



One of a kind

NJSA board member Bryan Rodibaugh titled an article he contributed for the January 2002 *Seedstock EDGE* "One of a kind." This article was correctly titled, as it described Robin Lucas and all she has contributed to the purebred swine industry.

Visiting other breed offices, they are always amazed by this time table and ask how that is accomplished.

Robin became more involved in the accounting activities at NSR, over the years, and was instrumental in the conversion from the DOS financial system to the Quick-Books program, a few years ago. But, she realized the importance of a better financial system for the NSR and its members. The benefits from this system are contributing to the success of your association.

On a personal note, Robin, I am going to miss our discussions over lunch. I appreciated your input and sound advice you shared with me during a few tough times. Most of all, thanks for being a friend.

Enjoy your time with your family, and always remember, you are loved by your other family, the purebred swine industry. You are truly one of a kind.

As the farrowing season begins, it is important to review farrowing procedures and the necessary supplies for the task. The supplies needed for farrowing are as follows:

Oxytocin: This is a medication that should be used to help deliver baby pigs by stimulating rhythmic uterine contractions. No more than a 1/2 mL should be used at a time and only if a pig is not present at the canal. Too much Oxytocin given either too frequently or at too high of a dose can cause the uterus to spasm.

Lutalyse: This medication is used to induce sows into labor. This should never be given prior to 113 days of gestation, as the piglets may not be fully formed.

Pig pulling snare: This is used to help pull baby pigs that are stuck in the pelvic canal.

OB lube and OB gloves: The use of lube and gloves is important because the hair and skin of the arm is abrasive. This causes damage to the vaginal walls and can lead to increased infections and/or bleeding.

Common issues that arise during farrowing include pigs that are positioned poorly at birth and a pig that is too big for the pelvis. In the case of malposition, the pigs are most commonly coming toward the pelvic canal with back legs folded forward and the tail-end/back against the pelvic wall. This can be fixed by pushing the animal back into the uterus and the back legs unfolded to be easily pulled out. A pig that is too large for the pelvis of the animal is much more difficult and typically has a less favorable outcome. It may be required to have a veterinarian, and a caesarean section may need to be performed.

In the case of a potential c-section it is extremely important to decide to do this before there is too much internal damage from trying to pull the pigs. Damage to the uterus can make a potential c-section far less likely to save both the sow and babies. A good rule of thumb is if you can't get your hand through the pelvis and a pig is too large, stop and call your vet.

After farrowing, if assistance is needed, an antibiotic treatment may be required. The babies should be hand dried with a towel and placed under the heat lamp. If farrowing on shavings, be sure to tie the umbilical cord about an inch from the navel to prevent the animal from bleeding out.

The most common complication for the sow post-farrowing is a uterine infection, known as metritis. This can be determined by monitoring the sow's feed intake and observing her vulva for signs of discharge. If the sow goes off feed or starts having discharge within five days of farrowing, she should be treated with an antibiotic and an anti-inflammatory.

The baby pigs should be treated with 100 mg of iron and an antibiotic within the first 24 hours and then again one week later. This treats infection in the umbilical cords, which could ultimately lead to umbilical hernias. The iron provides a supplement so that the fast-growing pigs have an iron supply for blood cell formation.

Pork producers react to Subway's antibiotics policy

The National Pork Producer's Council (NPPC) and the Pork Checkoff have released a letter on behalf of American pork producers that details the industry's stance on antibiotic use. The letter reads as follows.

Dear Subway Management Team and Franchisee Owners:

Any policy decision to eliminate antibiotics from your protein supply sources – poultry, pork and beef – would be a significant departure from what many other food companies are doing in regards to improving responsible antibiotic use. This policy decision could put our food system in jeopardy.

We share the opinion that everyone needs to do their part to use antibiotics responsibly – and reduce the antibiotic resistance threat. This includes quickly phasing out any use of medically important antibiotics (to treat human illness) for growth promotion in farm animals as well as increasing veterinarian oversight, which are actions that farmers and ranchers are already taking.

We believe a move to NO antibiotics of any kind – Subway's position – could leave livestock without access to animal health medicines and could result in the unnecessary suffering or death of such animals.

Subway is not saying "no" just to those antibiotics used in human medicine. Subway isn't saying "use antibiotics only when animals are sick." Subway is saying no antibiotics ever – even when animal health and safety could be at risk. We think that such a policy could compromise the safety of our food system. Sick animals in the food system are not a good idea. Healthy animals help farmers produce safe food.

How will a hog farmer react to a fast-moving disease outbreak that could have been prevented with medicine administered in time? The potential for thousands of animals to unnecessarily die or suffer is a real possibility. These are the consequences that farmers will have to face.

We should all leave open the ability to use antibiotics responsibly when animals are sick or at risk of getting sick. On the best managed ranch or farm, animals can get sick, just as people can get sick in the cleanest and best run households. We believe that insisting on absolutely no antibiotics ignores best practices established by veterinarians, the pork industry and individual farmers who have a direct interest in the welfare of their animals.

Some interest groups may applaud your policy decision. Will those same groups stand with you if large populations of livestock are adversely affected by your new policy?

An opportunity for meaningful input from the national pork industry associations, who represent farmers who care for animals day and night, could have been helpful to you prior to your policy announcement. Continuous improvement makes sense.** Please remain open-minded to the view that banning all antibiotic use is simply not the answer.

We stand ready to engage in a dialogue with you.

Robin, we need you."

The first time Robin Lucas heard those words from the late Glenn Conatser he was asking her to come work for the American Yorkshire Club (AYC) full time. They were six months behind verifying pedigrees and in desperate need of help. Lucas agreed, thinking she was only filling in until they got caught up.

The second time Conatser told Lucas the AYC needed her was three years later when she was thinking about leaving to stay home and raise her children. Conatser knew there was something special about her, so he asked her to stay.

"Glenn had so much confidence in me when I was just getting started," Lucas says. "That's the main reason I'm still here."

Lucas has seen many changes since she started full time, in August 1980, as a Yorkshire pedigree verifier. Every day was spent marking lines on pedigree applications for the typist to fill in and checking data for accuracy and spelling. Individual pedigrees were typed on memory typewriters. Books of pedigrees were filed, ear notch cards were created, membership cards were confirmed and maintenance fees were updated each time a litter was registered.

In 1983, the pedigree system was moved to computers and Conatser promoted Lucas to Yorkshire Secretary. Although she had no formal training with computers, Lucas was willing to learn and quickly adapted. Lisa Kennedy, National Swine Registry (NSR) administrative assistant and Lucas' sister-in-

law, says this was just one of many times when Lucas took on a new task and wouldn't give up until she figured it out.

"That's something I learned from Robin – never give up. She's given me the confidence that I can do what I need to do to be successful," Kennedy says.

Dan Baker, auctioneer, says, Lucas' willingness to learn and change contributed to her long, successful career.

"Robin has probably seen more dynamic change than any of us, from the standpoint of going from manual typewriters to computers. She was involved in a lot of the changes at our conferences. The most important time of her career is when the breeds consolidated," he says.

There is no doubt in Baker's mind the transition from AYC to NSR would have been much more chaotic if it hadn't been for Lucas. Randy Bowman, associate director of genetics and multiplication for The Maschhoffs, agrees with Baker.

"I think she deserves a lot of credit for being the cornerstone and stabalizing voice for breeders through thick and thin at the Yorkshire Club and into the transition to NSR," Bowman says. Bowman describes Lucas as a quiet leader. He recalls when he worked with the AYC as managing editor of the *Yorkshire Journal* everyone in the office respected her and went to her with any question they had. Breeders did the same.

"Breeders went to Robin because they knew they were going to get a straight answer from her," Bowman says. "And, she treated them all the same, whether they were the largest recorder we had or the smallest."

Treating people fairly is something Lucas learned while working for the AYC.

"I learned how to be an adult, respect others and accept all people through my years working here," she says. "Everybody's got good in them, but everybody's a little different. Instead of fighting it, you learn how to accept it and work with it."

Randy Shipley of Newark, Ohio, will invariably ask for Lucas, when he calls the office, because he knows he will be treated fairly, and he just enjoys the friendship they have formed over the years.

"With Robin, we feel so com-

fortable talking with her. I just admire her calmness and general demeanor," Shipley says.

Lucas also had a calming effect on some of Baker's more chaotic moments when he was the advertising coordinator for the Seedstock EDGE. He recalls one evening he was working late in the pedigree system to find some information for an ad. All of a sudden, red boxes and warning signs started flashing on the screen. Baker was sure he had wiped out the entire pedigree history of the NSR. In a panic, he finally got a hold of Lucas, who told him to just shut off the computer and go home. She assured him everything would be fine in the morning. Sure enough, it was. When Baker opened the office door the

next morning it was business as usual.

"As much as anything, Robin taught me about patience. Just being around her gives me an element of peace," Baker says.

Lucas' calmness and patience are two things Jim Grimm from Maynard, Iowa, appreciates most about her. Watching her work with breeders at Yorkshire Type Conferences, NSR shows and his own sale taught Grimm to stay calm in every situation.

"She doesn't ever seem like she's upset," Grimm says. "When things are going wrong, some people panic. Robin just seems like she is still under control and makes calm decisions. I have never once seen Robin get excited, when there's a problem. That

doesn't mean she doesn't care; it just means she's going to figure it out."

Shipley trusts Lucas to figure out any problem when he calls the NSR office.

"Some people, when you call them with a problem, and you hang up, it's still your problem. With Robin, if you call her, you don't have to call back," he says. "I know it will be solved, and I can move on to the next thing."

Solving problems for breeders is what kept Lucas coming back to work every day for 35 years. She enjoys every time she is able to relieve a breeder's concern and reassure them their big problem is really no problem at all. She is also the best person in the office to go to with a problem because she has seen it all. Lucas started at the bottom with filing, worked her way up into the pedigree department and then became the office manager. She understands every aspect of the business, so she is able to answer any question breeders have.

She has also enjoyed seeing kids that have participated in NJSA or been NSR interns go on to be part of the industry. There have been times Lucas wasn't sure the breed associations would go on. When it came to that point, something else always popped up to keep them going, partly due to the influence of the young people Lucas watched grow up and bring new ideas to the industry.

Lucas has also tried to pass on a few lessons to the interns she has worked with.

"I've tried to teach the kids their rewards in life come from hard work,

doing things right and fairly, and taking care of others. I just can't see winning something I didn't do myself or do right," she says. "I hope, I am that kind of person. I hope, I have done the job honestly and to the best of my ability."

Grimm would say Lucas has done the job to the best of her ability, and then some.

"She is one of the most honest, dedicated people I know," he says. "With Robin, it hasn't ever been about what she's getting paid. For her, the reward is getting things done and seeing the breeders and association succeed."

While Lucas has been committed to serving the breeders, her family has always come first. Kennedy respects Lucas most for that.

"She's managed to work for 35 years, more than 40 hours most weeks, raise three awesome daughters and never miss one of their events. She's done it all and never once complained," Kennedy says.

Working at the NSR office, while raising her girls, gave Lucas a unique opportunity she will always be grateful for. Each of her daughters worked in the office in some capacity, which allowed Lucas to train them for what the work force was like. Lucas was able to give her daughters insight into the working world while working alongside them, something most mothers are not able to do.

Kennedy recalls the first time she met Lucas was when Frank, Kennedy's brother, brought her home for dinner. This was the first girl Frank had ever brought home for a family dinner, so Kennedy and her mother knew there was something special about Lucas.

Frank and Robin were married in 1975. Aside from her mother, Frank has been one of the biggest influences in Lucas' life. They've grown up together, been each other's sounding boards and raised three daughters who have gone on to have good families of their own. To Lucas, raising her family was just like working at the NSR.

"It all goes back to that honesty thing and doing your best," she says. "Raising a family is just like everything else. It's a job you take a lot of pride in, and you want it to turn out well. I

Kyle Baade always dreamed of owning his own purebred seedstock operation. But, even at a young age, he realized it was a lofty goal. After all, it takes money to make money in agriculture. Land, facilities, genetics and feed all cost money, and he didn't even have two

nickels to rub together. Baade decided to pursue a career in veterinary medicine instead.

With all paths pointing toward vet school, an unexpected opportunity landed in his

lap, which would change his course

and help him reach his dreams.

hile Baade was dreaming of a seemingly unattainable life raising pigs, John Penner, owner of Penner Genetics, and his wife, Zella, were thinking about what they would do with their purebred seedstock business they'd built for nearly four decades. The Penners had not only raised Hampshire hogs on their 160-acre farm in Plymouth, Nebraska, but they'd raised a family. With their two girls having little interest in returning to the operation, the couple

wondered what they would do

his family landed him in Plymouth for his junior year of high school. Diving into his new high school's vocational agricultural program, Baade was asked to be one of four students who worked the Penner Genetics showpig sale, and he was ecstatic.

Even though Baade had spent most of his life in Iowa, he was familiar with the Penner name. The first memory he has of a Hampshire hog is three boars his father purchased from Penner.

"To this day, my dad says the daughters sired by those boars were the best he'd ever raised," he says.

Baade was impressed to meet the one and only John Penner, who he had heard so much about.

"I was just awestruck because here was Mr. John Penner. I called him 'Mr. Penner,' and he just laughed and told me to call him 'John,'" he laughs.

Little known to Baade, Penner was equally impressed at that sale. He recalls telling Zella about the boy who'd helped from the local high school.

"[The ag instructor] sent four guys, and they started helping with the sale. But it was obvious there was one of the boys that was extremely interested in

pigs, knew how to handle them and saw them well. I came home and told Zella there was one guy there that just really knew his stuff," Penner says.

What impressed him the most with Baade was not necessarily his skills with swine – though they were apparent – but rather, Baade's ability to easily interact with people at the sale.

"Here's a young man that says he has had a passion for raising Hampshires since he was 3-years-old, but it was more about him working with people," Penner explains.

Helping with Penner's pig sale became an annual event for Baade. He helped through his high school While it may seem sudden or even rash, for Penner to think of handing the reins of an operation he spent four decades building to some boy he'd met at his pig sale, for the Penner family, this wasn't a new idea. In fact, Penner and Zella had discussed several times, not necessarily retiring, but what the future of their farm would hold. Their own children weren't interested in taking over Penner Genetics, but the couple wanted to see a young family working together to raise their children on the farm just like they did.

"We are not doing this to try to promote Penner Genetics and Penner Hampshires. We had a great run with be fortunate enough to get here."

Even though this was always Baade's dream, don't think it didn't require a large leap of faith. Baade's dad was one of the people that encouraged him to take the leap.

"He said, 'You're young enough, if it doesn't work out, you can always start over. But if you don't try you will always regret it," Baade recalls.

So after graduating SDSU in December 2009, Baade returned to Plymouth. But, he didn't move straight to the helm of the operation. Instead, he worked

career and even his first two years of college as he pursued his general education classes at a local community college. When Baade was interning at an equine reproduction facility in California as part of his third year of college, he got a call from Penner.

"John called in March to see if I would help with the pig sale, not knowing I was in California," Baade says. "Then, he wanted to know if I would be interested in a summer internship, after I finished my internship in California. Before I left in August, he wanted to know if I had any interest in coming back to the farm and taking over his program."

By the end of that summer, before heading to South Dakota State University to finish his education, Baade made the decision to formally change his major from large animal vet science to animal science. that. We were relatively successful. We met a lot of good people, and we still have a lot of good friends. What we are trying to do is to allow a young person to have the same opportunities we had – to build his own operation. We are trying to pass on an opportunity rather than a legacy," Penner says. "Zella and I talked at one time, if you can picture in your mind a young couple on the farm raising kids that would be the most ideal thing we could view, and that is starting to happen."

Baade, to Penners, seemed to be just the young person they'd been searching for, and the dream he barely dared to even wish for was suddenly in grasp.

"If you would have asked me 10 years ago where I would be today, this isn't what I would have said," Baade says. "This is where I would have liked to have been, but I just didn't think there was any way I could

alongside Penner for three years. He learned the ins and outs of the operation as they discussed different ways the farm could be transferred, pushed pencils, made cash flow charts and amassed piles and piles of paperwork Baade could use to apply for a beginning farmers loan.

"We had three years to put the plans into place," Penner says. "We visited with some financial people, some attorneys, and we looked at different loan options."

To Baade, the financial side of the transition was the most challenging. As a young person right out of college, everyone wanted to loan Baade money, until they saw the lack of collateral needed to purchase the house and 10

acres with the hog operation. So, he looked toward government programs and beginning farmers loans. The piles of paperwork needed not only provided ample time for Baade and Penner to work side by side, but it also gave the duo plenty of time to understand the value of the operation and how best to proceed with the transition.

"If you want someone to take over your operation with a mindset on genetic improvement, it needs to be priced accordingly and realistically so that young person can succeed," Baade says.

Penner had no misgivings in the department. Although he had invested money in the last decade to improve his swine facility, he knew it was still too small scaled to be of value to larger, commercial swine producers.

"To find someone who was interested in doing what we do with genetics was pretty special," Penner says. "And I see several operations around the country, where I'm sure young people would be interested in doing just that."

In 2013, after countless sit downs, with Baade, Penner, Zella and Baade's new bride of one year, Laura, the crew was finally ready to make the move and finalize financing, only to hit yet another paperwork roadblock with the beginning farmer loans. Rather than keep going that direction, the couple borrowed money from both Farm Credit Services and Penner himself.

While those three years of pencil pushing proved frustrating to Baade from a financial aspect, they were invaluable to him as he prepared to take over the operation.

"The ability for us to work together has been crucial for the success of the transition," Baade says.

Penner would agree. His goal over the three years they worked toward the transition was not to tell Baade how it should be done, but rather let Baade figure out his own place within the industry.


"Sometimes you learn better by making mistakes. You try to guide and help, but it is always best not to be too overbearing. I just did everything based upon the fact I knew he was the best person to take over this operation," Penner says. "There are no guarantees in life. There is no guarantee they will make it."

Baade knows Baade Genetics isn't a sure thing. He will tell you if you're not scared to take on such a venture, then you aren't taking it seriously enough. Yet, he knows he has a strong supporting cast. His wife, Laura, their families, and Penner and Zella were all

essential to creating Baade Genetics.

No doubt this experience has united two families that were once strangers by creating a bond over a passion for livestock. Penner says, Baade and Laura have become another set of children to them, and Baade will tell you he'd take a bullet for Penner. Both couples' dreams came true through each other. The Penners look at the farm they worked for decades and see another young couple having the opportunity to raise their children on the farm, and the Baade family wakes up each day to a life they dreamed about.

EXPLANATION OF TERMS:

Expected Progeny Difference (EPD) – An EPD is the best estimate of a sire's or dam's genetic worth, given the information available. It is the actual <u>difference</u> in performance a producer can <u>expect</u> from future <u>progeny</u> of a sire or dam, relative to the future progeny of an average tested parent.

Swine Testing and Genetic Evaluation System (STAGES™) – A genetic evaluation system provided to the members of the four breed associations of the National Swine Registry (NSR). STAGES™ utilizes performance records for numerous growth, carcass and maternal measures to predict the genetic value of each pig and its parents.

EPDs:

Backfat (BF): Expressed in inches, this EPD is a predictor of the difference in external fat thickness at the 10th rib. Animals with negative (-) EPDs for backfat will produce offspring that have less backfat at harvest than offspring of parents with higher EPDs.

Pounds of Lean (LBS): A genetic predictor of pounds of fat-free lean adjusted to a 185-pound carcass, or approximately a 250-pound live weight. This EPD is calculated from the EPDs for Backfat and Loin Eye Area. A sire with a positive (+) EPD for LBS will produce offspring that yield a higher percentage of lean and have a greater chance of obtaining full value on a lean-based carcass grid.

Days to 250 pounds (DAYS): A prediction of an individual's genetic merit for growth performance to a 250-pound live weight. Animals with a negative (-) EPD for DAYS will produce offspring that require fewer days to reach market weight when compared to the offspring of individuals with positive (+) genetic values for DAYS. Selection on this EPD will produce progeny that aid in earlier building close outs.

Feed Efficiency (FE): Expressed in pounds, this EPD is a predictor of the amount of feed required to generate one pound of gain during the finishing phase of production and is calculated from the EPDs for BF and DAYS. Selection of sires with negative (-) EPDs will produce progeny that more efficiently convert feed to gain when compared to sires with higher EPDs for FE. This EPD can be used to genetically decrease feed costs.

Number Born Alive (NBA): An expression of the genetic merit for the number of live pigs farrowed in a litter. Daughters of sires with positive (+) EPDs for NBA will farrow a greater number of live pigs than daughters of sires with lower EPDs for NBA.

Number Weaned (NW): A genetic predictor of the total number of pigs weaned within a given parity. Daughters of sires with positive (+) EPDs for NW will wean larger litters than daughters of sires with lower genetic values for NW.

Loin Eye Area (LEA): Expressed in square inches, this EPD is a predictor of an individual's genetic merit for 10th rib loin eye area adjusted to a 250-pound live weight. Animals with a positive (+) EPD for LEA will produce progeny with more loin muscle when compared to the offspring of animals with negative (-) genetic values for LEA.

Wean to Estrus Interval (WTE): Expressed in days, this EPD is a genetic predictor of the number of days required for a female to return to a serviceable heat after weaning. Daughters of sires with negative (-) EPDs for WTE will require fewer days to return to estrus after weaning than daughters of sires with higher EPDs. This EPD is the most efficient selection tool for genetic improvement of fertility and non-productive sow days.

Sow Productivity Index (SPI): An economic index that ranks individuals for reproductive traits. SPI weights the EPDs for Number Born Alive, Number Weaned and Litter Weight relative to their economic values. Each point of SPI represents \$1 per litter produced by every daughter of a sire. When sow efficiency is the primary concern, SPI may be the most effective selection tool for simultaneous improvement of maternal traits.

Maternal Line Index (MLI): An economic index designed for selection of seedstock used to produce replacement gilts for crossbreeding programs. MLI weights EPDs for both terminal and maternal traits relative to their economic values, with approximately twice as much emphasis on reproductive traits relative to post-weaning traits. Each point of MLI represents \$1 per litter produced by every daughter of a sire.

Terminal Sire Index (TSI): An economic index designed for the selection of seedstock for use in a terminal crossbreeding program. Animals selected for high TSI are designed to excel in lean growth and efficiency from weaning to harvest. TSI weights EPDs for Backfat, Days to 250 Pounds, Pounds of Lean, and feed/pound of gain relative to their economic values. Each additional index point difference is equal to \$0.10 per market hog.

Actual Data:

Weight Per Day of Age (Wda): Based on actual weight and age, this measure is the weight gained per day of age averaged over the life of the pig.

10th Rib Backfat (Bf): Expressed in inches, this is an actual ultrasound measure of backfat at the 10th rib and is adjusted to 250 pounds.

Loin Eye Area (Lea): Expressed in square inches, this is the actual ultrasound measurement of the loin eye size at the 10th rib and is adjusted to 250 pounds.

Intramuscular Fat (Imf): Expressed as a percentage, this value is an ultrasound measure of the lipid content of the loin muscle. Higher levels of Intramuscular Fat (IMF) are desired for meat quality based markets.

Actual Number Born Alive (Nba): This value is the actual number of pigs born from the dam's parity when the pig was born and are measurements taken from the pig's dam.


Actual Number Weaned (Nw): This value is the actual number of pigs weaned from the dam's parity when the pig was born and are measurements taken from the pig's dam.

Litter Weight (Lwt): This is the actual cumulative weight of all pigs weaned from the pigs birth litter. This weight is recorded on the pig's dam and is adjusted to 21 days of lactation.

FOOD ANIMAL VETERINARIAN:

OVERVIEW:

Food Animal Veterinarians are responsible for the care of animals that are raised for food production and human consumption. They provide medical care consisting of research, diagnoses and prevention.

WHAT EDUCATION AND TRAINING IS REQUIRED?

A doctorate of Veterinary Medicine is required. A bachelor's degree in animal science, biology, chemistry, animal nutrition, zoology or other related majors is required before being accepted to a doctoral program.

TO PURSUE A CAREER AS A VETERINARIAN:

The following high school courses are recommended: agricultural education, a focus on sciences such as animal science and biology, chemistry, physical science and mathematics.

TYPICAL EMPLOYERS:

Employed by food production companies, governmental agencies, and some university research farms.

FUTURE JOB MARKET OUTLOOK:

The future outlook for Food Animal Veterinarians is expected to be good.




