


From the Field

The topside of the pedigree

I'll be completely honest. There comes a moment for everyone where you simply want to take a break from reality. For those that were at the World Pork Expo (WPX) and National Junior Summer Spectacular (NJSS) held in conjunction with Summer Type Conference (STC) in Louisville, Kentucky, I know you can relate. In the span of 30 short days, the National Swine Registry (NSR) hosted two events where more than 3,500 hogs were exhibited by people from nearly 30 states. As much as we love the Iowa State Fairgrounds, 10 days in Des Moines facilitating the WPX swine shows has the tendency to wear a guy out. And, to rebound from this to pull off the largest NJSS/STC in history took a massive effort from the entire staff, along with the cooperation of the exhibitors. Many of you also participated at the events in Springfield, Illinois, the week prior to Louisville. To the dedicated families and industry allies that helped make each of these events a huge success, we cannot say thank you enough.

Between the late nights and early mornings at these shows, I often had a few brief minutes to travel to the fairgrounds by myself. There's no better place to do some deep thinking than behind the wheel. And, as I stepped back and took in the 30,000 foot view of the industry, as a whole, I couldn't help but think back to how critical the topside of the pedigree is. Now, even though this may be the boar stud issue of the *Seedstock EDGE*, I'm not talking about those influential sires that have left their mark in history. I'm talking about dads.

In my position, I have the unique opportunity to travel to every NSR and NJSA show each year. In 2014, this would have included 12 shows that each bring a diverse group of exhibitors and hogs to venues across the United States. Each of these shows provides a great chance to visit with breeders, families and young people all bound together by their love of livestock. After three years of traveling this circuit, I've come to realize many things, but one in particular. There is no more important figure that has the ability to shape a young person than dad.

There are always situations that arise during a show that cause a show manager's blood pressure to skyrocket. This could be due to someone being upset over where they are stalled, a busted water hydrant flooding a row of pens or an angry exhibitor that vents frustration over how a gilt was placed during the show. In these moments, I think back to how my dad would handle adversity. I've never met anyone in my life with the ability to roll with the punches like Terry Arnold. Dad's steady approach and patience in all situations

was apparent to me and my sisters throughout our childhood. Whether it was a broken-down combine, a flooded basement or an equipment breakdown caused by his son, my dad would simply not be shaken. His ability to use moments of trial as a teaching tool is something I admire. There were many times as a kid where I held the lamp under the tractor, while Dad busted his knuckles trying to break a stubborn nut loose. In these moments, dads show us what we are all truly capable of.

On Tuesday evening in Louisville during the NJSS, I had an opportunity to serve on an interview panel for The Maschhoff's Pork Production Scholarship. During this time, six elite young people were asked a series of questions, of which, one was to name two people that have had a positive impact on their lives. Nearly every candidate listed their father as the most influential person in their lives. Most of these young people, along with some of the interview panel members, shed a tear or two as they talked about how much their dads have meant to them.

Like many of you, I listened ringside at the shows this summer and heard countless judges talk about the importance of making hogs better. Although, I'm in full agreement we need to continue the pursuit of genetic progress, I want to challenge us to something different. I want each of us dads to take a hard look at what we can do to become better fathers. Often times, this is simply having the ability to handle adversity with class while little eyes are watching. Livestock shows provide a perfect platform for these scenarios. By showing our kids how to treat others with respect and show appreciation for all we are given, we can positively impact our children. The showpig industry provides a very rare opportunity for parents to work day in and day out with their children. Today, there is a stronger need than ever before for qualified young people to step up and fill leadership roles within the growing world of agriculture. If we want our young people to grow into the future leaders of this industry and carry the torch, it all starts with focusing on the impact we have from the topside of the pedigree.

From the Field

What to expect from a breeder

As I sit down to write this editorial, we have just completed two of the largest National Swine Reigstry (NSR) events in history. The World Pork Expo (WPX) has grown larger than most people would have ever dreamed, and the National Junior Summer Spectacular (NJSS) and Summer Type Conference (STC) have had a steady increase for the last five years. As I look back at these two events, the number 200 keeps sticking in my mind. We had 200 more exhibitors at WPX than last year. I am not sure if they are 200 brand new people to the showpig world or seasoned veterans that finally made the trip to Des Moines, in June. Whatever the case, it's awesome to see that kind of enthusiasm in the NSR and National Junior Swine Association (NJSA). With all the new members and families joining the NSR and NJSA, confusion can arise. I get calls all the time asking about what you should do if you have not received your pedigrees yet, or if a pig isn't turning out like you thought it should. The list is endless. I thought in this editorial I would give you my thoughts on what you should expect from the breeder you purchased your pig from.

The most common complaint I hear is the easiest to deal with – I haven't received my pedigrees yet. Call the breeder and ask what is going on. They may have lost the paper you wrote your information down on, or they could have forgotten the ear notch of the pig you purchased. Just give them a call and check-in. Remind them the deadline for transferring the pedigree is fast approaching. If, for some reason, you have made several attempts to contact them and there is still no response, make a note to not do business with them in the future. Breeders, this is something you have to get better at! There is no excuse. Please get the pedigrees transferred in a timely fashion.

I also get several calls a year from people who have had trouble buying pigs online. This one can be a challenge to deal with. Not everyone has the time to go look at a set of pigs they are interested in. The pigs may be too far away to justify a trip, or maybe you are saving vacation days to attend the targeted show. If you can't go see them, do business with people you trust! Call a fieldman, phone a friend that lives nearby, find someone you trust to look at them, or call the breeder and talk to them. This will help avoid some calls about pigs that took better pictures or are much larger than what the buyer anticipated. It's your responsibility to do your homework before you buy.

The next issue I want to address is buyers who would like credit if a showpig does not turn out like they had hoped. Most of the calls I get on this are from breeders wondering what to do. Here is the best and most simple answer I have: do what you feel comfortable doing. In my opinion, anything (barrow, gilt or boar) sold as a showpig, sells with no guarantee, unless stated otherwise. We all know there are many factors that may affect an animal's growth and breeding capabilities. Many of these are not visible at the time of purchase. Some problems may be the result of management, feeding practices and handling by the buyer after the purchase. There is no way of knowing who's to blame, if a problem shows up. I don't expect credit if a pig I purchase doesn't turn out; I don't understand how others should either.

Now, if you purchased a boar or gilt from one of the NSR Type Conferences as a breeding animal, then that is a different story. Look in the front cover of your sale catalog, and you will see the Code of Fair Practices, or you can look it up on the NSR's website. You can also dig through my past editorials, and I have talked about it there.

The last thing I would like to touch base on is NSR shows. These events are growing rapidly, and there are a huge number of first-timers at them. If it is your first time attending one, please read all the information provided on our website. Double check all your health papers and pedigrees before you leave home. Make sure the pedigrees you do have are correct and match the pigs you are bringing. Please, if you are not going to be able to attend the event, let us know. We always seem to be tight on pen space.

Last but not least, several of our Type Conferences are held in conjunction with junior events; please make sure you enter correctly. If you are just showing in the junior event, there is an entry for that. If you just want to exhibit in the Type Conference, there is a separate entry for that show, and if you wish to enter your gilts in both shows make sure you fill out both entry forms.

I had a great time at our summer shows, this year. I look forward to visiting with you guys at the state fairs. Best of luck at your county shows. I hope you all have a great summer!

Put the right foot forward

I only get 700 words, so here it goes. It used to be we were all taught to give our very best, and if our best wasn't good enough, then try again and try harder. Sound familiar? I wish that was the philosophy of all involved in showing and breeding livestock. It seems more and more that we want to push the limits in all aspects of our livestock industry.

Last spring, I attended the pedigreed gilt show in San Antonio, and if you have never been, you need to go because the number of quality gilts in one barn at that junior event is

spectacular. While watching the Duroc gilts that were pedigreed as farrowing Aug. 1, I noticed a class that was 20 deep of gilts that could have won any class in the gilt show. John Staude was the judge, and he had every pen full after the initial sift and a few extras in the holding pen. It did a long-time Duroc enthusiast's heart good to see that many high-quality females.

I, then, watched the next class with even more excitement, thinking this deal was starting to get really good. After Judge Staude made his initial sift of this next class of gilts farrowed the last five days of July, he had only kept three. That got me to thinking, were all the really good gilts farrowed Aug. 1, or could some of the breeders have fudged a date a bit to make those gilts more appealing? Did all those breeders do those kids and themselves a favor by fudging a couple of days on that pedigree, or should they have left them as July 13, won the next class and promoted a class winner instead of a really nice 11th place gilt that hit the hardest class of the day?

It bothers me that at so many of the shows we work a young family will come and hand us an envelope from our office that contains a pedigree, and it has never been opened. Mistakes happen all the time, and I would encourage all breeders to try and keep an open line of communication with buyers and buyers to please ask a lot of questions. It is never a bad thing to double-check ear notches and compare them to each other. Don't be afraid to take pictures and send them to someone if you have questions on an ear notch, or if you think it doesn't match up properly. Many of the shows we help with require you to draw a diagram of the pig's ear. Put the notches exactly where they are on the ear and, most of the time, they will work with you, if you happen to add notches up wrong.

Breeders, please make sure you take care of all of the transfer of ownership. I know it is very easy to just sign the

back of the pedigree and hand it over to them, but if they don't send it in and have the transfer done, they don't get to show their pig. In the end, they don't get to represent your herd and program like you had hoped they would.

The size of this junior program, or monster that has developed, is awesome. It is a very good thing to have the number of junior exhibitors we have at all of our shows. Without kids and the junior program, we have no reason to do what we all enjoy.

We, as breeders and exhibitors, need to understand there are more eyes on us now, than there has ever been. They watch every one of our ads and read our descriptions. They watch what we put in our feed bucket and how much. They watch us as we prepare our animals for exhibition and imitate what we do. We all need to understand if we enjoy things the way they are in the industry today, we all need to make sure we continue to emphasize to others to work together and work harder. Don't compromise the future of what we have developed by doing something you or anyone involved will regret in the future.

There is nothing in the world I love to do more than spend time with my wife and kids showing hogs on the weekends. There is nothing I look forward to doing more in the future than watching and helping my grandchildren do the same. I hope the programs we have today are still around. In order for that to happen, we all must put the right foot forward and continue to encourage, before we discourage.

Ways to ensure a successful litter

Raising livestock has lots of ups and downs, but having a successful first litter of pigs can be one of the most agonizing parts of the business.

A sow's first litter can determine her longevity. If she has a great first litter with no farrowing problems, no infection, no mastitis and eats well, then this will improve how she deals with her future litters.

Dr. Daniel Hendrickson is a partner at 4-Star Vet Service and practices out of its Stoney Creek, Indiana, office. His family also owns and manages Top Cut Genetics, a boar stud and sow farm near Farmland, Indiana. He says, another factor in having a successful litter is to breed females that are not too small framed or short bodied.

"Females that are too small will also have a shorter pelvis, which means an increase in C-sections and problems farrowing," he says. "When we shorten hogs from blade to hip and make them smaller framed, we are also shortening all of their bones, and these sows have more farrowing problems."

Hendrickson says, transitioning a show gilt to being a sow is very important to ensure she will cycle correctly and settle. Being in good condition will also allow the sow to have her pigs easier and milk well.

"A gilt in the right condition, not too fat and not too skinny," he says. "Giving a proper weight range is tough to pin down, but the sow should be in the proper condition to ensure a successful litter."

One other consideration should be made long before farrowing dates are on the calendar. Hendrickson says, to consider sow size when breeding to help with farrowing issues. Fetuses grow very fast at the end of gestation so the gilt should be induced with Lutalyse either on or the day after her due date. He says, selecting females that have some length of body and frame size, then keeping them in proper condition, will help with a successful farrowing process.

"The factors that affect farrowing problems is keeping small-made females, having them too heavy conditioned, allowing them to go too far over their due date and having a small number of pigs," Hendrickson says. "There is not much we can do about the sow having a small number of pigs, but we can change the other three things."

Here are other ways Hendrickson suggests to ensure a successful litter.

- Nutrition is key. Good gestation feeds are 13 to 14 percent protein and most gilts should eat 5 to 6 pounds per day. Hendrickson says, to make sure the animal's gestation diet includes good corn, soybean meal, premix and minerals.
- Offer plenty of water.
- 3. Administer a pre-breeding vaccine. Hendrickson says, it should include parvovirus, leptospirosis and erysipelas. Also, give Ivomec after coming home from a show or sale before putting a sow into your herd. Isolate her for three weeks to check for PRRS and watch for signs of PEDv.
- Give the sow a pre-farrow vaccine too. This will help prevent scours in newborn pigs. Most of these vaccines include E. coli, Clostridium, Bordetalla and Pastuerella.
- Limit feed a couple of days out from when they're due. This will help them get back on feed better after farrowing.
- Use farrowing crates, or a small pen with rails around the outside, to protect the pigs. Do not farrow on shavings – use straw instead. Hendrickson says, some shavings have an anti-coagulate that will make baby pigs' umbilical cords bleed.
- Use a heat source like a pad or a lamp. Keep the sow comfortable and the farrowing house at 70-degrees. Make sure there is plenty of air movement, and if it's hot, let water drip on the sow. But, don't let the piglets get wet once they're born.
- Keep your local veterinarian aware of the farrow date. As a vet himself, Hendrickson says, it's better to know when a customer thinks they have a gilt that may cause a problem so they can be prepared.



NASR to restructure NBS® Progeny Test

After 24 years and 27 individual tests, the National Barrow Show (NBS)® Progeny Test is being discontinued in its current form. Since 1991, hundreds of purebred swine breeders have entered hogs representing all eight major breeds in this unbiased test. The NBS® Progeny Test has served as a benchmark for growth, carcass and meat quality traits among the hogs entered and breeds represented, each year. The National Association of Swine Records (NASR) would like to thank the dedicated breeders who have participated in the test throughout the years for their commitment to the improvement of the purebred swine industry.

However, the swine industry has seen major changes in the past 24 years, particularly how we raise and market hogs. Because of this, a new committee of recognized swine industry leaders has been formed to develop a new testing protocol for the NBS® Progeny Test. The goal of this committee is to develop an unbiased testing procedure that better represents the current U.S. swine industry, with a focus on lean gain and improving meat quality across the industry.

The NASR would like to thank Hormel Foods Corporation, Iowa State University and the National Pork Board for their support of the NBS® Progeny Test. Due to the restructuring of the NBS® Progeny Test, the current group of animals will be the last set evaluated with the existing program. There will be no spring test in 2016. More information will be forthcoming about future progeny tests as it becomes available.




Leonhardt is survived by three children:



If you were to ask Tommy to list the things which meant the most to him in this world, he'd likely say God, family, good friends and great livestock. And, many of his greatest passions were found right there in the Olney ag room.

His ag teacher, Herman Boone, was one of Tommy's dearest acquaintances and the man who first introduced him to livestock exhibition. In high school, Tommy was known to show some stout steers at the Texas majors, and Boone taught him the ropes.

Tommy held the halter of the Reserve Grand Champion Market Steer at Fort Worth. His steer brought \$3,000 – quite the check for the time. Boone recalls Tommy telling everyone who asked what he would do with the money. "I'll buy a ranch," he told them, and that's just what he did.

After studying at Tarleton State College, Tommy taught ag for a couple years before ranching full time. He married his wife, Ginger, and they had two children they raised on that ranch - Jeff Hilton and Gretchen Mafi.

Of course, when Jeff and Gretchen were old enough, Tommy and Ginger sent them into the show ring. Nothing the Hilton family did was half way. If the kids wanted to rodeo, then they traveled the circuit chasing buckles and titles. If their kids wanted to drive a barrow, then it would be a good one.



Tommy Hilton had a passion for breeding good livestock. It didn't matter whether it was a steer, gelding or borrow, few things got him as excited as a great one. The only things in this life that meant more than his

stock were his family and his faith.

Few things brought Tommy as much happiness as what he called the "hog hunt," or their annual search for the very best show prospects to take back to Olney. He learned some of the finer points of the hunt from Boone when he was still in school, and perfected it when he taught ag. One of their favorite "hog hunting" spots was Iowa. This is how Kirk Swanson of 4K Farms, Iowa, first met Tommy.

In 1987, Swanson recalls getting a call from fellow breeder, Bob Brown.

"He said, 'If you don't have one good enough, be honest with him. But, if you're honest with him, he will be one of the best customers you'll ever have," Swanson says.

In the fall of 1989, Swanson had a good one for Tommy. It was a barrow he thought could play hard at the Texas majors, and Swanson knew the Hilton family could feed him. Swanson made it clear he wanted this barrow to hit the ring at a major. Tommy agreed to try his very best. Little did they both

know what type of prospect Tommy would find just down the road.

Tommy stopped at Ray Hankes' that year. There he found a little blue-butt barrow.

"He called my mother and told her we bought the Houston Champion today," Jeff says. "He must be smarter than some because he fed that barrow all the way to Houston, and he was right."

So when the dust settled, Jeff had not just one good prospect in the barn, but two. At the county fair, the Swanson barrow edged out the blue-butt Hankes project. Yet, the week before Houston a distressed Tommy phoned Swanson.

"He said, 'Kirk, your barrow was 12 o'clock at county, but right now he's about 1 o'clock and the Hankes barrow is 11:30," Swanson recalls. "I told him, 'Tommy, just show your best one.' But, I have no doubt, had I wanted that barrow to go to Houston, he would have loaded him on the trailer. That's just a testimony to his integrity."

It's a good thing for the Hilton family the Hankes barrow is the one who stepped on the trailer to head

to the sift in Brenham, because he was indeed the Houston Champion. It's storied even the ring help picked out the blue barrow to win as Judge Howard Parrish evaluated the stock.

Ginger laughs as she remembers, "After the show, one of the ring help took out a piece of paper from their pocket with his number on it. Judge Howard Parrish said, 'How did you know?' and he said, 'Because when that one walked in, you bit your toothpick in two.'"

For those who are familiar with the Hilton family, they know this was the second time the Hiltons had made it to the top two in Houston. Daughter, Gretchen, had driven her Hampshire-marked barrow to Reserve Grand Champion honors in '85. Yet, Swanson didn't learn of it until traveling with Tommy to pick out pigs for his Reserve Grand Barrow. When the media crowded around to see what she would do with the money she earned from her project, she told them she would spend it on one that could win again next year.

"I don't know if they taught me or if that was just an inherited trait," she laughs. "But that is what [Dad] was really, really passionate about – giving his kids and grandkids the opportunity to be successful."

To Tommy, this translated in making ways for his family to be involved in the livestock industry, and as Jeff tells it, Tommy and Ginger could hardly wait for his daughter, Hannah, to be old enough to show. The first year Hannah stepped into the ring, they found her two good gilts. They kept one, and the family launched into breeding showpigs, which was truly a family effort.

Hannah to bring it home for him from a hospital bed on Sunday afternoon. For the past three and a half years, Tommy, the family patriarch, had battled cancer. The cancer spread despite their treatment efforts, and last July, they found a brain tumor. Tommy continued to line up breedings as the disease progressed, but on that Sunday afternoon, the Hiltons knew Tommy wished he would be joining them in Iowa, rather than lying in a hospital.

On Monday, June 1, Jeff, Jessica, Hannah and Dillon were northbound with their good, crossbred gilt in tow. The family was heading to the World Pork Expo just like Tommy would have wanted, but their thoughts were with "Papa" as they hit the highway.

They only made it about an hour before they got the call Tommy was

granddaughter, Hannah, around 2006. Dumbfounded such a win never came up in conversation in their nearly two decades of friendship; Swanson asked Tommy why he'd never mentioned it.

"He looked at me, smiled and said, 'Kirk, the real satisfaction comes from knowing you did it well," Swanson recalls.

While some can't fathom winning a major without telling anyone and everyone that would listen just what your family had accomplished, Tommy could. He's described by most as a man of few words, but profound impact.

"He was a very quiet man around most people, but he was a very kind and giving man who was a great dad and granddad to his family," Jeff says. "He had an extreme work ethic. Most people who read this won't ever know just what 'extreme' is."

By all accounts, Tommy worked hard and expected his family to do the same. The Hiltons felt if it was worth doing, it was worth doing right. Although it's yet to be determined if that trait was passed down by a product of genetics or environment – it was likely both.

Gretchen laughs when she recalls her

Tommy lined up the matings. Ginger ran the farrowing house. Jeff fed them. Jeff's wife, Jessica, became the driving force behind the show projects, helping with everything from cleaning pens to walking barrows. And of course, Hannah got all the pigs broke and ready for the ring.

"That's what [Dad] lived for was showing hogs. That's all he thought was showpigs," Jeff says. "He had high expectations of us, but as much as anything, that was strictly the one thing we did everything as a family."

Which brings us to one special gilt born at the Hilton Ranch, a painted crossbred gilt sired by Fortune out of a half-Yorkshire sow by Magic Mike. Hannah took this gilt to a jackpot show weighing about 40-50 pounds before she was turned out on a self-feeder until right before the World Pork Expo.

"Dad lined the genetics up. That one right there was a special one. She was just kind of natural," Jeff says. "That's what happens when you get the right ones lined up."

The Hilton family knew they had a good one to bring to Des Moines, and so did Tommy when he asked fading. The Hiltons turned around and headed home to be with him. When they got there, they were sadly greeted with news he'd passed.

Amid the grief and arrangements, the family had a meeting. Ginger told them they'd have the service Wednesday morning, so by Wednesday night, Jeff, Jessica, Hannah and Dillon would be on a flight bound for Des Moines – just in time to show on Thursday. So the pigs, including that good crossbred gilt, made the more than 10 hour journey to the Iowa State Fairgrounds on a friend's trailer so they'd arrive in time for check-in.

While the pigs headed north, Swanson headed south to pay homage to one of the greatest men he'd ever known and a dear friend. Swanson will tell you, Tommy's service was not only a touching tribute to a true stockman, but also a celebration of the family's faith – the very faith that sustained the Hilton family through the last three and a half years as Tommy battled cancer. Without a doubt there were some rough days and hard news, yet each and every day Tommy would tell them God was good.

As his service came to a close,

one of Tommy's dear friends, Derrell Marion, took to the podium to deliver the eulogy.

"Tommy Hilton was a great livestock man. Once in a while, you will hear the judge say something like, 'Folks, gather round, take a look in here, this one is pretty special.' You had better take a good, hard look because we won't see another one like this for quite some time," Marion concludes.

Tommy had spent most of his life finding ways to win, ways to work harder, to breed better stock, to ensure his family had the most opportunities before them. Even his favorite Bible verse, 1 Corinthians 15:57, spoke of victory as it read, "But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

The 2015 World Pork Expo shattered records. It was the largest event in history. More than 450 crossbred gilts walked across those chips, in 25 classes and five divisions all vying for one Champion Banner.

The Hilton family already had a great Expo. Their Yorkshire gilt had gotten a piece of the Top Five in her division. As Corinthians suggests, they'd sent prayers of thanksgiving upward

after a wonderful day. Yet, at 12:13 a.m., Friday morning, when the five division-winning crossbred gilts walked into the West ring, Hannah's big, sturdy, painted gilt was among them.

With Ginger, Gretchen and Gretchen's husband, Jeff Mafi, watching on a computer screen from Olney, and Jeff, Jessica and Dillon standing ringside, Hannah drove that big gilt to make her "Papa" proud.

Anyone who doubted the Hilton family found their victory in God would be silenced as Judge Seth Swenson picked up the mic.

"We have got to make these hogs right from a skeleton standpoint. We have enough power. We have enough muscle. We've got to get them looking good and feeling good as they move across the ring. There is one out here that I think is an awesome sow. The young lady that wins division five, congratulations," Swenson says, as he shakes Hannah's hand.

To Ginger, it wasn't just a win, but a culmination of everything the Hilton family, especially Tommy, had worked for. It wasn't just a banner, it was a healing experience. She texted Swanson saying she wished Tommy would have been here to see that gilt win.


Swanson simply replied, "I think he knows."


And by all accounts, those closest to Tommy, whether they called him Papa, Dad or friend, feel he was there that night, as Hannah drove the gilt he'd bred in a tribute which said more than any eulogy. It was a testimony to how hard Tommy worked to breed good livestock, but most importantly, it was a tribute to the fact the Hilton family did it together.

After a brief debate, Ginger and Gretchen hopped in their car and drove more than 700 miles to Iowa to be with the rest of the family to watch that good crossbred gilt go through the auction. Together, the family sold the Champion for \$20,000 to Mark Taulman.

With the entire family there, just like they've always been for pig shows, there was little doubt "Papa" was proud they'd brought it home for him. And there's no doubt to the family, God played a hand in one of their greatest victories with Tommy by His side.

people at Top Cut live and breathe the swine industry, and owner and veterinarian Dr. Dale Hendrickson is no exception. His earliest memory is having his playpen set up next to a Hampshire sow. He officially began raising pigs at the age of 6, and the only time he hasn't had pigs was as a student in veterinary school. One might say working with pigs is all he's ever known.

"I've been a veterinarian for 47 years now, and I've specialized in pigs for 31 of those years. My wife says I've got a pig for a brain," he laughs.

In addition to his veterinary practice, Dale owned Stoney Creek Farms, a 1,300-head sow operation, for several years. At the time Stoney Creek was in production, there was only one boar stud in the United States. Dale decided he wanted to have the second.

"We had very, very clean hogs, as far as health is concerned, and I decided the best way to add better genetics, without introducing diseases, was to buy boars and use semen instead of live hogs. So I started a boar stud," he says.

This wouldn't be just any boar stud. In one year, Stoney Creek sold more than 4,000 boars. In those days, Dale deemed a boar a great one if he could produce at least 1,000 saleable sons. He had not one but four boars that met his high standards during the three decades Stoney Creek was in operation.

Dale decided to liquidate his sow herd in early-2000 to concentrate on his veterinary practice and consultation business. But, when Top Cut Showpig Sires, based out of Hollansburg, Ohio, came up for sale, in 2009, he couldn't resist the opportunity to get back to his roots of raising pigs.

Enter Dale's nephew, Daniel. Daniel and his wife, Telynda, owned and managed Hendrickson Farms and Hoosier State Boar Stud, at that time. Dale, Daniel and a third partner purchased the animals from Ohio, integrated Daniel's boars from Hoosier State and reintroduced the boar stud as Top Cut Genetics.

Today, Top Cut houses about 50 boars and 150 sows with nearly all of the breeds represented. Dale is very proud of the way Top Cut is being run today and the staff of eight employees they have put together in the last six months. One of those employees is Tim Isler, a seasoned veteran in the boar stud business who jumped at the chance to work for Top Cut.

"With 15 years of experience in the boar stud business and a huge passion for the showpig industry, the opportunity to work for Top Cut was very exciting. Top Cut has always had a great reputation for having high-quality boars and excellent semen quality," Isler says.

As sales manager, part of Isler's job is ensuring Top Cut's reputation remains that way. Not only does he oversee semen sales and employees at the boar stud, but he also runs the lab and semen processing. He wants to make sure every customer knows when they order semen from Top Cut, it will be the highest quality and, if used properly, will settle the customer's sows.

Providing the highest quality semen to Top Cut customers is one of three pieces that make up the Top Cut Standard. Flip through the latest Top Cut Genetics Spring Sire Catalog, and intertwined with pictures of 55 different boars, you'll find the second element. "Top Cut Tips," regarding semen handling protocol, are just one of the ways the team at Top Cut tries to educate their customers. As Daniel says, if a customer is just sent semen, and they don't understand everything that goes along with breeding a sow, they'll have a much harder time being successful.

The third component of the Top Cut Standard is old-fashioned customer service. The employees and owners of Top Cut try to put themselves in

their customers' shoes and understand where they are coming from. They take time to listen to their customers and answer any questions that may arise. Regardless of the boars that come and go at the operation, the crew at Top Cut wants their reputation of sticking to that standard be what follows them through seedstock history.

With standards like Top Cut's, it only makes sense Isler's favorite part of the business is working with customers to do all he can to help them accomplish their goals.

"One of the most enjoyable aspects of the business is seeing our customers be successful and knowing we played a small part in that success," he says. on our sows and be genetically good producers we can have faith in."

Dale says, the same philosophy is applied down the road at the sow farm. On the genetic side of the sow herd, they are really trying to get the pigs back to being productive sows that will have pigs and raise them without any fuss.

"We farrowed 142 sows this spring, and we had one that had difficulty farrowing. That's what I'm the most proud of," Dale says.

Maybe the focus on productivity goes back to Dale's days on Stoney Creek Farms with sows that had to farrow unassisted or they didn't stay. Maybe it stems from Dale and Daniel doing too many cesarean sections on a takes a good picture and makes a lot of money, but does he leave a mark?"

It's hard finding a boar that will leave his mark, but Top Cut has managed to find a few of them, in Daniel's mind. One of them was Augusta, a second-place Hampshire boar at the 2010 Southwest Type Conference bred by Jerry McLemore. Not only did he make an impact in the show ring, but he made an even bigger change on the breed as far as what he left behind in the sons and grandsons being used today.

Another boar purchase Daniel is glad they made is a Yorkshire boar from Steve Cobb and Family called Untouchable. Untouchable has made a huge impact earning banners and siring winners for Top Cut customers. He has been named Premier or Reserve Premier Yorkshire Sire seven times in the last two years, and his offspring are still making names for themselves.

With boars like Untouchable leaving their mark on future generations in Farmland, Isler doesn't see Top Cut slowing down in semen sales and boars on stud anytime soon. In fact, he sees an expansion in bred gilt and showpig sales in Top Cut's future. One thing is for certain – Top Cut will always be committed to providing their customers with the high-quality semen, education and customer service that meets the Top Cut Standard.

Dale hopes the semen they're shipping out and the hogs they're raising are making advancements for the industry, but when it's all said and done, the real reason he owns Top Cut is simply because he loves the hog business.

"I tell people all the time, 'If I'm lucky, I'll die in the aisle of a hog barn or with a surgery knife in my hand,'" he says. "It's a great, fun life, between my veterinary business and the things I've been able to do in the pig business. It's just a wonderful life."

THINGS BOAR STUDS WISH YOU KNEW

the fall breeding season approaches, boar studs across the country play a major factor in getting your sows settled. Some of the top boar studs shared with us what they feel is important to know to ensure a smooth breeding process for everyone.

#1: Heat and health checks are first in line

A major factor for a successful breeding season is determining the gilts' or sows' heat cycle patterns before ordering semen, Ted Laird, Premium Blend Genetics, Indiana, says.

"Boar spray or a teaser boar are great tools to help in determining standing heat," he says.

In addition to knowing when she will be in heat, Kelton Mason, The Stud, Texas, says, it is also very important to know how many days she will be in heat.

Before the semen arrives to your place, Bill Rosenbaum, Southern Gold Sires, Indiana, says, having the necessary breeding supplies is key to a successful breeding season, along with knowing the heat cycles.

The health of your females is a large factor in achieving strong conception rates. An unsound pre-breeding vaccination plan is something that sticks out in Jon Fisher's, Prairie State Semen, Inc., Illinois, mind as a problem area. It is important to maintain good herd health status before breeding because health may potentially affect the rest of the breeding process.



#2: Discuss genetic lines and have a "Plan B"

Aside from heat monitoring and maintaining healthy females, being knowledgeable about the boars you want to purchase semen from to use in your operation is a key factor to success.


Tim Isler, Top Cut Genetics, Indiana, says, a question they get frequently is, "What boar will work best on the female?" It is the boar studs' job to describe the boars accurately to help breeders answer that question.

Laird says, knowing where you want to improve your herd is key to choosing the boars to breed to your females. Keep in mind where you would like to improve your herd and

its strongest characteristics. It will make choosing boars easier, when you determine each sow's strengths and weaknesses. It is advantageous to talk to boar stud owners about boars you would like to use and what direction you want to take your herd, Travis Platt, Upperhand Genetics, Indiana, says.

Since the semen is typically collected and shipped fresh, a "Plan B" is often necessary. The boar stud may be out of the requested semen for that day, Fisher says. So, according to Rosenbaum, having a substitute is good just in case your first choice boar is not available.

Also, Mason says, "Most of the time, there is an alternative that is bred almost identical and very similar phenotypically that you can use."

#3: Communication and knowledge of boar stud is key

With anything, good communication is imperative for success. First, talk to boar stud owners about their operations.

Fisher advises, to talk to them about their health status, lab equipment, semen processing and analysis and how they handle semen when it is shipped. These details will help you feel more

confident about the product you are purchasing and create a good reputation for the boar stud.

"There are a million suppliers of semen in today's industry," he says. "Some have spent millions of dollars on boars and just pennies on lab equipment."

Quality semen comes from good boars plus good lab equipment. Most boar studs hold their semen quality to very high standards to create a reputable business. At Upperhand Genetics and Hi Point Genetics, Illinois, they use the semen from their boars, and if it is not good enough to use on their sows then it is not good enough to use anywhere else.

Fisher and Platt agree ordering semen from a reliable boar stud will lead to a better breeding season. When you purchase from a reputable company, it will help both you and the boar stud. You will receive quality semen and settle your females, and they will gain a loyal customer.

#4: The importance of a good physical address

With the relatively short lifespan of boar semen, your physical address can play a role in the shelf life.

A good physical address will allow the package to arrive in a timely manner. It will allow you to keep on your breeding schedule. A reliable phone number is important in case something happens during the shipping process to notify you. Mike Miller, Hi Point Genetics, says, most boar studs utilize the United Parcel Service (UPS). It is beneficial to get to know the driver and the local hub as well as have a phone number saved in your contacts for the hub.

Mason says, they typically try to ship every box Next Day Air. They do this to ensure the earliest arrival time available, but it does depend where the semen is being shipped to. Some boar studs allow you to pick up your order if you are close enough and would like to drive to get the semen.

When you do choose a boar stud to order from, calling on a non-collection day is best because things will be less hectic around the boar stud, Mason says.

"We need breeders to know what collection day they want to order semen from," Mason says. "As with most boar studs, our standard collection days are Monday and Thursday of each week."

Other information you will need before you call are the dates the semen is needed, what boars you are looking at, the number of doses of each boar you would like and billing, shipping and credit card information. All of this information should be conveyed before collection day.

#5: Proper storage and handling is imperative



There are a couple of common themes between all the boar studs when asked about storage. Miller says to use it right away for the best results. An ideal storage location would be a cool, dark location with a temperature between 60-65 degrees Fahrenheit, if it does need stored. Get it out of the UPS box as quickly as possible and placed in your cooling system, Platt says.

The best method to store semen is in a semen cooler. There are alternatives if you do not have one, though. Fisher says, a Styrofoam box with a thermometer inserted in the side of box, on the basement floor is another method. This allows you to continually monitor the temperature without opening the box and exposing it to excessive heat. Isler also says, to avoid letting it have access to direct sunlight. Rosenbaum and Isler also agree, incorrect storage techniques are common.

When it comes to the debate about

rotating the semen bottles, there are different opinions. Laird and Isler say, they would recommend rotating the bottle twice a day gently. But, some are starting to move away from that practice.

"We are now using extenders that don't need to be rotated," Miller says. "Try to keep the semen at proper temperature, and don't expose it to anything until you are ready to breed. But, that goes back to my first point – use it!"

#6: Timing is everything

The timing of having the semen available and having the sow in standing heat at the same time is paramount to having bred females, Miller says. If you are planning to use overrun or less costly semen, order extra as this serves as a precaution if you miss the timing, if she stands longer or if you are breeding over a weekend.

Laird says, being patient and making sure the female is in standing heat is a critical factor. Swelling alone is not an accurate indication a female is ready to breed and can lead to breeding too early in the cycle. That can result in a female still in standing heat with no semen to breed her.

When it is time to breed, Mason recommends breeding gilts 12 hours after the first time you detect standing heat, and again 24 hours later. For sows, breed them with the first dose 24 hours after the first sign of standing heat, and again 24 hours after the first breeding. But, each female is unique. So, pay attention to her specific trends and habits to cater to her heat cycles the most effectively.

Laird recommends to order semen as soon as you know the female's cycle if you have a specific boar in mind. Another problem that sticks out in Fisher's mind is breeders get impatient and "squeeze" the semen bottle in the female instead of letting the female's uterine contractions move the semen.

Avoiding these common problems can lead to not only a better breeding season but better business revenue for you, the breeder.

"With the tight farrowing windows we have in our industry for certain shows, the opportunity cost of not getting litters at the desired times is huge," Fisher says.

#7: Trust the boar stud; they are there for you

The predominant take-away message boar studs want you to know is they are there to help you and want you to ask questions.

"We want customers to have confidence in our product, know we stand behind it," Miller says. "Making customers successful and profitable is the best way to make repeat customers. And, that makes our job easier."

While 100 percent conception rate is not always realistic, the team at Hi Point encourages you to call so they can work with you and your herd.

Premium Blend Genetics is also ready to answer any questions you may have to help you through the entire process. Their first priority is to settle your females.

For the industry to grow, beginners have to be exposed to great experiences when breeding sows. This is one reason Prairie State focuses on a positive experience for all of their customers.

Top Cut Genetics also wants to generate a positive experience for their customers during what they consider a hectic time of year for all involved.

For Platt, one thing he finds is people have a tendency to blame the boar stud when their females do not settle the first time. There could be other factors affecting the conception rates in the breeders' programs. Since they do use their own boars at Upperhand Genetics on their own sows, he wants only the best semen for every single sow their boars breed so customers are successful.

Mason says every boar stud depends on the success of their breeders in the area of conception rate, proper mating decisions and marketing. Like the rest, he encourages you to call to talk to his crew about any questions.

"Along with the belief that all boar studs strive to send out high quality semen, I think we should all remember that it takes quality semen, that is shipped and handled correctly, stored properly, administered effectively at the appropriate time and all conditions with the female to be right for conception to occur," Mason says.







Durocs continue to be the strongest breed going, and the Summer Type Conference (STC) in Louisville, Kentucky, was no different. The quality of reds in the National Junior Summer Spectacular (NJSS) was phenomenal, and that certainly carried over to the open show.

I want to first thank the crew from Black Hawk East Community College for their excellent help. In my time with the NSR, they are easily the best crew we have had a chance to work with. I would also like to thank the NJSA Junior Board members for all of their assistance. Those kids bust their tails all week long, and when they had free time, they were willing to still step in and help out during the open show activities. Thank you all for your great help! Blane Olson and Jon Althaus, thank you for a professional and thorough job of sorting through a great set of Duroc breeding hogs. Kevin Wendt, once again, your professionalism and wisdom were much appreciated in selling a great set of hogs.

This year's Premier Duroc Sire was All Shook Up, owned by Crossroads Genetics and Robin Ridge Farms. He was also the Champion Duroc Boar at STC a year ago. The Reserve Premier Duroc Sire was Impeccable at Upperhand Genetics. He was also the Champion Duroc Boar at the World Pork Expo (WPX) a year ago. These red hogs that show up and go through the sales breed on.

Each year in our junior show, if a young person has a Grand or Reserve Champion Gilt they are given the option to slide right to the top of the sale order without having to show their gilt again the second day. This year, Bridget Halat chose to do that with her Champion Duroc Gilt and Reserve Grand Champion Gilt Overall in the junior gilt show, and man, did it pay off. This young lady set a new Duroc gilt world record by selling her gilt to Meeker Durocs for \$27,000. Congratulations to all involved on an awesome red female.

Let's start out by talking about an awesome set of red females. Class 1 was led off by junior exhibitor Blake Danner and his daughter of Astroid, the popular Thompson boar from STC a year ago. This gal had a really big chest and blade coupled with a back shape that is hard to find in red hogs along with a big rib cage. Blake's gilt was purchased to be a herd

builder by Joey and Luke Johnson of Ohio.

Class 2 was loaded with good, red females. The class winner was shown by Jada Johnson, and what a female she was. One doesn't have to look very hard to see the impact females from Jada's grandpa, Guy Jackson, have had within the red breed. This one was not much different. She was so refined and feminine with a hair coat that exuded quality. She was a daughter of All Shook Up and offered the same flexibility her daddy offered. Jacey and Joslyn Snyder made a great purchase here for \$7,500. Travis Hamilton was second in class with a really popular daughter of Playmaker. This gilt was said by some to have been good enough to win the youngest division of the junior show. She was really sound and functional, and she looked to be the barrow-making kind. Jake, Emma and Max Davis purchased a gem for \$400. Aubrey Doherty drove her daughter of Light 'Em Up into third-place status. She was good looking and flexible with a great hip and hind leg. This one was as feminine and up headed as they come. Blake and Macy Wehmeier bought this one for \$2,600 and will make her

I really liked the Class 3 winner of Justin Wallace's and so did her new buyer, Shipley Swine Genetics, at \$5,000. This one had a really heads-up look and was great in her body shape and design. She will be an easy one to breed, and if I was guessing, might get a pen to herself to make a show winner.

Shalyn McCorkle won Class 4 with a daughter of Off Label 15-3. This pale-skinned female was really good designed and up-headed with a tremendous build. She had such a good look and looks like the right kind to make great ones. Newcastle Genetics made a great purchase here.

Dylan Cain won Class 5 with a daughter of Slats that looked like a brood sow. This gal was tall fronted and really big bodied with a huge rib cage. Norman Brothers made a wise purchase here and will probably make a champion boar out of this one.

gear that was second to none. Bates Show Pigs bought this one at \$3,500 and will make her pay in one pig crop. Cale Dyson was second in class with a daughter of Firestorm that sold to Blake and Macy Wehmeier. This gal had a great design and was really tall fronted. She had a little extra muscle and was really wide and powerful from end to end.

Class 7 was where our Champion Duroc Gilt came from. She was shown by Ashlynn Peugh, of Texas, and had extra muscle and power while being as wide and opened up as any in the show. She had a lot of the extras it takes to make a potential great one. She was a daughter of Shameless at Crossroads Genetics and had lots of value. She will be headed back home to do it all over again. Second in this good class was the O'Neal Family of Indiana. They drove a daughter of Impeccable that had a tremendous build and rib cage and balanced up really

well. She looked like a true breeding piece and will get a shot at Tres Amigos.

The oldest and last class of the day was stout. Spencer Malcolm drove a daughter of All Shook Up to classwinning status, and man, was she powerful. This gal was as big up high as any in the show. She maintained tremendous width from top to bottom and end to end while handling it really well. The Malcolm crew chose to hold on to this one and give her a shot at home. Patrick Arkfeld was second in class with one of the really different females in the drive. She was one of the few that was able to get her head in the air naturally and handle a hind leg with absolutely no hesitation. Tall fronted and extended, this one will be heard from again as the Norman crew loaded her on their trailer to go home. Nelson Brothers was in next with a daughter of

Big Wheels. She maybe had as big of a rib cage and midsection as any female in the drive. She had big, square, even toes and was really big legged. She looked like she could generate and will get an honest chance at her new home. Seth and Derek Warren made a tremendous purebred purchase. Thanks, guys.

The boar show was next and was really good. I have made a comment to a few others that we might not see a crazy money red boar for a while, and I may be wrong, but I think there are as many good, red breeding pieces around the country now as there have been for a long time. Class 1 was won by one of the really good Duroc programs in the country – Nathan Weisinger. You don't have to look very hard to find his NWEI herd prefix in many of the winning pedigrees today. Nathan's youngest class winner ended up being the high seller at \$41,000 to Lean Value Sires. A son of Generator that was heavy boned, he was really opened up and handled it really well. All toes pointed straight forward, and he was really clean jointed and flexible. Look for this one to be heard from.

Ryan and Tyler Knight won Class 2 with a son of All Shook Up. This rascal was square from top to bottom and had a huge blade and chest. He stood tall fronted and was really balanced. He will go to work for Kilmer Swine Farm.

Jordan Schippert drove the winner of Class 3. This young man had a really good week in the junior show and topped it off with a red boar that had a lot of fans. This son of Cherry Bomb was big in lots of areas. He had a tremendous amount of bone and had one of the bigger skulls, blades and backs of any in the show. This one looked like the kind that could make some changes, if someone was willing to reach out and be serious about making some changes. Prairie State Semen Supply will give you every chance in the world for you to do so as they loaded him and took him to stud.

Class 4 is where the Norman littermates made some noise.

These three boars were mates to one vou will read about in the crossbred report also. The class winner and eventual Champion Duroc Boar was a really interesting breeding hog. He had huge feet and a really flexible skeleton. This guy was really tall fronted and elevated with tremendous extension on both ends of his skeleton, which allowed this rascal to function with very little flaw. Premium Blend Genetics bought this one at \$30,000. His mate was second in class and another mate was fifth. These sons of Slats all resembled each other really well. Their mommy was a favorite of many a year ago when she was Reserve, and I am sure she also played an important role in the popularity of these young boars. Shipley bought the second-place boar and Sharrett bought the fifth-place boar. Both are headed to Ohio and will have a

very important role at their new home.

Lance Ryan won Class 5 with a son of Royalty that was extremely heavy boned and tall shouldered. This guy was a littermate to the record-selling NJSS Reserve Grand Champion Gilt Overall and Champion Duroc. They were both very similar and complimented each other very well. Kyle and Laura Baade are the Ryan boar's new owners. Big Papa's Show Pigs were next in class with a son of Red Bull back on the Iconic female of Huinker's that won the open show a year ago. This dude was really intriguing and had as many fans hop him up the night before as any. He could go and was still big bladed and big backed. We would all love to drive a barrow that looked like this one, and he sold to the heart of barrow country. Hofschulte Sires is his new owner and will put this one to good use. Barnett and Stephens were in next with a really intriguing son of Impeccable. This dude was big centered and had tremendous shape and look. He will go work alongside daddy at Upperhand Genetics.

The clones caused some excitement in Class 6. Day, Guyer

David Martin split the clones and was second in class with a son of Dust Storm, last year's Champion Duroc Boar at Indiana. You talk about a goodlooking and good-legged one – this one was it. Lean Value may have gotten the steal of the day in this cocky-looking, easy-striding boar. The other clone that ended up third in class was purchased by Triple B Sires of Oklahoma. He was another

one that needed to go to barrow country and got a great home. Heavy boned, big bladed, big topped and as much mass and bulk as any in the show, this one might have been in general the stoutest-featured hog of the show. It will be fun to see these guys work.

Thompson Brothers won the last class with a son of Red Bull that was athletic and ready to go to work. He had a tremendous attitude, great running gear and just needed a chance to prove his worth and value.

Another Summer Type Conference (STC) has come and gone, and yet again, we had a quality Hampshire show. First off, I want to thank Kent Bennington, Indiana, for doing a very professional job lining up the Hampshire show. It's always fun to listen and watch Kent judge a show and give his opinions.

This year's Premier Hampshire Sire was AAHH3 Outlaw 27-3, owned by Shaffer's Goldrush and Peters Hamps and Showpigs in Indiana. JLM3 Time Traveler 16-1, owned by George and Mike Watson, Indiana, was awarded Reserve Premier Sire. Congratulations to all firms involved.

Kent sorted four classes of Hampshire boars, this year. There were not a ton of numbers but some really interesting breeding hogs in the lineup. This year's Champion Hampshire Boar, entry number 23-1, was a JZP3 Tongue Tied 14-1 back on a JM Jack Knife 3-5. He was the Mike Johnson and Guy Jackson entry from Warren, Indiana. As Kent talked this boar in class, he was a hog that is not only a notch bigger in his kind, but one that still has plenty of power on the upper side of his skeleton. Then, when you take him to the ground, he plants and handles the surface with flex and ease. From the side, he is tall fronted and good designed. He's one that reads like he can fix a lot of problems in terms of angles and design. He's one that had lots of friends on sale day, as well. Upperhand Genetics, Indiana, is the new owner. Be sure to look this guy up when making your breeding decisions.

The Reserve Champion Hampshire Boar came from the Mark Long and Ryan Bell partnership in Ohio. A son of BKW3 Real Tree 28-1 out of an ABRC8 Unreal 2-1 dam, 142-1 was a boar that hit me as a moderate, power house of a hog. From any angle you studied him, he was powerful with great big bone, forearm and skull. When you get on top of him, his rib cage came out of his blade big and powerful and set the foundation for him to be big and impressive up high. This guy has a true shot to make powerful barrows and gilts alike. Parkinson Farms, Mississippi, will put him to use. It'll be interesting to see what they can get done with him.

Autrey Show Pigs, Indiana, brought a really good set of

boars to Louisville, this year. Their Class 1 winner was entry 41-1, a GWM4 Silencer 9-4 out of a JDB2 TCG Predecessor 14-3 daughter. He was the kind of hog that has the ability to combine the balance and design we all seek, with stout and powerful running gear and plenty of muscle. Judge Bennington talked him as one that had the kind of skeleton that can drive for days and never give out. He's good looking from the side and blows you away when you get on top of him. A January boar who was so big at his blade and remarkable in terms of top shape and hip, he was another one who had lots of friends on Saturday. Taulman Showpigs, Indiana, got this guy bought. Check him out if you're in the need of power and look.

Autrey Show Pigs also won Class 2 with entry number 41-2, a son of RAFD4 Prototype 3-1 out of a WMFS2 LVS Consensus 58-8 sow. This boar was one that had the right pieces to cover a lot of sows and contribute to the next generation. One that isn't really out there in any one area, but has all the bases covered. When he first drove out of the pen, this guy was tall shouldered, good looking and the angles to his skeleton read right. He drove with flex to his hock and got his hind leg back behind him. He's a good-bodied hog who still has plenty of muscle. Purple Power Boar Stud got this guy gathered up on Saturday. Be sure to look him up, if you need to work on design and build.

Steve and Derek Earnhart, Indiana, won Class 4 with a BOLN3 Point Maker 72-7 out of a JSE0 Make My Day 28-2 sow. Derek drove one of the more intriguing boars at the show. From his blade back, this guy was a truck. He had a great big center body and rib cage with a giant top laid in him. I was very impressed, when the hog drove away, for as much power as this guy had, his length of hip, pin set and hock design were very good. I called him a rugged breeding hog who needs used where you can use him. Contact Real McCoy Genetics, Ohio, about this guy.

This year's Champion Hampshire Gilt was exhibited by Kallie Brattain, Indiana. Kallie's gilt had quite the week in Louisville. She was named the Reserve Champion Hampshire Gilt in the National Junior Summer Spectacular (NJSS) and

5th-Overall NJSS Gilt. The Brattain family decided to show her again on Friday, and she won Grand Champion Hampshire Gilt honors in the STC Show. Congratulations to the Brattain family on their successes with this BOLN3 Point Maker 90-1 x JDSP1 Titleist 3-7 gilt. Kallie's gilt got the attention of not only Judge Bennington, but also the whole crowd on Friday. Nearly flawless in her build, she was a great-designed gilt who tied her neck way high on her blade. Then, even more so, this gilt was able to combine so much body and power in a feminine and attractive package. She was a tremendous gilt for whom the Brattain family was rewarded for on Saturday. This gilt set a new Hampshire gilt record when she brought \$37,100 and went to Platt Showpigs, Indiana.

This year's Reserve Champion Hampshire Gilt was entry 3215-10 belonging to Sydney Cain, Iowa. She was a JL3 Score 14-8 out of a EC0 My Turn 84-5. The Score boar has been doing a good job for the Cain crew, and this gilt was more evidence of that. When this gilt drove right at you, she was so wide and powerful through her chest. Her blade was set out wide on her body, and she proportioned back with so much mass and dimension. Then, when you stepped back, she was tall shouldered and good looking. Cody and Rex Smith, Indi-

ana, will put her back into the herd they are building up.

The Nofziger entry won the first class of Hampshire gilts. This class-winner was a GWM4 Game Face 12-2 on an EBM0 Bushwood 6-2 sow. She was a February gilt whose skeleton read right and correct. Her feet and legs went the right direction and flexed in all her joints. This gilt studied like a February gilt should – immature in her makeup and correct in her build.

Justin Michael, Ohio, showed the Class 2 winner with a daughter of RYAM Causin' Trouble 16-7. This is another gilt who wasn't extreme in any one area but simply correct in so many ways. She had a good, natural head carriage, was square at her knee and good on her feet and legs.

As I reflect the sale and show at STC, it was further evidence of how the double-entered junior gilts have such tremendous value, and people are excited about making better Hampshire. Thanks again to Col. Kevin Wendt, Ohio, for continuing to sell the Belted Breed; it is always a pleasure to work with you. There is continuing to be so much demand and excitement. We just need to keep making them better, and the rest will take care of itself.



After the unforgettable show and million dollar sale at the 2014 Summer Type Conference (STC), the "Mother Breed" had a tall order to fill. While an exact replication of the historic 2014 STC was not expected, most would still agree quality ran just as deep at this year's STC. Garry Childs, Pelham, Georgia, had the honor of sorting through this exciting set, and what a fantastic job he did. Thanks again, Garry. It was a pleasure and privilege to work with you.

This year's Premier Sire at the 2015 NSR STC was none other than the boar who shattered the record a year ago, CDNO4 In Control 3-7, owned by Moyer's Genetic Edge and Reynolds Farms, Ohio. The Reserve Premier Sire went to one that is no stranger to show ring success, HACO2 TCG Untouchable 153-6, owned by Top Cut Genetics, Indiana, and Steve Cobb and Family, Arkansas. Congratulations to both firms on a great STC.

Leading off this powerful set of Yorkshires was the Champion Boar entry and Class 2 winner exhibited by Showtime Sires from Newark, Illinois. This son of PDS4 Don't Stop Believin' 12-5 projected the look of his sire by being tall fronted, extended up front and still nearly flawless in the way he is put together. The unique thing about this guy is he accompanies all this by being powerful up high and heavy structured, while still being awesome in his joints and up on his toes. Congratulations to Shipley Swine Genetics and Chris Holton, Ohio, for their purchase of this exciting breeding piece for \$77,000.

The Reserve Champion Boar was exhibited by Randal and Terrell Buck, Oklahoma. This son of CDNO4 In Control 3-7 packed all the power you will ever need, yet he is still basic in his build, square coming and going and has the length of body to make competitive barrows. Young NJSA exhibitor, Travis Hamilton, Colorado, came away with what may have been the best buy of the entire day. This guy was loaded up and moved west for the price of \$3,200.

Next in the ring came the Class 4 winning entry from Lorenzen Farms, Illinois. He was sired by NBS3 Wheelhouse 42-1, the \$45,000 STC entry from the Norman Brothers, Illinois, a year ago. This boar really intrigued me. Not only is he an outcross pedigree to a lot of the popular Yorkshire lines, but he possesses the qualities that can definitely be utilized by the

breed. This guy was up on his pasterns and tall shouldered, yet read with the ideal slope and curvature to his front skeleton. Add to all that his look up front and power from behind, I imagine Crossroads Genetics and Robin Ridge Farms are very excited to take him home to Indiana, for the price of \$40,000.

The outlier of the show was the Class 5 winner from Grant Giese, Wisconsin, who was up next for auction. When I think about this boar, the word "changer" comes to mind. Sired by RIY3 Bone Buzz 87-7, this guy was extreme in a lot of areas where Yorkshires could use some help. His heaviness of structure, square build, flexible skeleton and up-headed look made him the different one of the day and gained him a lot of friends come sale time. Shipley Swine Genetics, Ohio, added another unique stud to their elite Yorkshire line up for the price of \$50,000.

Winning Class 3 and next into the sale ring was the entry from Ava and Ali Genter, Ohio. Another unique son of the Premier Sire, he looks to be a real breeding boar. This rugged, stout-featured boar studied extra bold and pliable in his center cavity, and read with the durable build that could make him ideal for producing Yorkshire replacements. Thanks again, Crossroads Genetics, Indiana, for their \$11,000 purchase.

The next boar in the ring came from the firm that created much of the excitement a year ago. The Hoge Family, Illinois, drove their CDNO4 In Control 3-7 son in, and as you might expect, this boar was as stout featured as they come. In terms of skull, foot size and having an extra big blade and forearm, this one was really fun to study. Lean Value Sires got a great buy, paying \$5,200 to take him home.

Then came the boar a lot of people were excited about. The entry from Doug Stewart, out of RIY3 Bone Buzz 87-7, had some pieces that were so different for a Yorkshire. This boar has as much bone you can put in one without compromising structure. Judge Garry Childs said it best when he called this guy "an extreme breeding piece." He topped the sale at this year's STC, selling for \$95,000, and will stand alongside his sire at Moyer's Genetic Edge, Ohio.

While this year's Yorkshire boars did not garner any recordbreaking prices, I think almost everyone who stood ringside would agree the quality and depth did not drop off any in the

2015 set. Everyone was so amped up after last year's sale, saying those boars would take Yorkshires to the next level. While their impact has certainly been felt here in their first sire group, I must say this year's set has an equal opportunity to do the same. It truly is an exciting time for the "Mother Breed!"

Following the boars was an outstanding set of gilts led off by the NJSA Foundation Female donated by Kevin Ricker of Ricker Showpigs, Ohio. Talk about an awesome breeding piece! This gilt was extreme in terms of bone, yet built so correct from every angle. She came equipped with as much power up high as she did underneath and highlighted it with

a feminine look. Coming from a proven firm like Kevin's, I have no doubt this young prospect will be a cornerstone female in Travis Hamilton's breeding program, who bought her for \$15,000. Congratulations, Travis, and thanks again to Kevin Ricker and his family for parting with this outstanding female.

Next came the Grand Champion Gilt Overall in the Junior Show, exhibited by Kayla Baker. When this daughter of ABD3 Dress to Kill 1-3 hit the ring, she looked every bit like a champion – perfectly built and powerful from every view with a show ring look. Judges Jay and Will Winter named her Grand Champion Overall and liked her well enough, they felt she needed to find her home in Lubbock, Texas. A bid of \$26,000 did just that for WinTex Farms.

Champion Open Show Gilt and Class 9 winner was exhibited by Maisie Langholff, Wisconsin. This MJFF4 White Rhino 7-3 daughter was powerful, good built and read with a really maternal look. This great female sold to TKO Genetics, Oklahoma, for \$5,500.

The Reserve Champion Open Show Gilt followed the eventual champion in class and was exhibited by Abigail Arvin, Indiana. Much like her predecessor, this gilt looked like a brood sow with the extra power and show ring presence. She sold to Fred Ripberger for \$4,500.

Jacey and Joslyn Snyder drove their gilts to top honors in Classes 1 and 3. Both are sired by the popular \$145,000 NBRP3 Not Even Close 41-2, housed at Shipley Swine Genetics, Ohio. These gilts looked every bit like their sire in terms of design, flexibility and power. This pair sold together, going for \$2,700 and \$2,000 to Brock Herren, Oklahoma, and Shannon and Shala Watson, Georgia, respectively.

Also out of Class 3 came the gilt entry from Morgan Cox. Sired by ABD4 Chunk 22-1, this gilt was so impressive driving at you, being opened through her chest and blade, and continued this trend as you studied her from behind. Power was prevalent in this mating, as this gilt's littermate boar sold to Upperhand Genetics, Indiana, for \$10,000 from DJ Sanders. The gilt herself sold to Final Drive Genetics for the price of \$6,000.

Class 2 was arguably the toughest class of the day, and that is where the gilts exhibited by Sydney and Trenna Cherney came out of. Winning the class was Sydney's impressive daughter of TREF3 Mr. Wonderful 71-1. She looked like a female and was built right on both ends of her skeleton, justifying a \$1,100 investment. Trenna's equally impressive female was bred identical to the champion boar, and resembled many of those similar traits to her sire which propelled her to bring \$13,000. Both of these outstanding replacements will find a home at Fred Ripberger's place in Illinois.

Michaela Turner and Abby Taylor of Indiana went first

and second in Class 7 of the Yorkshire gilt show, both exhibiting daughters of RIY3 Ricochet 32-4. This pair of eye-catching gilts offered some really intriguing pieces in terms of head carriage and front skeleton assembly. They sold for \$3,500 and \$4,000 to Eddie Meers, Illinois, and Final Drive Genetics, Indiana, respectively.

The Robinson sisters from Missouri, drove their pair of OBC3 Thor 4-2 gilts to the top of Class 8. Once again, another powerful set of replacements that have all the basics to make the next generation easy to sell and sure to be competitive at any level. DS&K Farms, The Preston Girls, Illinois, bought the class winner for \$1,750, and John Tangeman Family Farms, Ohio, purchased the other for \$1,000.

Kyle Real's gilt was the winner of Class 4. Sired by APRL2 The Duke 1-1, this gilt used her square, correct build to top the class. She should serve as a nice replacement for Tim King, West Virginia.

Topping Class 5 was the entry from Keri Landry. This soft-centered, productive-appearing daughter of RNSP3 The Godfather 4-6 read with a really maternal look from the side. Ashley Inmon, Alabama, came away with this great buy.

Taking the top spot in Class 6 was Ryan Michael with his MYLS3 The Wait's Over 1-2 gilt. Much like the other gilts preceding her, she possessed the functional skeleton and maternal look that is a timeless attribute of a Yorkshire female. She sold to George Abell, Maryland.

What a great show and sale the 2015 STC boasted for the Yorkshire breed. The dedication and drive of the breeders to continually improve Yorkshires was evident at this year's show. As a Yorkshire enthusiast myself, I am excited to be a part of the industry right now and all I can say is: breeders, keep up the good work! Lastly, a special thank you goes to auctioneer and Yorkshire legend, Mr. Dan Baker. It is with great honor and privilege to say I was able to help alongside while you sold Yorkshire hogs for the final time in Louisville, and it was a great way to close out the 2015 STC.

If you are looking to add power and not sacrifice show ring look, call Shaffer's Goldrush, Albany, Indiana. They paid \$20,000 to take this one home.

Reserve honors went to Cooper and Flash of Batesville, Indiana; their boar is sired by Angel Dust. I was a big fan of this guy. Some of you may not like his color, but it doesn't matter. He is a good hog that has the ability to make the next generation better. You just have to be careful how you use him. He has a killer look from the side. He's tall fronted, ideal in terms of length of body and has an awesome rear leg. He is square and correct on both ends of his skeleton and can motor around the ring. He is not the most powerful hog in the barn, but he's good looking, square built and sound. Complete hogs still win the majority of shows. Sharrett Family Farms of Sabina, Ohio, made a great buy; they loaded him on their trailer for \$8,000.

Next in the ring was the entry from Lambright Show Pigs of Shipshewana, Indiana, with a son of It's All Good. This one's mother was the Champion Hampshire Gilt from the 2014 World Pork Expo (WPX) that Makenzie Standlee showed and Heimer Hampshires raised. It looks like this Walk This Way

sow is doing a good job for the Lambright crew. This guy was a beast, a raw power hog, that had a huge top and scanned a 10.7 LEA. However, he was still sound and functional on his feet and legs and had a good look from the profile. Brent Bolen of Chrisman, Illinois, paid \$30,000 to take him home, making him the top-selling crossbred and proving that purebreds can make great additions in a crossbred program.

Up next was the entry from Midwest Genetics of Glenwood, Iowa, Steve brought a littermate to his popular boar he showed at the 2015 WPX. He is sired by Trigger and out of Suzanne (Monumental's mother). This guy is heavier structured and probably a rib shorter bodied than his brother. He still is tall fronted, level designed and has a great look from the side. He placed second in Class 5 behind the champion. Tom Moyer and Family of Wauseon, Ohio, will put him to work for the price of \$3,200.

The winning entry from Class 2 was next in the ring, exhibited by Huinker Durocs, Ltd., of Decorah, Iowa. John's boar is sired by Specimen 11-1, who is a Speechless son that is doing a great job – just one more example of purebreds adding consistency and predictability to a crossbred program. John's boar is square at his knee, wide in his chest floor and square and correct in his center body. He is tall shouldered, level down his top and has a wide upper hip and square hock. Top Cut Genetics of Farmland, Indiana, added him to their lineup of cross boars for \$12,000.

Barney Family Farms of Whitehouse, Ohio, drove the winning entry from Class 3. He is sired by Young Gun and out

of a Super Monster sow. This guy is correct in his design and sound. He's strong footed, tall shouldered and big bodied. He is not way out there in any area, but he's also the kind that will not get you into any trouble. He sold to Walker Showpigs of Michigantown, Indiana, for \$1,500.

The last boar I am going to talk about is a purebred entry that was short on his underline on one side. Norman Brothers and Ripberger of Sidell, Illinois, had an awesome litter sired by CAIN4 Slats 1-3 and out of the \$18,000 Challenger gilt they bought at the 2014 STC. This guy was one of four boars they sold in Louisville out of that litter. When I visited the farm the week before the show, this one was my favorite. He has big, square, even toes, big legs and is square built. The stoutness of skull combined with length of neck and look through his front two-thirds is hard to make in red boars. He looks like a modern-day show hog from the side and has a hip and hind leg that will help the red breed. You figure out which littermate fits best in your program. If this guy is the one, call Crossroads Genetics and Robin Ridge Farms to book semen. They paid \$29,000 to take him home.

I want to give a huge thank you to everyone who helped make the 2015 STC a huge success. Col. Dan Baker, it is always an honor to have you on the block! We may not have set any records in the crossbred show, but the hogs were complete and deep. Keep up the hard work of making them better. See you all at the state fairs.

When asked about the best he has ever seen, Jay Winter, owner of WinTex Farms Lubbock, Texas, could not choose just one. First a boar named "Tonnage" was a true stand-out, in Winter's mind, for his time. After an attempt to buy him privately before National Barrow Show (NBS®), WinTex purchased the 1984 NBS Hog College Boar® for \$13,000. The boar was bred by Jerry Brink, Iowa. He sired the Reserve Champion Hampshire Barrow at NBS® the following year. But, his most memorable son was a boar named "Reach" WinTex decided to retain in Lubbock, Texas. Winter says, he was a sire they built their herd around for many years. They also kept 80 Hampshire daughters sired by Tonnage.

"Visually, he was one of the first Hamps, I can remember, that was moderate in elevation and had ideal body shape," Winter says. In addition, his flexibilty, rib shape and great hip design were carried onto his daughters and gave WinTex a new foundation for the next generation of Hampshire hogs.

His second pick was a Hampshire-marked barrow shown by Trevor Kirkpatrick, in 2007, at the Fayette County Fair, Ohio. He was later named Grand Champion Barrow of the show. He was bred by Steve Malcolm, Indiana, and sired by Tap Out.
