Changing roles

"You're never done, your roles just change."

I heard this quote more times than I could remember, during my six years of coaching judging teams alongside Dan Hoge at Black Hawk East College. At the end of the spring semester, as sophomore judges were finishing their last days on campus, Hoge would remind an auditorium full of students that they may soon be done with their education at BHE, but their role as supporters and alumni of the program was just beginning.

I think everyone holds onto a quote that has its own special meaning to them. After wrapping up, arguably, two of

the largest and most successful events in the history of the National Junior Swine Association (NJSA), I couldn't help but think back to Dan's impactful statement as it relates to our youth organization. What started out as an idea discussed during longrange strategic planning in the late 1990s,

exploded into the nation's largest youth livestock organization with more than 12,000 members across the country. But, what no one could have ever imagined is the impact that this youth organization would have on the entire swine industry.

Here are interesting facts from this year's World Pork Expo (WPX) Jr. National and National Junior Summer Spectacular (NJSS) shows:

- A combined total of 2,588 total junior entries were exhibited by junior members from more than 25 states between the WPX and NJSS.
- Just shy of 1,400 junior participants competed at these two events.
- More than 80 percent of the gilts that were shown in the open shows at these events were also exhibited in the junior shows.

After going through many challenges and dramatic changes in the purebred swine industry, the NJSA has provided many breeders an avenue to continue their passion of raising purebreds. In many instances, breeders may have "changed roles" from their former position in the purebred seedstock industry. Today, these same farms take advantage of the increased demand for purebred and crossbred showpigs that provide youth with opportunities for developing life skills. In many cases, this has allowed the next generation of the family farm to continue with the tradition of their involvement in the swine industry.

This brings me to the most important product of our current organization and industry. For the last 13 years, the NJSA has produced some of the most talented individuals who are now providing leadership in a variety of fields. Whether it's former NJSA member Mike McCoy judging the Landrace and Yorkshire junior gilts at the NJSS or former NJSA junior board members Doug Albright and Aimee Inskeep serving on the Youth Advisory Board, it's obvious these individuals were never done with the NJSA, their roles just changed.

This issue of the *Seedstock EDGE* is referred to as the "Boar Stud Issue." It showcases some of the nation's very best new and proven sires that will have a significant impact on the future of your operations. These boars will

have a chance to be used on some of the very best sows in America. Each resulting litter will be provided with the best environment possible, knowing that each pig must have an opportunity to look their best come show and sale time.

The simple equation we are taught in college is genetics + environment = phenotype. I think this can be directly correlated back to the NJSA. Parents and leaders with high integrity + an environment for success = positive leaders for tomorrow. As I watched my 3-year-old son play in the green shavings at this year's NJSS, I've never been more aware of making sure the kids always stay more important than the pigs.

When Dan Hoge and his wife Deanna received their Distinguished Service Awards at the NJSS banquet, Dan's closing comments were, "Let's make sure we are using the pigs to build our youth, and not our youth to build the pigs."

Many of your roles may be transitioning into full-time careers after having the chance to participate in the NJSA. I would encourage each of you to take Hoge's advice, and find a role that allows you to continue to build our youth for the future.

Judge's influence

Nearly every day, while driving or making a herd visit, I have a thought that I want to include in my next editorial. But, when it comes time to write them down, I have either forgotten them, or they don't seem as important.

This year was no different. I tried to decide what was most important to most people. Then, I reflected back to conversations I had with people at the events throughout the year, and I bounced ideas off friends and fam-

ily members. I even thought back to what was important to me, when I was showing. That's when the light came on for this editorial: a judge's influence in the ring.

If you have ever wondered what question will make a fieldman run scream-

ing the fastest, here it is – "Who hired that judge?" We have all heard discussions about it at some point. "That person has no business in the

ring; all they do is look at faces!"

"He wouldn't know a good one, if it ran him over."

There will always be debate about what happens in the ring. It's human nature, and that's OK. It's everyone's right to have opinion on livestock and the people that are selected to judge our shows. But, it's easier to listen to positive feedback than negative. I am always up for a spirited discussion, but let's keep the petty comments to a minimum; you never know how many little ears are listening at NJSA events. Try and stay positive for their sake.

I have a great opportunity to visit with breeders that have stepped in the ring at NSR and NJSA events, lined up classes and given their thoughts on the set of hogs brought to them. They always seem to share one thought, "It is never as easy as it looks from the other side of the fence."

I have sat in on the meetings where we put lists of judges together, and I can say the NSR does its best to hire judges that are great evaluators. But, we also look for judges that are great teachers and role models for the youth. It is imperative we hire judges who can evaluate hogs well, but it's also important to remember that "well" is a subjective term and can't be measured. It can be interpreted differently by everyone.

Before I was a fieldman, I had the opportunity to judge a lot of shows all over the country. I learned quickly that the judge will never make everyone happy. When you step into the ring, you better do what you think is right. If your best friend has an animal in that class that needed to be placed 5th, you better put it in the 5th pen. Make sure when you go home, at the end of the day, you are happy and feel good about what you accomplished in the ring and the message you left behind.

Things have changed dramatically from when I was showing in the mid-90s, but the need for good, honest livestock evaluators has never been more important. I challenge all the young judges and college students who have aspirations of judging to remember this quote from

"Do an honest job, have integrity and always remember there are young people who look up to you standing ringside."

> Dr. Clint Rusk, "Integrity is the most important thing that separates the good judges from the bad. You won't last long in this industry, if you start placing your friends and doing things that aren't true to your character."

Here are just a few thoughts I have for young judges. Keep your head down in the ring and evaluate the stock. Don't worry about who's running the spray bottle and standing behind the pen. You were hired for your opinion; don't let anyone influence it. Do an honest job, have integrity and always remember there are young people who look up to you standing ringside. Folks, judging is pretty easy – just use the best one!

This is a competitive and serious business. People spend countless hours working at home and thousands of dollars on livestock and feed. They travel all over the country using up their vacation days to spend time with their families and teach their children about hard work and character. Make sure you understand and respect that every time you step into the ring.

I am going to leave you all with one more quote from a discussion I had with Dr. Rusk, "The most important show is the one right in front of you on a given day. It doesn't matter whether the livestock are all good or all bad or what it pays, that's your most important show and your most important audience."

Hobby versus livelihood

Someone mentioned to me that maybe the showpig industry, today, is more of a hobby than a livelihood. That got me thinking about how those of us in the industry perceive what we do on a day-to-day basis. I know a larger percentage of people work off-the-farm instead of being full-time hog farmers than they did 40 years ago, but the important thing is how you view your operation, whether you have 10 sows or 210 sows.

A hobby is an activity done regularly in one's leisure time for pleasure, while a livelihood is a means of securing the necessities of life. I want you to think about the amount of time you put into your management and mating decisions, feed rations, cleaning pens, marketing plans and so on. Focus on the amount of time you scan the Internet or thumb through the Seedstock EDGE looking at ads of boars or past winners. How many phone calls have you made to your feed man to set up next year's plan of attack? How many times have you called boar studs to check on available sires? How often do you call your NSR field rep. to get his opinion on a certain boar at a show, see how the babies look at so-and-so's or just get news from the road? Think about the time spent with your vet ensuring your herd's health. Remember the time you spent checking the farrowing house at 3 a.m. or cleaning the barn. Add up the cost of electricity, water, feed, semen, wood chips and broken shovels. I've given you lots to think about, but, regardless of size, compare your operation to your favorite hobby and your job. Which is it more like?

The ones I have talked to say they take their swine operations much more seriously than a hobby. To them, it's a career. Is that true for you? If someone told you that your 50 sows are a nice hobby herd, would you feel offended? I guess, what I am getting at is the majority of us put way too much blood, sweat, tears, hard work, dollars, emotion and passion into this to call it a hobby. I have never been a believer that you have to spend more money to be more successful, but I do believe that you can spend more time doing homework and busting tail to find success. That has been, and will always be, the lesson I try to teach my own kids.

On the NSR website, each staff member has a saying or quote attached to their bio. While they're all thought provoking, I want to focus on the three from the field staff.

I will start with Blaine Evans. His quote, from Samuel Goldwyn, reads, "The harder I work, the luckier I get."

This young whipper-snapper is dead on. If you put more time and effort into a livelihood that you have a passion

for, then good things will come your way. We can all define "lucky" differently, but, ultimately, it translates to success.

Then, I looked at senior Field Representative Michael Lackey's quote, and it states, "The only time success comes before work is in the dictionary."

My first thought was, *Did he really read the Dictionary?* But then, I thought his quote from Vince Lombardi is exactly what I would expect from him. Success doesn't come easy, and if it did, then everyone would be doing it. I think there are many that believe what we do as swine breeders is easy. But, if it's easy, then how are there so many flashes in the pan? Ask Lackey about some of his favorite field visits, and then, look at what those stops have in common. One thing they all share is this equation: hard work = success!

My quote is from William Johnsen, and it simply reads, "If it is to be, it is up to me."

It's not long, and it's not very detailed. Simple and to the point, it says, if you want to make a difference, then you are the only one that can. This applies to every one of us in this industry who have a love and passion that goes beyond what any hobby could ever offer. It is up to me to figure out what to feed, which management practices will work and what boar to breed to which sow. The bottom line is if I want to make a difference I can, but somewhere in that equation is a lot of hard work, tears and difficult times. However, in the end, there's also a lot of joy from an industry we're passionate about.

I love being a field rep. Mike Paul told me a long time ago that this role is different today than it was 40 years ago. He is exactly right. But, the things that have remained constant include the miles we travel, the stops we make and the thoughts we have to help this industry. We want to continue to help you prosper in your livelihood for many years to come.

Remember, breeding hogs is like putting a puzzle together. Until you get the outline and corners in place the rest of the puzzle is hard to piece together. Keep breeding hogs the way you think we should and not the way that everyone else does. This is your livelihood, not a hobby!

Sarah Beck's hand shook as she wrote out the check. As she scribbled the comma and filled in the remaining zeroes, she was nearly light-headed. Sarah handed it to the clerk and offered an apology for the shaky script.

"That's the biggest check I've ever written," she said.

"Well I'd hope so, dear," the clerk quipped back as she handed her the ticket.

On that ticket were four crossbred boars – Big Step, White Collar, Lock Down and Deadliest Catch. They would join a red boar that would be known as Hack Saw and a Hampshire they'd call Final Judgment on a stock trailer bound for Clayton, Indiana. These sires would serve as the foundation for Adam and Sarah Beck's future.

You see, the 2010 Indiana State Fair was just another fair for many people, but for the Becks it was the crossroads. It was the point the newlyweds stopped chasing a dream and took the risk to dive in deep. August 2010, Crossroads Genetics was born.

aking a living in the swine industry was something Adam Beck wanted since he was old enough to form memories. When he was just 5 years old, his dad built a new house. Adam swept up all the shavings from the construction and kept them to bed down his future sow herd.

"It's all I ever thought about," Adam says. "I even prayed about it, when I was a kid."

When Adam and his brother, Jason, were finally old enough to participate in 4-H, their father relented and bought the boys three sows from Ivan Miller, which proved to be the answer to Adam's prayers. Spectacular Showpigs, as the brothers

originally called themselves, was formed.

The very first sale Spectacular Showpigs participated in was the Ohio Yorkshire Invitational. The boys loaded their very best January prospects in their stock racks and headed east to Eaton, Ohio. When they arrived, their pigs didn't look much like the others. They were too large for that market and sorted out toward the bottom during the sift.

Those pigs brought \$50, \$75 and \$125. They were hardly sale toppers, but that summer, they proved to be show toppers as they all took home banners in their county.

This got the attention of two gentlemen that Adam credits much of his industry knowledge to – Lyle Dorjahn, Ivan Miller's herdsman, and Brent Bolen, owner of Hi Point Genetics.

"Both of those guys have been mentors and helped fuel my passion for this industry, along the way," Adam says.

They must have seen Adam's passion and enthusiasm for the industry, because they took him under their wings, offering tips, helping him build a customer base for his prospects and letting him in their own sow, show and stud barns. Adam made countless trips to Chrisman, Illinois, with his father and grandfather to visit with Bolen and see the operation.

"I practically lived out there most summers," Adam says. "I was over there constantly."

And each time, he was more certain he wanted to own a boar stud. That was one aspiration Adam would never give up on. He would stubbornly cling to it, refusing to let it go, not letting anyone talk him out of it. The more naysayers there were, the more Adam wanted to prove them wrong.

In college, at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana, Adam met some Boilermakers with dreams that were just as big as his own. When they probably should have been studying, Adam, Jason Corya, Brian Arnold, Andon Boocher and Jeremy Jones talked about their future in the boar stud business. The boys spent hours crunching numbers, planning their

future boar investments and even drawing out blue prints for their boar barn.

But then, they graduated and life happened. Arnold joined the staff at Black Hawk Community College and traveled with the judging team. Corya went to work for Prairie State Semen (PSSS). Boocher dove into the animal health industry. Jones went into ag lending. But, Adam refused to give up on his dream.

He worked at his family's septic business, putting in enough hours to get by, but spending every other waking second with his small sow herd.

Crossroads Genetics wasn't Adam's dream alone, though. Sarah grew up around red hogs. Her family had about 50 head of Duroc sows. In fact, Adam and Sarah's first date ended with a late night run to PSSS to get semen to make sure Sarah's daughter's show gilt was bred.

When they married in March 2010, the couple knew they wanted to own a boar stud, but they didn't know it would be so soon or how much courage it would take to make that leap.


If you're wondering what it is like to invest in a boar stud, Adam will tell you that you could absolutely lose everything with no guarantee that you will make a single dime.

It's no wonder that Sarah's hand shook as she wrote out that check to bring home the boars that would start Crossroads, but it is also not surprising they succeeded.

Each boar selected at Crossroads Genetics is built from the ground up. They know the importance of a good set of feet and legs in breeding hogs. Almost as importantly, they also know the value in a true breeding piece – one that may not be perfect, but is sure to move hogs forward.

"We try to buy good hogs because those never go out of style," Adam says. "Good, balanced, complete hogs win shows, so we try not to get too far out there. But at the same time, we're not afraid to step out and buy a real breeding piece."

It's this balance of structure and reaching outside the box that has created a battery of sires that has

a reputation for breeding on.

Not many people can stand ringside at the Crossbred Classic and watch boars sired by one of their own garner both Champion and Reserve, but the Beck family did in 2012, when the Ottenwalters grabbed both banners with their Shoot 'Em sons.

Shoot 'Em wasn't the only sire to stamp out champion after champion. Sires such as Rock Solid, who produced the Champion Commercial Gilt at Fort Worth and another popular belted female campaigned by the Hill family that sold for \$20,000; Cole Mine, the 2013 Champion Yorkshire Boar at the Winter Type Conference, whose progeny won the Yorkshire show at the NJSA Southeast Regional the next year; and of course the multiple-time premier sire who produced countless winners in the red hog ring including the \$90,000 Reserve Champion Duroc Boar at World Pork Expo – Light 'Em Up.

If you ask Adam what gives him such a knack for picking out elite sires

that breed on, he'll tell you he simply buys boars backed by powerful females that he wants to use in his own herd.

"We don't want to buy boars to just sell semen," Adam says. "If they're not good enough for us to use on our sows, then, they're not good enough for our customers."

He'll add that he tries to build a program, buying boars that will complement the genetics he has already put together. This is one reason he is so excited about the Stookey Duroc boar he purchased in Des Moines this June.

"He's just tailor-made for Light 'Em Up daughters," he says.

Others will tell you that the success of Crossroads Genetics and Adam Beck & Family Showpigs comes down to one thing – passion. One could argue that it isn't just Adam's passion, but rather every member of the Crossroads team that makes it a success.

His college buddy who dreamed of building a boar stud on Purdue judging trips, Corya, has been a part

of the Crossroads team since it started. He helped part time before the operation grew large enough for him to be brought on full time, last summer.

"Obviously, they have a lot of the same passion for the industry I do," Corya says. "You can hear it when you talk to Adam and see it by the way he acts at shows. We all share the same drive and passion to succeed."

The entire team shares the responsibility to keep Cross-roads running smoothly.

Sarah handles all of the AI Certificate requests and much of the paper work. She goes out of the way to ensure that all of the customers are happy, answering questions during all hours of the day and sometimes late into the evening.

Corya now manages much of the boar stud. He takes care of the 40 sires that are standing, today, and coordinates the promotions and advertising. Corya is also one of the main contacts to discuss the boars and help customers lineup matings that will work on their sows, whether they have two sows or 200.

Sarah's father, Jimmy Pierson, now cares for the 75 females that make up Adam Beck & Family Showpigs. Known for his nurturing nature, he spends a lot of time in the farrowing house and is the first caretaker for the 600 prospects that will be marketed throughout the country, each year.

Adam's father, Dave Beck, not only helped spark Adam's interest in the industry by buying him his first sows, but he has literally opened his home to Crossroads Genetics. Dave's house has served as the office and semen sales staging area for the last four years.

Adam's stepsisters, Katie and Kristen Oxford, also pitch in by helping bottle and package semen for shipment.

Cody Berling and Clay Kincaid are two young people who are pas-

sionate about the industry. During the school year, they collect boars a couple days a week, and during the summer, the boys will be there fulltime helping in any way they can.

Adam handles sales calls for both semen and showpigs, while keeping track of the finances and overseeing the entire operation.

Adam and Sarah feel blessed they have been able to create a livelihood in an industry they're passionate about, while being surrounded by family and friends who share their passion.

"It's just awesome to be able to do what I've always wanted to do and raise our kids around this," Adam says.

Family is a reoccurring theme at Crossroads Genetics.

"I love being able to work with our friends and family every day," Sarah says. "Everybody in our family plays a role somehow, and I don't know what we'd do without them."

They'll even admit that Crossroads Genetics has grown more than they ever imagined.

Artificial Insemination By Ann Fry

Joe and Bob both have a group of 45 sows to get bred today. Joe has decided to breed his sows using conventional AI (CAI), while Bob is going to use intrauterine AI (IUAI). The following chart outlines the process Joe and Bob will follow.

Joe moves a boar near the sows to increase stimulation.

Joe sets the CAI rod in one sow and begins to slowly deposit the semen.

Joe continues to stimulate the sow to increase uterine contractions.

Joe waits three to four minutes for the uterus to take up the semen.

Joe moves on to the next sow.

After checking for standing heat, Bob makes sure boars are away from the sows to reduce stimulation.

Bob sets the IUAI rod in one sow and moves to another one, giving the first sow time to relax.

Once the uterus is relaxed, Bob pushes the inner catheter into the uterus of one sow and deposits the semen.

Bob moves on to the next sow.

Bob moves on to the next pen of sows.

rtificial insemination is by no means a new technique to the swine industry. Since the 1930s, CAI has allowed producers to use different genetics to improve their herd without owning the boar. Over the last few decades, new AI technologies have been developed to advance the genetics and efficiencies in swine operations even further.

There are three main types of artificial insemination practiced in the swine industry, today: CAI, IUAI and deep intrauterine AI (DIUI). In CAI, the semen is deposited in the cervix and is taken in by the sow through uterine contractions. These contractions can be increased in number or intensity by stimulus, either having a boar nearby or applying back pressure. Because of the need for uterine contractions, CAI can be somewhat of a lengthy process, taking at least three to four minutes, depending on the female.

With IUAI, verifying standing heat and inserting and setting the outer rod is done the same way as CAI. However, according to Darin Kuhlow, owner of Cerdos LLC, the IUAI catheter is designed to pass through the cervix and deposit the semen directly into the uterine body. Not only does this reduce the amount of semen that gets lost in the cervix, but it also eliminates the need for uterine contractions. In fact, the uterus should be totally relaxed, which means there should be no boar contact and no additional stimulating.

For Peg Schmidt, manager of the Swine Department at Longview Animal Nutrition Research Center, getting the cervix to relax is fundamental. According to Schmidt, if the uterus is contracted the inner rod will not pass through the cervix. This can be frustrating and cause some people to not continue using IUAI.

"You just have to be willing to think about how you AI and consider reassessing the process," Schmidt advises.

For large farms IUAI allows the trained technician to breed a large group of sows more efficiently. They can set the rod in one sow, move on to the other sows in the pen, then come back to the first and push the inner rod through. In CAI, the technician would have to wait at least three or four minutes to breed one sow. For Schmidt, the increased efficiency is key. Since she and her team made the switch 14 years ago, they have decreased the amount of time they spend Aling sows by 30 percent.

In addition to decreasing the time to AI, IUAI can also cut the amount of sperm needed for breeding in half. Dr. Rob Knox from the University of Illinois has found that where 2.8 to 3 billion sperm in an 80 mL dose of extender are needed for CAI, only roughly 1.5 billion are needed in a 40 mL dose for IUAI.

As Dr. Kara Stewart, assistant animal science professor at Purdue Univeristy, explains it, the further into the sow's reproductive tract semen is deposited, fewer sperm cells are required for fertilization. However, she goes on to say that the semen quality needs to be the same, if not better, of that used for CAI.

"It only makes logical sense that if you are putting fewer sperm cells in, they better be able to do the job," Stewart says.

Kuhlow sees the decrease in

sperm required being the primary driver for the increase in IUAI use.

"There is a desire to produce more piglets from fewer sires. In the commercial and showpig worlds that means utilizing the most geneticallyadvanced, top-indexing boars to their fullest capacity, and increasing profitability by making faster genetic improvement," he says.

The third type of AI, deep intrauterine AI (DIUI), has the potential to decrease the required sperm count even further. In DIUI, semen is deposited even deeper in the sow's reproductive tract, in the uterine horn. This puts the semen closer to the site of fertilization in the oviduct, and theoretically allows for fewer sperm to be deposited. Currently, the optimum sperm cell count per dose for this method is unknown and more research is needed.

While IUAI is growing in popularity, DIUI is still in its infant stages. Stewart thinks 25 to 30 percent of commercial swine operations are using IUAI, based on catheter sales, but she has heard of very few large operations using DIUI. Stewart and Knox both agree DIUI's biggest advantage will come into place in the showpig sector.

Because DIUI places the semen closer to the site of fertilization, the technology can be targeted to semen with compromised fertility, such as frozen or sexed semen. Knox says for producers who may not have a boar or are unable to predict when an animal comes in heat, it can be hard to know when to order semen. And, even if the female is synchronized, there can still be a five-day window for ovulation. Frozen semen can offer producers a

unique flexibility to have semen on hand to breed when the female comes in standing heat, and DIUI offers producers the technology to use it.

It should be noted, there are very few studies that show improved litter sizes or conception rates from IUAI and DIUI versus CAI. Making faster genetic improvement comes from being able to essentially breed twice as many sows with the same amount of semen from one boar. For boar studs, this could mean selling twice as much semen from one collection. Stewart sees that as IUAI and DIUI become more widely adopted in theory, studs should be able to house less boars and get more doses from each one. But, as sperm count per dose of semen decreases, a greater emphasis will need to be placed on semen quality, especially at the stud.

Even though IUAI and DIUI are becoming more widely accepted by the industry, there are a few disadvantages. Aside from the added cost of the advanced catheters, there is potential for negative results.

"Anytime you introduce a foreign object into the sow's uterus you risk bringing bacteria and foreign material into it, which could negatively impact fertilization or implantation of the embryo," Stewart says.

Knox explains that the actual process of insemination by either technology can have adverse effects on the sow.

"It is possible to damage the cervix because you are trying to pass the inner catheter through the cervical pads to the uterus. If the process isn't done correctly, it can cause pain and possible damage to the tissues of the cervix," he says.

Additionally, as Schmidt has found, it can be almost impossible to pass the inner rod through when trying to breed gilts. However, she and her team have been very successful in getting first-parity sows and older bred. In a group of 45, she says they may have one, if any, they can't get bred.

Schmidt says the secret to getting sows bred using advanced AI technology lies with the technician.

"You have to give the female time to relax. Then you have to be gentle, but apply the right amount of pressure to get the rod through. Be patient, but don't spend too much time trying to force it," she advises.

As with anything, success comes with time. Producers considering using IUAI or DIUI should do their own research, learn from experts and practice without pressure. As Knox says, at the end of the day, the person trying to get the sow bred has to decide what will make them most successful.



This year's Premier Sire was Iconic, housed at A Cut Above in Nebraska, and Reserve Premier Sire was Off Label, housed at Showtime Sires in Illinois. Both boars have had a phenomenal summer.

Class 1 Boars was loaded with quality. Butts Farms of Evansville, Wisconsin, a name synonymous with good Durocs, won. This young boar was as sound and flexible, yet still balanced and immature, as any we have seen in a while. This guy has a place on a number of those that need to be more correct in their skeleton. Center Prarie Genetics knows a breeding hog when they see one. Thanks, Tom. Adam Gradert from Illinois was second with a really opened-up and powerful, barrow-looking son of Off Label. He went to Mid Atlantic Semen Supply in Maryland. Don and Preston Smith, Lafayette, Indiana, were next in class with an interesting Iconic son. This rascal had bone, muscle and look in a really complete and square build. Hi Point Genetics of Chrisman, Illinois, will give everyone a chance to participate in champion barrow drives with this one. Kurtis Kolb, Illinois, came fourth in a really tough class. His Off Label son was heavy boned, stout featured and still offered great length and extension on both ends. This dude was packed full of muscle and power and will complement a really strong set of sires at Premium Blend Genetics in Arlington, Indiana. Casey and Roy McCleery from Texas were seventh in class with a Red Draw son that was really interesting. He was one of the younger boars in the barn but offered a really immature and flawless skeleton. His head went high in the air, and he maintained tremendous flexibility of skeleton and still had good shape. He sold to Nelson Brothers and Joe Roberts in South Dakota. These boys know a changer when they see one. Thanks, guys.

Class 2 was led off by Thompson Brothers, longtime Yorkshire breeders from Ohio, branching into another breed and challenging others to step up to the plate and breed better hogs, regardless the color. This class winner had as much bone, muscle and just sheer power and body shape from one end to the other. He has a place in the breed and needs to be used hard if you want to add mass. Purple Power Boar Stud in Chalmers, Indiana, will give this one a fair chance to make history. Jordan Schippert from Illinois was second in this good class with a son of BR 549. He had a lot of the same traits his half-brother that won the National Western Stock Show maintained. Big footed and flexible with great shape and squareness, he will go to work at Prarie State Semen Supply in Champaign, Illinois. Don't sleep on the seventh-place boar of Thompsons that went to Kevin Wynn in Ohio; his look and muscle shape were quite interesting.

Class 3 was won by the eventual Reserve Champion Boar. He was exhibited by Derek Moore of Illinois, and was out of Iconic and the Beyers' Hog College® Gilt from Austin. He might be the most powerful and opened-up Iconic son we have seen in public this summer. This boar had a huge blade and rib cage and was so powerful, yet read incredible in the angles of his skeleton and offered great flexibility for a boar with this mass. Shaffer's Goldrush in Indiana found the one they had been looking for in this rugged he-hog.

Class 4 had plenty of studs also, especially the class winner and eventual champion of Stewart's Duroc Farm, Waverly, Iowa. This son of Elvis, a herdsire at Doug's, was so many of the things I have already discussed in the boars to this point but in a complete package. He was incredible in his build, flexible in his design and muscular in his shape. He can be used by anyone to make good hogs even better. Crossroads Genetics and Robin Ridge teamed up on this one and will add him to an already successful stable of studs in Clayton, Indiana. Mappes Durocs, Moore, Oklahoma, were second in class with a son of last year's champion, Red Baron. This guy had muscle, muscle and more muscle in a sound and functional package. This one was as interesting as any Darryl has brought out in a long time, and Prarie State Semen Supply thought enough of this one to stall him right next to his daddy. Meg Meeker of Illinois was fourth in this class with another really complete, great-looking and balanced son of Iconic. He will go to work at Southern Gold in Indiana and could be the sleeper of this solid bunch.

Class 5 had the high seller in the class winner, driven by Newcastle Genetics of Oklahoma. This Without A Doubt son was incredibly tall fronted, extended and correct. He represents so many parts and pieces that everyone talks about where we need to be going in this industry. Now, let's see how many back up their talk about where they want to go and tie

into this one. He is at A Cut Above and will team up with an already legendary red boar in York, Nebraska. Gabe Allen of Indiana was third in class with a son of King that was really tall fronted and, again, offered extra extension on both ends, along with tremendous bone work and foot size. Real McCoy Genetics saw enough value in this one to stand him in Ohio.

This is shaping up to be an era of females, and this year's Summer Type Conference (STC) certainly didn't disappoint. There were plenty of females shown that will have a chance to impact the breed, and I will try to highlight the top dozen or so. Class 1 was won by junior exhibitor Ashton Bain. His Flash Drive daughter was good built with lots of shape and sold to C and C Showpigs of Florida.

Class 2 was led off by the Reserve Champion Female and eventual top-seller at \$18,000. Shown by Marty Fordice and Family of Russellville, Indiana, this daughter of Challenger was flawless in her skeleton and look. She was tall fronted, flexible and had a feminine elegance second to none. Ripberger and Norman Brothers teamed up to give this one a shot. Young Cade Fecke of Illinois was in next with a female that had lots of chatter and fans. This Off Label daughter sold to Premium Blend Genetics for \$11,000. I am not sure there was one as impressive in the front two-thirds of her skeleton as this one. Head up, big chested and big bodied, this one looked like a brood sow and generator.

Class 3 was the home of our champion. Huinker Durocs from Decorah, Iowa, brought a daughter of Iconic for the public to see. She had tremendous body and volume with lots of mass and dimension from end to end. This gal looked productive in her kind and will get a chance in Kansas for the Phillips Kids. Junior exhibitor Cale Merritt from Texas was third in class with a beast of an animal. A daughter of Light 'Em Up, this gal was as wide and powerful as any you can find. She was still designed right and flexible in her build. She is out there enough, she could make the next great one. Duane Taulman and Family of Indiana will find out.

Class 4 was highlighted by a pair of littermates sired by Knight Rider. The class-winner was shown by young Patrick Arkfeld of Nebraska, no stranger to making red hogs that can change a breed. This gal was flexible, good looking and had the presence and look of a brood sow. Blake and Macy Wehmeier from Indiana won the chance to see what she can do. Junior exhibitor Justin Messner from Kansas was seventh in class with the other littermate. She was a little heavier boned, stouter from a muscle standpoint and had more of a barrow look that appealed to Rick May of Oklahoma, who knows a thing or two about making winning red barrows.

Jacob Gossett from Indiana won Class 5 with a daughter of Without a Doubt. She was really heavy boned, tall fronted and extra-stout featured. The Funkhouser crew will give her a new home in Indiana.

The oldest class had some heat. John Eilertson, South Dakota, had the class winner with a daughter of Incredible that was really fast growing and big centered. She will go to work for the Weisinger crew in Iowa. Taylor Blythe from Illinois had a daughter of King that was second in class. This one had a beautiful look and lots of shape to her top. She looked like she could make barrows, and Bill Spence, Indiana, will give her a shot. Third in class was shown by Danika Miller, from Indiana, with a daughter of Hi Gear. This gal was really interesting. She was tall fronted, stout featured and had really good running gear. Chances are, her new owners at Crossroads Genetics will mate her to one of the good ones in stud and make a herd boar or two. Elizabeth Hodges, Lebo, Kansas, was in next with a daughter of Light 'Em Up, and she was really interesting. There may not have been a longer-necked and longer-hipped gilt in the show. This one had lots of body and was really flexible. The Weisinger crew will make this one work, also.

A huge thanks to all involved. This has absolutely come to be one of the most exciting summer events to attend. Be sure to make plans to attend next year.

This girl's huge rib cage, blade and hip will go to work for Alex C. Stock from St. Peter, Illinois, for a price tag of \$2,100.

Next through the ring was the entry from Emerson Nelson of Kewanee, Illinois. This gilt, sired by WCMP3 Shark Tank 2-2, was the design and structure female of the sale. This girl possessed that soft hind leg and pastern set that is so hard to make in Landrace, yet was still youthful and attractive about her head and neck. Heidi Benner gets a deal at \$700 and will take this one to Pennsylvania and put her to good use.

The third and final Landrace gilt through the ring was Ethan Norman's gilt from Chandler, Oklahoma. Sired by DOVS2 Bad Cat 9-8, this gilt had moderation and power. This littermate gilt followed the mold of our lead-off gilt in terms of look and design. At \$1,500, she'll go home to produce for Travis Hamilton of Model, Colorado.

All in all, the Landrace females sold well, and I encourage all exhibitors, next year, to think about running their females through the sale. Also, it's important to note there will be an open show for Landrace boars and gilts to show next year, so plan accordingly. See you at the next show!

As the Hampshire show began, it was evident there might not be a ton of belted hogs in the barn; however, there was quality throughout the offering. This year, Kent Bennington, of Indiana, had the job of sorting the Hampshires. This was the first time I watched Kent judge, and I was impressed with the job he did. Kent was excellent in terms of describing the hogs and how they may fit into a program. Thank you, Kent; it is a big job to step into the ring and give your opinions.

On Saturday, the Hampshire breed took its turn in the sale ring at the end of the day, and I commend the breeders for bringing a set of hogs that was able to keep a crowd during the entirety of the sale. Kevin Wendt, Ohio, took the duty of deciding ownership of the belted breed, and as always, did a professional and efficient job. Thank you for your efforts, Kevin – I know your quality job is appreciated by all.

This year's Premier Sire was BOLN1 Point Maker 118-3, owned by Hi Point Genetics, Illinois. This sire has truly made his mark on the breed. Congrats to Brent and crew. The Reserve Premier Sire, this year, was a new name to many, TSOB3 Sock 'Em 1-7, owned by the Joostbern Family, Michigan. Sock 'Em was the Joostbern Family's purchase from Sobaskey's, last year. This Point Maker son is quickly turning heads with his first crop. Congratulations to all involved.

As the sale started, the Champion Boar exhibited by Trey and Cade Fecke, Illinois, was the first hog in the ring. The Fecke entry was one that was hard to get around on show day. In terms of a boar that put all the right pieces together in a sound and good looking package, I can't get over how this guy had the kind of show ring look we are all chasing with muscle and rib. Most impressive to me, this guy has a pin set, hip and hind leg that are hard to make. This SDF2 Peaches 9-6 son can help by producing an outcross pedigree that will move a guy off center. I would put faith in this boar to make the next generation of showpigs that are built right and good looking. Be sure to check him out at Shaffer's Goldrush. Their \$14,000 purchase goes to prove they want to make Hampshires better.

Next in the ring was Brandon Yantis, Illinois, with a son of DMP1 Frozen In Time 83-1. Brandon's boar turned some heads, as he drove to reserve champion honors. This guy is one I see as a boar people can use on a big cross section of their sows and not have to worry about sacrificing structure. This hog's angles read right. He was practical bodied and still picked his head up above his blade as he drove the ring. When it was all said and done, Showtime Sires, Illinois, took this breeding hog home for the hammer price of \$6,000.

Jerry McLemore, Oklahoma, was next in the ring with a unique boar. This son of DMP2 Colibob 48-2 is one that hit me hard for being a moderate, heavy-structured, good-built hog. This guy had lots of shape on the top side of his frame work, while working a loose spine and skeleton. DMP2 Colibob is starting to make a name for himself, I would be sure to look up Jerry's boar at Triple B Sires, Oklahoma.

Carpenter Creek Farms, Indiana, had a nice day and drove one of the more extreme Hampshire boars in the offering. With the popular pedigree BOLN 1 Point Maker 118-3 x HH1 Walk This Way 95-3, I figured this guy would have some friends. This boar was one that caught my attention for the simple fact that he was able to lay a tremendous amount of top shape on a good-footed, sound skeleton. He had the kind of muscle Hampshires are known for, with the kind of running gear we all could use. Kilmer Farms, Indiana, stepped to the plate and got this guy for \$4,000.

One more boar that needs mentioning is the Engler Family, Iowa, entry. The Engler boar was one of the first hogs shown out of CFLK3 Eye Opener 7-2 at Top Cut Genetics, Indiana. This was the unique and extreme breeding piece within the show, this year. When we talk about heaviness of structure, this hog sets the bar at a whole new level. This guy's feet were big, his bone huge and his skull stout. Those ringside will tell you, he isn't for everyone or every sow, but where he is good he is very good. Heimer Hampshires, Missouri, stepped up and showed their dedication to making better Hampshires with their \$37,000 purchase. Congratulations to the Englers.

As we started the gilt sale you could tell excitement was in the air. As evidenced by the sale at Expo, as well as at Summer Type, there is a real passion for this breed and many great livestock minds are on a mission to make them better.

This year, we had the opportuiny to offer many of the Junior Show Champions in the sale on Saturday. This is a great opportunity for the junior kids when they are done with their projects along with breeders who are able to pick up the piece they are seeking. The O'Neal Family, Indiana, allowed us to offer Makenzie's Reserve Champion Hampshire Gilt from the incredibly difficult junior show. This SH3 Meet Your Maker 1-2 gilt had to beat a lot of good ones to get a banner. Congratulations to the entire O'Neal Family, and thank you for allowing us the opportunity to sell this tremendous gilt. She will stay in Indiana and go to work for the West Point Farm crew.

This year's Champion Hampshire gilt in the Open Show was exhibited by Katie Davis, Arkansas, a TSOB3 Sock 'Em 1-7 gilt raised by the Joostberns Family, Michigan. She was one of the true foundation females that was offered on Saturday. This gilt did so many things right, as far as being put together well in her skeleton, being good designed and looking like a lady, with all the muscle and body you will ever need. This gilt will be one to watch for in the future. Thomas Trout, Indiana, one of the talented young showmen in the NJSA, took a step by bidding this one in for \$9,750. Good luck with your purchase, and congratulations to all.

Next in the ring was Samuel Gardner, Indiana, with a daughter of last year's Champion Boar, WMFS2 LVS Consensus 85-8. This is the gilt I call a stout breeding piece. She's one that can take a guy off center in a hurry. This gilt was stout in terms of her skeleton and muscle, while having a productive, easy-keeping type of rib and body. This high-selling gilt, at \$19,000, could be interesting to follow over the years. She has as good of a shot as any at WinMor Farms, Iowa.

The Class 1 winner was Morgan Knotts, Indiana. Morgan drove one of the first CFLK3 No Debate 14-5 gilts I have had

the opportunity to see. I know everyone had their opinion of the Indiana Champion, No Debate, last year, but honestly he did exactly what I thought he would. He stamped Morgan's gilt with the kind of build to survive the long drive and the design it takes to get a second look. Ethan Norman, Oklahoma, is getting in on the ground level with No Debate by taking this \$2,100 gilt home.

There were several great hogs that sold that day and buys to be had for all. Good look to everyone with their purchases.

Incredible is the word that comes to mind to describe the 2014 Summer Type Conference (STC). We had the best set of Yorkshire boars I have ever seen in the barn, and the crowd was there to buy. If you missed the show, you really need to plan a boar stud tour and check some of these guys out.

Yorkshires were the second breed to show on Friday, and we started with seven classes of gilts and finished the day with five boar classes. I'd like to thank John Staude and Corey Carpenter for their evaluation of this set of hogs. These gentlemen did a great job of sorting the hogs and staying true to their beliefs and the priorities they use when sorting hogs at home.

This year's Premier Sire award was presented to HACO2 TCG Untouchable 153-6, owned by Top Cut Genetics, Indiana, and Steve Cobb and Family, Arkansas. The Reserve Premier Sire award was presented to ACGF2 TCG Out of Control 126-3, also owned by Top Cut Genetics.

I have thought for two days about the best way to describe this year's set of class-winning boars; all I know for sure is there was an amazing set of boars in the barn, and regardless of the changes you need to make to your sow herd, there should be one in this report to help.

The Champion Yorkshire Boar was exhibited by Final Drive Genetics of Shipshewana, Indiana. Jordan's boar is sired by SS1 About Time 59-2, and won the second class of the day. This guy has a great set of running gear underneath him. His feet and legs all point in the right direction, and he is comfortable in his skeleton. He is not "out there" in any area; he's just a complete, good hog that will not get you in the ditches. He sold to Hi Point Genetics, Illinois, for \$18,000.

The Reserve Champion was exhibited by Steve Cobb and Family, with a son of ARK3 TCG Untouchable 159-2. If you haven't incorporated the Untouchable line in your sow herd and are looking for a power hog, then this guy is for you. He is open and square at the base of his skeleton and has a huge blade and shoulder working in him. This one is unique in how he blends from his shoulder into a huge square top, and when he goes away he has all the muscle you will ever need. He is ideal from a frame and length of body standpoint to make barrows. Lean Value Sires set a record when they bid \$230,000 to load him on their trailer.

RW Genetics, Texas, drove the winning entry from Class 3. Rick's boar is sired by CDNO3 Slow Ride 4-4. This one hit me hard on scan day; he's a midsized, power hog that is different in his pedigree. This guy has a stout, rugged skull, a big forearm and huge rib cage. His pin bones are set wide and square from behind and his toes are even and all point in the right direction. He's tall fronted and level topped. I think this one has a chance to make better Yorkshires. Look up Premium Blend Genetics to book semen; they paid \$130,000 to take him home to Indiana. Next up was a very popular entry from the Hoge Family of Good Hope, Illinois. This son of ACGF2 TCG Out of Control 126-3 won the youngest class of the day. This guy is extremely expressive, when viewed from above. He has a square and true shape to his top, but still maintains his width and power all the way to his base. He drove as comfortable as any during the show and still offers a great look from the side. This one also has a real chance to improve the breed and sire winning barrows and gilts at NJSA events. The rugged, breeding boar of the group won the oldest class of the day. Congratulations to Norman Brothers and Son and Fred Ripberger of Sidell, Illinois, for your popular son of 6MSB3 Foot Print 21-5. If you need a boar that's a little bigger outlined without giving up any muscle, look and bone, this is the one for you. This one is sound and correct in the angles to his skeleton. He is tall fronted, big centered and opened up. This guy is heavy structured and big footed with a square toe spread. He sold for \$145,000 to Shipley Swine Genetics of Ohio.

This was the deepest set of Yorkshire boars I have ever seen assembled in one location. My hat is off to all the breeders that had a hand in making this event a record breaker. Use the boars that you need in your programs. The future looks really bright for the "Mother Breed!"

The gilt sale was loaded with foundation females; if you couldn't find a gilt in the barn that suited you and would help your herd, then you did not look hard enough. This was a powerful set of females!

We started the sale with the Supreme Champion Gilt in the Junior Show, exhibited by Kaila Taylor, Indiana. This daughter of HACO2 TCG Untouchable 153-6 was one of my picks in the show. This one has the look of a true foundation female. She is correct from a balance standpoint, tall fronted, deep centered, wide in her build and feminine. She should help make the next generation of Yorkshires better for Shaffer's Goldrush, Jarvis Simmons and Samuel Diehm, all of Indiana, at the price of \$17,000.

The Champion Open Gilt won Class 6, and was shown by Hannah Zundel of New Alexandria, Pennsylvania. This lady, sired by RIY2 Best Yet 74-12, is a great-designed gilt that has a feminine image from the side but still has all the power needed in a female. I liked this brood sow prospect a lot. She sold to Oliver Rusher of Plainview, Texas, for \$10,000.

The Reserve Champion Gilt from the Open Show was next in the ring. This daughter of TBRO0 Starbuck 45-3 won the oldest class of the day. There is no question she is a show gilt

that is well balanced, excellent in her muscle, sound and great in her base width. Plus, she is heavy structured. She sold to Savannah Leigh Page of Jefferson, Georgia, for \$5,000.

Andraya Hurst of Kokomo, Indiana, drove her Class 5 winning entry to the ring next. This daughter of HACO2 TCG Untouchable 153-6 looks like a show hog. She is correct from a balance standpoint, tall fronted, deep centered, wide in her build and feminine. She should help make the next generation of Yorkshires better for Trey and Cade Fecke of Bonfield, Illinois, who paid \$2,250 to load her on their trailer.

Talena Sprecher of Lone Rock, Wisconsin, drove the Class 4 winning gilt. This wide-skeletoned, soft-centered gilt was sound moving and great in her lower joints. Kent Brattain and Family of Indiana paid \$1,100 to own this daughter of ACGF2 TCG Out of Control 126-3.

A daughter of STHG2 Ground Level 21-1 won Class 3. This gilt was shown by Jessica Rodenbeck, Indiana. This lady is tall at the point of her shoulder and has a great look from the side. She sold to Crossroads Genetics, Indiana, for \$3,250.

The second class of the day was won by a daughter of SS1

About Time 59-2. This lady was a littermate to the champion boar. She is stout and opened up, yet soft and pliable in her rib. She has a great underline and vulva and the right amount of muscle. Congratulations to Katie Davis, Paragould, Arkansas, for exhibiting the Class 2 winning entry. She sold to Final Drive Genetics for \$3,700.

Alyssa Jipping of Hamilton, Michigan, drove the Class 1 winning gilt. This daughter of ACGF2 TCG Out of Control 126-3 is square built, soft centered and looks like she could sire class-winning barrows. She sold to Coe Farms of Ohio for \$2,700.

The 2014 STC Yorkshire sale will go down in the history books. It totaled \$1,053,200; never before has a single breed sale totaled over a million dollars. 

Ben Moyer, Wauseon, Ohio, took on the task of sorting the stock with brother, Andrew, assisting. It is always an honor to listen to some of the showpig industry's leaders judge the show and give their opinion. Thank you, Ben and Andrew, for a job well done!

Steve and Mark Gray, Ada, Oklahoma, drove their son of As Good As It Gets to champion honors. This Hillbilly Bone grandson does a lot of what daddy does so well. He possesses that naturally high head carriage and bold blade, while still being pulled apart in his blade and opened up underneath. It's always fun to see how boars change and mature after your visits before the show. Here's one that didn't change a bit. He was good when I saw him at home, and he was good on show day. Showtime Sires will take this stud back to Newark, Illinois, for \$20,000.

Brad Bates from West Mansfield, Ohio, brought his son of Deliverance, the Indiana high-dollar boar from last summer, to reserve champion honors. This hog was as powerful and heavy muscled as anything in the show. Here's a hog that has the ability to make change in one generation, if mated correctly. Shaffer's Goldrush, in Indiana, buys this one at \$12,000.

The next boar in the ring was Robert Wehmer and Family's Times Square son from Indiana. This Monumental grandson had the look, design and correctness to produce show barrows and gilts. Yet, this hog was still stout enough and had plenty of muscle to make boars, as well. At \$18,000, he will stay in Indiana where Upperhand Genetics will make this one work.

Albright Swine Farm of Michigan drove another Times Square son into the ring next. This calico boar had the similar square build, foot and feature as his sire. Purple Power Boar Stud will take this big-topped, thick-made boar home to

Chalmers, Indiana, at a \$2,000 price tag. Good work!

Goff Select Swine Genetics, Marion, Indiana, wins the youngest class of the day and came through the ring next. This boar, sired by Changer, was productive in his rib, moderate and rugged in about every way possible. The Stuckey Brothers of Sycamore, Ohio, take this boar home for the price of \$2,500. Nice buy!

Carpenter Creek Farms capitalized on their investment of a popular show gilt from last year with their son of Main Motion. This boar was as good in his design and structure as anything in the show. Here's a strong-footed, tall-fronted, big-caged boar that can generate progressive show hogs. Lean Value Sires in Ohio makes another strong addition to their stud at \$9,500.

Luke Carpenter and Family, Crawfordsville, Indiana, had one of the more interesting boars in the show. This Bone Collector son was way out there in terms of width and power. The Funkhouser Family in Indiana will give this one a shot.

RW Genetics brought their square-built, boxy son of Bone Collector all the way from Anderson, Texas. This boar had the barrow length, stoutness and running gear it takes to make modern show hogs. Look for this guy to make an impact as he heads to Hi Point Genetics of Chrisman, Illinois, at \$15,000.

Malcom Family Farms, Huntertown, Indiana, was next through the ring with their son of Earle. Like his sire, he was opened up underneath, pulled apart in his blades and great in his structure. Kilmer Swine Farm trusts their program and gets this guy for \$12,000.

It was a solid boar show to say the least. We may not have broken any new records, but the hogs were complete and deep. Congrats to all on a very good show!

MICHAEL LACKEY Northwestern Field Representative

As a kid in Colorado, Michael Lackey spent his weekends on the family houseboat in the summer and snowmobiling in the winter. That was until he saw a friend showing livestock at the county fair and decided he needed to be in the ring, too. At first, Lackey and his brother were content to show a few cattle and pigs at the county fair. But as they started to get more competitive, the houseboat was replaced with a livestock trailer and the snowmobiles exchanged for a showbox. Instead of spending days at the lake, the Lackey family vacations now coincided with livestock shows.
