members of one state can serve on the board at one time.
- 6.2 Tenure and Qualifications. Directors shall serve a term of three years or until their successors are elected or are appointed. The members of the board of directors must be active members of the AYC, UDSR, HSR or ALA, in good standing. No director shall serve a term of more than two consecutive three-year terms and must be off the board for three years before being re-elected to the board.
- 6.3 Nominations and Voting Procedure. The president and vice president will select a nominating committee. The committee will be made up of the following:
 - The president of the AYC, UDSR, HSR or ALA
 - The vice president of the AYC, UDSR, HSR or ALA
 - One member appointed by the president and vice president, from each district that has a vacancy occurring that year.
- a) The nominating committee must select nominees for the board in time for their names to be published in an official NSR publication prior to mailing of ballots. All eligible voting members will vote for all candidates in all districts, and the candidates at-large.
- b) There will be space provided on the official ballot for write-in candidates.
- c) Ballots will be mailed to all eligible active members.
- d) In order to vote in the election, an active member must have registered a litter during the fiscal year and must have paid their maintenance fee for the same period.
- e) Ballots will be mailed first class from the headquarters of the NSR. Prior to each election, the NSR Executive Committee shall set a date for the mailing of ballots to members, and a reasonable deadline for the return ballots. Only those ballots postmarked by the required date, and received at the NSR office, will be counted in the election.
- f) The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected as director.
- g) Newly elected directors' term will take effect following the first annual meeting after the election.

Please describe what you feel the NSR and/or HSR's role should be in assisting purebred breeders compete in today's market: I feel the NSR has two important roles in today's purebred swine industry. Pork leadership activities: Offers swine clinics throughout the year educating youth about feeding, showing, clipping and other related topics, serves as the Indiana Duroc Queen advisor, served as the 2009-2010 NJSA Junior Board president and served on the Indiana Junior Swine Circuit Board.

Other leadership activities: Coaches the Lewis Cass High School Livestock Judging Team.



The Duroc boar came from the John Huinker program in Decorah, Iowa. Many pages of Duroc history can be written about this firm, and the boar selected from John's program represents years and years of performance and production. This son of Red Draw 29-1 was tremendous on his feet and legs and could go all day long. He was easy moving, had a lot of power and as good of an underline as any red boar in the drive. This guy will make breeding hogs for Bill and Bane Bates, Gilson, Ill., and allow them to build a sow herd as productive as any. A special thank you goes to the Range and Huinker families for allowing us to utilize their outstanding animals and represent the Duroc breed on Hog College® Row.

The Duroc show was another outstanding opportunity to strengthen breeding programs across the country. Many good boars and gilts traded ownership and got great new homes. This year's Premier Sire was CAIN2 King 1-1, owned by Cain Super Sires, Chariton, Iowa, and this year's Reserve Premier Sire was SWSWO Wis Okie 1-8, owned by Terry and Blake Schmaling, Delavan, Wis.; Rick May, Ada, Okla.; and Jerry McLemore, Ninnekah, Okla. Congratulations to these outstanding firms.

The Champion Boar came out of the youngest class and was shown by the David Martin Family of Marion, Iowa. Sired by last year's Hog College[®] boar, Bases Loaded, this dude had lots of great breeding value. Really opened up and a tremendous look, this guy had lots of muscle shape from end-to-end and is sure to generate winning barrows and gilts across the country. Thank you to the Martin Family for sharing such an intriguing breeding piece, and congratulations to RAR Genetics, Aplington, Iowa, for an outstanding purchase to stand alongside his daddy.

The Reserve Champion Boar was shown by John Huinker of Decorah, Iowa. A son of Asia, this guy truly represented the Huinker program and red hogs in general. This one was really opened up, had a tremendously big rib cage in him and could go all day long. He is sure to get a fair chance at Cain Super Sires. Call early and book often on this great pair of young boars.

The second place boar in Class 1 was shown by young Travis Hamilton of Model, Colo. I will be real honest with you, I don't know what impressed me more, the job this young man did driving his boar or how impressive the boar was himself. Travis and his family are to be commended for putting together a real breeding piece for the public to view. Sired by the great Royal Flush boar at Top Cut with a pedigree that combined the old Guy Jackson sow at Brandon Ogle's on both sides, this one is sure to get lots of use. This young boar was stout and opened up and had a winning-barrow presence and look. Congratulations to Swine Genetics International, Cambridge, Iowa, on a great purchase. The third place boar in Class 1 was shown by the Devin Goehring Family of Lowell, Wis. A son of King, this guy was as well built and stout featured as any in the show. Barrows and gilts with this kind of skeleton will win all day long. This guy was one of the most intriguing breeding pieces in the show. He will be open to the public at A Cut Above Sires in Benedict, Neb.

Class 2 was won by Mappes Durocs, Moore Okla., with a son of Bren. This rascal was really opened up and might have read with as much muscle and power as any hog in the show. He had a great big skull, was really stout featured and looked like a he-hog. He was purchased by Beise Brothers and will stand at North Iowa Boar Stud in Buffalo, Minn. Bill and Jana Range drove a very impressive son of Earthquake into second in Class 2. This rascal had a good look and great shape. This one was built right and opened up from end-to-end with great power.

Class 3 was won by a Trifecta son from the Range firm. Another boar that had lots of breeding value, this one offered extra power and opened-up with dimension in a bigger-thanaverage package and handled it very well. I thought Bill Range brought an excellent set of boars for everyone to view. Eggers and Sampson of State Center, Iowa, were second in class with a Chainsaw son that was extra attractive and good skeletoned. This one was tall fronted and read with a really nice shape.

The final class of boars was won by the Reserve Champion Boar of Huinker's and followed by a pair of Huinker boars in second and third. The boar that was second was as sound and flexible as any. This guy was tall fronted and really extended on both ends. He took a super long stride on both ends and had good shape. Klemmensen Farms of Blooming Prairie, Minn., will give him a good chance. The boar in third was maybe as opened up in his blade and hip as any. He was big in his kind and had lots of width and dimension throughout. He will get a fair chance for the Earnhart Family in Albion, Ind. Howard Parrish, Edon, Ohio, had another boar that needed to be discussed. This son of Roger B was one of the most interesting hogs in the show. He offered as much bone and looseness of skeleton as you could expect. This one was really immature and extended off of both ends. He will get a good chance for the Malcolm firm of Huntertown, Ind.

The gilt show was full of breeding pieces that got good homes. The youngest class of the day was lead off by Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa, with a daughter of Ice Chest. This gal had lots of power and was really opened up and went to the Frey firm in Columbus, Wis. The David Martin Family was second in class with a daughter of Bases Loaded. This one was sound and square and had a great look and build. She looked like a female but had great muscle shape from end-to-end. Randy Schroht of Owatonnia, Minn., will give her a fair chance. John Huinker was third in the youngest class with one that had lots of fans. If you wanted one with big feet, a big rib cage and lots of muscle, then you were looking at the right one. Mappes Durocs will put this one to work, and I am sure we will hear of great things from this female.

Mappes Durocs led off Class 2 with a daughter of Red Man. She offered lots of length and femininity, but had plenty of muscle and shape in a really flexible and loose skeleton. The Smith Brothers in Elkhart, Ill., will make this one famous. Giertz and Larson of New Windsor, Ill., were second in class with a little longer-bodied, bigger-outlined gilt that still had lots to her. This one could still flex and go with the best of them, and will go to work for the Anderson firm in Lyons, Neb. Greg Ruppert of Des Moines, Iowa, also had an interesting breeding piece. Not as fluffy as some, but probably as big footed and flexible in her build. Watch the Rick May ranch of Ada, Okla., for something to come from this interesting female.

Class 3 was led off by Tyler McCallister of Pine River, Minn., with his daughter of Red Rum. This gal was sound, good legged and really extended on both ends, and will go to work for Graff Showpigs of Juneau, Wis. In second was a Lance and Mitchell Westcamp, Groveport, Ohio, entry, sired by The Beast. This gal had lots of shape and looked like she could generate some big-time barrows. She got a good home with Dan Gunderson of Le Sueur, Minn.

Class 4 had an impressive Rodibaugh female from Rensselaer, Ind., as its winner. A daughter of Carl, this lady was big in her kind, plenty stout featured and had lots of muscle shape from end-to-end. She can make barrows or boars, depending on your preference. Second in the class was shown by McGrew Showpigs of Good Hope, Ill. This lady was the longest-bodied, levelest-designed and best-looking gilt in the whole show. She was great on her feet and legs and is sure to breed on. Both of these gilts sold to Dakota Gold Showpigs in Hitchcock, S. D. They made great purchases with two of the better gilts in the show.

Class 5 contained the Grand and Reserve Grand Females. Iowa State University showed this year's champion. A daughter of Firestone, this gal was as big ribbed and productive as any hog of any breed. She was tremendous in her width and performance and, yet, handled it really well. Dan's Durocs, Manito, Ill., is sure to give this highly-educated female a good home and a fair chance. John Huinker was in next with the Reserve Grand Female. A daughter of Asia, this one had big time power. She was huge chested and had extra power from one end to the other. Another really big-ribbed, big-volumed female that offers lots of breeding value for her new owner, Larry Thorsen of Morris, Ill. Larry should have fun breeding good red hogs out of this one for a long time.

A huge thank you goes to Heath Nelson of Wakonda, S.D., for an excellent job of sorting a very good set of red hogs, and for giving us your honest and professional opinion. Also, thanks to Harold Hodson of Cambridge, Iowa, for his assistance in working with Heath in the ring. Many thanks go to Kevin Wendt, Irwin, Ohio, for another thorough and professional job of selling purebred hogs. The Mower County Fairgrounds crew does things as well as any and thanks, again, for all they do for us.

The Grand Champion Boar was from Jason Kuehn of Dewitt, Iowa. He was a big, heavy-boned hog that had good feet and legs. He took a good, long stride and, being sired by SRF2 Brass Knuckles 9-7, you knew he would be extremely sound.

A son of BRJL0 Open Range 34-4 was named Reserve Champion Boar. He was a medium-framed hog that balanced well and made an excellent reserve champion for Range and Theobald of Waterloo, Ill. This one could sire boars, barrows or gilts and do it quite well.

The Hog College[®] Boar for 2013 was from Delaney Young of Agency, Mo. This hog was tall fronted and heavy structured. He was a boar with excellent muscle shape, and looked like one that would be able to sire structure and muscle. He was the top-selling Hampshire boar at \$6,500 to Shaffer's Goldrush of Albany, Ind.

One of the stoutest boars of the show came from Katie Stutzman of Waldron, Mich. He was a son of NEI2 Huey 6-7 and an Augusta 18-1 sow. I really liked how this guy reached out of his front end and all of his balance.

The Grand Champion Hampshire Gilt was from H&H Hampshires of Greenfield, Ohio. A daughter of GMW1 Hats Off 9-9, I loved this gal for her look, balance and design. This is one that could make your herd boar famous. If this lady gets mated to the right boar, we will hear lots about her offspring in 2014. Michael Lackey told me the search for the Hampshire Hog College[®] gilt was over after he had been to Rasmussen Swine Farm at Hurley, S.D. He was certainly right. This daughter by JLM0 TCG Augusta 24-3 was feminine, yet stout. She was loose jointed, yet sound. She had all of the muscle you would want. This is a real foundation lady here.

Randy Wirt and family of Parker, S.D. were the exhibitors of the Reserve Champion Gilt. She was sired by RWF9 Black Belt 63-1. This female had great bone with a good hip and great feet. She balanced well and had a wide, sturdy hip and good shoulder blade. The Wirt family let go of a good one here.

Another gilt that had some real positives was the Dean Myhre gilt from Caledonia, Minn. Dean brought a daughter of CPT2 Game On 13-8, and had a good plan, when she went on the trailer. Deep, wide, feminine, yet bold in her overall makeup, this female could raise a herd boar.

Peter Farms of Mendon, Ill., had a gilt sired by DMP0 Frozen in Time 31-2. This was a big-ribbed gilt that just needed a week, and look out. She could make a sow to build a herd around.

One other gilt that was very popular was the gilt from Gibson Girls of Circleville, Ohio. She was sired by GBSN2 The Shaft 38-1 and out of a Home Boy 100-3 sow. Huge in her rib, wide chest floor, level topped and a sound moving gal, H.L. had plans for this one. A great set of Hampshire females were in Austin, Minn.

The Premier Sire this year was JLM1 Pivot Point 13-2, owned by Top Cut Genetics, Farmland, Ind. Reserve Premier Sire was JL1 He's a Ten 10-10, owned by Earl Cain and family of Chariton, Iowa.

The Reserve Premier Yorkshire Sire honor was presented to Rodney Spinler, N.Y., for SS1 About Time 59-2. Congratulations to both these firms for an excellent set of hogs.

This year's Champion Yorkshire Boar has got me excited because he is a good one! Congratulations to Grimm Purebreds, Maynard, Iowa, for letting this son of JGR1 Pierce 25-6 go. This is one big-footed, heavy-structured Yorkshire boar. He is square at the ground, wide in his chest and has a massive shoulder that opens into a huge rib cage. He is square and correct in his hock and has the ideal frame and muscle for making barrows. Plus, he should have the ability to make the next generation of females better. If you are serious about breeding better Yorkshires, give Swine Genetics International of Cambridge, Iowa, a call to book semen. They partnered with Dick Kuecker and Sons, Algona, Iowa, and bid \$10,000 to take this Yorkshire boar home.

Next to the ring was the 2013 Yorkshire Hog College[®] Boar. Thank you to George and Eric Watson of Hillsboro, Ky., for letting this son of CDO2 Crazy Bone 70-2 be put on Hog College[®] Row. This boar offers a lot of good to the breed. He is tall fronted, really correct in his top line and is ideal in his frame and length of body for making breeding hogs. This guy has a great shape to his rib, he is square at his knee and great in the angles to his hip, hock and rear pastern. He is a sound moving boar that can really flex out of his hip. Premium Blend Genetics of Arlington, Ind., paid \$14,000 to load this young herdsire on their trailer.

I would describe the Reserve Champion Yorkshire Boar as one that will not get you into any trouble. He was exhibited by Charles Real of Marion, Texas. This son of CDO1 Prestige 87-2 has great show ring appeal from the side. He is tall fronted, level designed and correct in his ham-loin junction. He is a square-built hog that is wide set through his center and lower skeleton, tracks away with genuine base width and is sound. He sold to Pink Genetics of Kenosauqwa, Iowa, for \$400.

Lorenzen Farms of Chrisman, Ill., made their way to the sale ring next with a son of CDO2 Crazy Bone 70-2. Tracy's boar looks like a young Yorkshire herdsire should; he reads to be a later-maturing hog as you study him. His toes all point in the same direction, and he hits the surface with a square, big toe. He is heavy structured for his age, has a square turn to the base of his rib cage and tracks away with width between his hocks. He has a square, muscular turn down his top and a big, muscular hip. Mark Larson of Woodhall, Ill., bid \$1,000 to take this young prospect home.

Wayne J. Huinker of Decorah, Iowa, drove the winning entry from the oldest class of the day to the sale ring next. This son of SS1 About Time 59-2 is really complete! He's good footed, clean jointed and has a good running gear. This hog is open in his center body, wide based and has plenty of muscle. He should work well for Hubly Farms of Faribault, Minn. They paid \$600 to take this guy home.

The gilt sale began with a great female. Congratulations to Grimm Purebreds of Maynard, Iowa, on this year's Champion Yorkshire Female at the NBS[®]. This daughter of CDO1 Benchpress 263-6 is stout and durable in her structure and big ribbed. When you let this girl out of the pen, she floats around the ring, she is sound and flexible, she's about right from a muscle standpoint, and still very correct in terms of balance. She will make the next generation of Yorkshire hogs better for Joe Coyne of Pontiac, Ill. for \$2,800.

The Reserve Champion Gilt won the youngest class of the day. She is sired by HOBW2 Show Cat 1-9. Congratulations to Western Illinois University of Macomb, Ill. for your Reserve Champion Female. This gilt looks like she could generate winning barrows. She's big footed, heavy boned, plus deep centered, big ribbed and sound. She is feminine in her build and has a great look from the profile. R&K Show Pigs of Fulda, Minn., bid \$1,900 so they could load her on their trailer.

I would like to thank Hilman B. Schroeder of Sauk City, Wis., for stepping forward to represent the Yorkshire breed on Hog College[®] Row. He brought us a daughter of HSO2 Packer 14-9 that is really complete and looks like a Yorkshire female should. 

HEALTH REGULATIONS (WTC & Southeast Regional)

- 1. Each animal entering the Georgia National Fairgrounds & Agricenter must be listed on an official interstate health certificate issued by a licensed, accredited veterinarian.
 - All hogs must be accompanied by an original health certificate. Multiple hogs may be listed on one original, provided they are transported and arriving on the same shipment.
 - b. Each animal must also be accompanied with two photocopies of the original health certificate.

- Certificate must be issued on or after Jan. 3, 2014, with the following information:
 - a. General Information to be included on Health Certificates
 - i. Name and address of consignor; consigned to: Winter Type Conference or NJSA Southeast Regional 401 Larry Walker Pkwy. • Perry, GA 31069-1367
 - ii. Individual identification of animal (ear notch and/or ear tag).
 ALL crossbred animals MUST be identified by a federally recognized, permanently numbered ear tag.
 - iii. Health status of animal, including dates of required tests and vaccinations **MUST** be listed.
 - iv. A permit number is required on each shipment of swine entering Georgia and **MUST** be recorded on the health certificate. The accredited veterinarian may obtain this permit by accessing the following website: http://forms. agr.georgia.gov/SBPermits/Permits.aspx. If you have any questions on obtaining permits, contact the GA Dept. of Ag, 404.656.3667
 - v. Your driver's license number **MUST** be included on your health certificate.
 - vi. Your veterinarian's cell phone number **MUST** be included on your health certificate.
 - vii. A premises ID number MUST be included on your health certificate.
 - b. Required Testing, Vaccinations and Statements to be included on Health Certificates
 - i. ALL Hogs (breeding and market) **MUST** be tested for pseudorabies (PRV) and brucellosis on or after Jan. 3, 2014 UNLESS: Animals come from a PRV-qualified and brucellosis-validated herd OR animals originate from a herd in a Stage IV or Stage V state as defined in the Pseudorabies Eradication State-Federal-Industry Program Standards and originate from a validated brucellosis free state.
 - a. If the herd of origin is PRV qualified and brucellosis validated, individual testing of each animal is not required. In this case, the PRV qualification and brucellosis validation numbers must appear on the health certificate and complete quarterly herd test date (month, day and year) must be stated on health certificate.
 - b. Swine tested for PRV and brucellosis must show the date blood sample was drawn (month, day and year). Either the Elisa, PCFIA, ALA or S/N tests are acceptable. Differentiable Elisa test will not be accepted.
 - ii. ALL breeding animals coming to the show MUST be vaccinated against Leptospirosis (6-way) including Bratislava and Erysipelas on or after Jan. 3, 2014. The complete date of vaccination MUST be listed on the health certificate. Market animals should not be vaccinated.
 - iii. It is strongly recommended that all breeding animals be vaccinated against influenza.
 - iv. All health certificates must carry the following statement: "Farm or origin of the swine has not had pseudorabies or swine dysentery in the last 12 months, has not had any signs or diagnosis of TGE or PEDv in the last 60 days, feeds no garbage, uses no PRV vaccine, and is not under quarantine for any disease condition; also that vesicular stomatitus has not been diagnosed within 10 miles of the farm of origin within the last 30 days."

GENERAL INFORMATION

- » Entry fees for all entries must accompany the respective entry form.
- » All late entries will be charged double the regular entry fees. All entry fees are non-refundable.
- The NSR reserves the right to close entries because of pen space limitations any time after the printed deadline.
- » All entries must be postmarked by Dec. 13, 2013.

- All entries must meet their respective breed requirements. Entries that do not meet these requirements will not be allowed to show or sell at the conference.
- If an exhibitor has an NSR account that is past due, funds from the sale of their animals will be applied to their past-due account.

BREEDING ANIMAL SALE

- » Breeding animal classes will be divided into classes as equal as possible by farrowing date.
- A minimum of 60% of the number of each sex (boars & gilts) shown will be selected for the sale. These animals will be selected with no set number selling from any single class. Animals not selected for the sale can be consigned to the sale for an additional fee of \$20 per head; this must be done by the conclusion of the show. If the animal sells, the fee will be applied toward the sale commission. If the animal does not sell, the fee is forfeited.

In the days when repurposing was done more for practicality than for decorating, the Peter men started raising hogs in a chicken coop on the family's rented Illinois farm. The patriarch, Don, spent his days as herdsman for J.C. McLean, owner of the prestigious Dor Mac Angus Farm, but at home he was a hog man. He started with Berkshires when his boys, Mark and Kirk, were young, then expanded to Hampshires, in 1962. Mark bought his own bred Hampshire gilts, in 1968, from Hamp-An Farms and Jim Foster, and kept them at the "poor farm," an old dilapidated farm his father owned five miles down the gravel road.

Two short years later, Mark headed off to college at Western Illinois University and spent three years working with Bruce Egnell, manager of the boar test station at the school.

"It was the ideal setting for a young person excited about being a hog breeder. I got to meet and interact with prominent breeders, of all breeds, whose boars were on test at Western. I also got to know a lot of fellow hog enthusiasts," Mark says.

Mark and his high school sweetheart, Jill, were married in May of 1972. They lived in a trailer on a rented five acre tract and kept a handful of their own Hampshire sows under a grove of trees behind the trailer. Jill is still a source of support and encouragement for Mark, his pigs and Peter Farms.

As graduation approached, Mark was faced with a decision: take a full-time job and raise hogs on the side, or make a career out of raising hogs. With encouragement from his father and Ruben Edwards, he and Jill moved their eight sows home to Mendon, Ill, to join the other 80 sows waiting for them.

For the next three decades, Don, Kirk and Mark would build, grow and change their operation. The farm started with mainly Hampshires, but added Yorkshires and Durocs. They focused primarily on female production until 1992, when they started working with Premier Swine Breeding Systems. They sold nearly 1,000 boars each year for 16 years through Premier, until the industry demand changed. At that point, Peter Farms went back to its roots of purebred Hampshires and showpigs. Today, Kirk's son, Karl, has joined the operation. Together, the family has 80 purebred Hampshires and 25 crossbred showpig-based sows. The remnants of the commercial production can still be seen, as these sows are all raised on the slattedfloor barns built in 1995. Perhaps, the most important echo of their commercial background is the emphasis on raising productive females.

"In any breeding herd, the females are the essential element. Any success that you have is tied to maintaining a productive, structurally-correct female line, whatever species you are in. Over the years, our reputation has been built on that. Our sows are functional and correct," Mark says.

Maintaining the integrity of their females is a lesson the Peter boys learned from Don's days with cattle. The females at Dor Mac Angus Farm made up a very correct, very productive cow herd, and Peter Farms tried to follow that same pattern with their sows.

"If you would look at our operation, we have some basic principles that we have carried through multiple decades of hog production that are just as valuable and applicable today as they were in 1960 when we started raising hogs: soundness of feet and legs, reproductive soundness, just basic pig production things. You have to bring the other characteristics into your pigs that are sought after at the time, but if you stay functional and reproductive, you are always going to be in the game," Mark says.

Mark learned more than the importance of good females from watching his father. He also learned about good business and the importance of integrity.

"We just try to pattern the way we do business after the way dad did, by doing things the right way and treating people the right way," Mark says. "We span a lot of years of raising hogs, and we try to stay relevant today, but the fundamentals will never go out of style."

A quick glimpse into how some of our industry's premier producers got their start in the purebred swine business.
