





From the Field

It's not about you

Rick Warren's best-seller, "The Purpose Driven Life," is a book that changed my life. I still remember where I was when I read the very first line in the book I received as a gift from my mom stating, "It's not about you." Since then, I have often recalled this short, simple reminder that has the ability to put all things back into perspective.

It's very easy to get consumed in the day-to-day grind and focus on problems, particularly those that involve our jobs. One of the main concerns I hear in my role with the National Swine Registry (NSR) revolves around hog "type." Although I'm not about to dive into a type discussion in this editorial, I do think there is a more important question to be answered than what is the ideal hog type. I think we need to ask ourselves, "What is the purpose of a hog show in 2016?"


Some people may have a hard time answering this question, while others will passionately tell you their thoughts on the subject. Traditionally, livestock shows were established as a way to showcase animals for evaluation, while comparing them to industry and breed standards and selecting for superior phenotypic traits. In the case of swine shows, the integration of the industry, along with changes in production methods, have certainly impacted how the modern-day pork industry utilizes the show ring. Right or wrong, for a number of reasons, the overwhelming majority of firms who are strictly involved in commodity pork production have limited interest in hogs being exhibited at shows, in 2016. However, several members of the NSR have stayed committed to the production of commercially-focused, purebred seedstock, while successfully serving domestic and international customers. Consequently, it would appear the primary focus of swine shows in the modern era is to serve as a platform for youth development.

During our recent Long Range Strategic Plan meeting, in June, with Kevin Ochsner, one member of the task force made a very impactful statement. Due to the current scope of modern pork production, it is more feasible for young people to become involved in raising showpigs compared to trying to establish a sustainable, commodity pork production system. The fact is, fewer and fewer young people have had the opportunity to grow up in production agriculture. This is not their fault; it's a simple fact. So, for those who have a burning desire to raise livestock, hog shows provide an avenue to merchandise animals as youth projects. And, if youth development is the number one goal of the show ring in 2016, it's time to revisit Rick Warren's statement, "It's not about you."

It's not about the breeder. It's about the young person the breeder has an opportunity to impact for the better. It's not about the parents. It's about family and teaching your children to do the right thing. Finally, it's not about the showpig. It's about using the showpig as a tool to educate young people on the swine industry, while cultivating skills and experiences that will benefit youth in whatever they pursue down the road. Now, more than ever before, integrity, honesty and work ethic are at a premium. If it's not about you, then keep perspective on what it really is all about.



Seizing opportunities

Thank you to everyone for giving me the opportunity to do what I love. I really enjoy traveling, evaluating and discussing good hogs with good people.

I am also thankful for the fine people I get to work with on a daily basis. From Mike Paul and Brian Arnold to the other fieldmen I talk to on a regular basis, and to all of the other employees of the National Swine Registry (NSR), I want to say thanks for their help and friendship. It makes all the long days at the shows and on the road worthwhile.

I would also like to take this opportunity to welcome Mick Bellamy to the NSR. He has hit the ground running and been an awesome addition to the field staff team.

For those of you who have not heard, the National Junior Swine Association (NJSA) members are driving the bus. 2014-2016 have been some of the most successful years in NSR history. Good pigs are in high demand from the first part of February all the way through the NSR Fall Classic. I have never seen good purebreds sell to young exhibitors and their families in such volume for outstanding prices.

The door is wide open for breeders to raise more top-quality, registered Hampshire, Duroc, Landrace and Yorkshire barrows and gilts to help satisfy the demand for purebred hogs. The great demand proves that helping promote the NJSA and other youth shows across the country is an investment to make your business more profitable.

With all of these positives, some concerns remain.

Duroc breeders need to strive to keep the breed sound. We have made great progress in the seven years I have been a fieldman. But, with the emphasis of the show ring and how quickly we can change trends, we must take care to keep Durocs balanced. Soundness and structure must be a priority, not just in red hogs but in all breeds.

Hampshire breeders must concern themselves with their shrinking genetic pool. Because of some trait selection during the last few years, some lines can only be found in frozen semen, and some lines, not at all. Don't be afraid to think outside the box and do some research and development. When selecting the gilts and barrows you are going to offer to NJSA members, please make sure they meet breed eligibility standards and have at least a six and six underline, before you offer them to the public.

Top-notch Landrace barrows and gilt are hard to locate. There is a real opportunity in this breed. Don't be afraid to add another breed to your program. Quality Landrace are easy to sell.

There are not as many productive Yorkshires as there were a few years ago. I hear stories all the time of gilts with problems cycling or with problems in the farrowing house. Some even need milk replacer to raise a litter of eight or ten pigs. It's not time to panic, only to be aware and take responsibility.

As you sit down to read this, we will be in the middle of state fair season. Many of you will be making breeding decisions for the fall and outlining a marketing plan for your summer-born litters.

Whether you are a breeder or a boar stud, it is important for your potential customers to be able to trust you. We sell more pigs over the phone and online than ever before. More and more semen goes into boxes and out the door every day, with no visual appraisal by the customer. It is extremely important we represent these hogs properly. Whether by the picture, social media, email or word of mouth, we must be honest and truthful in our approach.

Customers won't buy from someone they cannot trust. We have a good thing going in the showpig business. Let's not ruin it.

I have certainly enjoyed the last 12 months. I truly enjoy the great people I have the opportunity to work with on a daily basis. Keep up the good work, and I will see you all at the state fairs.

SWINE FINISHING FARM MANAGER

OVERVIEW:

A finishing farm manager oversees daily operations for animal livability on farm during the last phase of the grow-out stage of the pig. They are responsible for managing all aspects of the health and growth of the animal in an effective and safe manner.

WHAT EDUCATION AND TRAINING IS REQUIRED?

A bachelor's degree in animal science is preferred for this job, but it is not necessarily required. Some companies may require a high school diploma or an associate's degree in animal science or swine management.

TO PURSUE A CAREER AS A FINISHING FARM MANAGER:

The following high school courses are recommended: agricultural education, animal science, mathematics, biology and chemistry.

TYPICAL EMPLOYERS:

A finishing farm manager is employed by swine production farms who house and produce swine for processing.

WHAT RESPONSIBILITIES WILL I HAVE?

- Supervise farm activity
- Write and enforce biosecurity plans
- Monitor and follow up on every aspect of animal productivity
- Stay up to date on innovations and research within the industry
- Monitor animal health and behavior
- Work with veterinarian to determine treatment of sick or injured animals
- Order and arrange shipment for feed
- Daily interaction with the animals to ensure animal well-being
- Assign duties and examine work for exactness and conformance to policies and procedures
- Prepare, review and complete reports including weekly production reports, action reports, supply orders, maintenance reports, feed orders and employee time cards
- Tour all farm departments daily with supervisors
- Administer and participate in the company safety program
- Monitor ventilation and water availability in all barns

- National Pork Producer's Council
- National Pork Board

FUTURE JOB MARKET OUTLOOK:

The future outlook for a nursery or finishing farm manager will be good over the next five years.

Sharing your #RealPigFarming story on social media

According to *Brandwatch.com* there are more than 2.3 billion active social media accounts being used across the globe. That's a lot of people having conversations online, and some of those people want to learn more about what happens on today's pig farms.

The Pork Checkoff's social media outreach program, #RealPigFarming, helps pig farmers, veterinarians, academics, youth and allied industry members answer those questions by sharing stories about today's pig farming. The hashtag (#) before RealPigFarming helps people search social media posts with the same phrase.

"Choosing to tell the story of #RealPigFarming through social networks helps bring consumers and the pork industry together in a way that wasn't possible just a few years ago," says Lexi Marek, National Junior Swine Association (NJSA) Junior Board member from Iowa. "Through online images and videos, we can tell our story in many different ways."

Since the start of the social media campaign in July 2014, there have been almost 40,000 positive posts using #RealPigFarming. The online community continues to grow, and the Pork Checkoff encourages everyone involved in the pork industry to share their stories on social media.

If you want to get started in sharing your #RealPi-gFarming story online, here are a five tips from the Pork Checkoff.

1. START WITH ONE SOCIAL MEDIA PLATFORM.

With so many different social media platforms available, sharing your story online can quickly become overwhelming. Pick one and become comfortable sharing your #RealPigFarming story on that platform. Once you are comfortable with one platform, start adding new platforms, if you want.

2. HAVE A CONVERSATION.

People trust people. And to get people to trust you, they need to know who you are. This comes by having a conversation with someone and learning who they are and their concerns. Get to know who you are talking to, listen to them, and then share your

#RealPigFarming story with them. And yes, this can be done in just 140 characters.

3. A PHOTO IS WORTH 1,000 WORDS.

Photos and videos from farms help open the barn door on social media. It's not always possible to host farm tours on every farm. But, good photos and videos directly from the farm with a story behind them go a long way in showing consumers how today's pig farming works.

4. THINK BEFORE YOU POST.

It's important to remember that people who don't have a pig farming background might not always understand standard industry practices. Sometimes a well-intentioned post could have negative consequences. This means you should always think twice before pushing post. For example, while a C-section may happen on a pig farm, it's probably not appropriate to post photos of that procedure in the social media space. If you see a post from someone else you think could be misinterpreted by someone outside the industry, tell them. Hopefully they will take your advice and remove the post.

5. STAY ABOVE THE FRAY.

When someone online says something negative about the pork industry, it can be hard not to take it as a personal attack. If someone is being negative online, state the positive, and kindly excuse yourself from the conversation. You might not be able to change their mind, but there are others who are watching how you react to that person. If you remain positive, they are more than likely going to trust you and what you say over the negative person.

"I've enjoyed being able to share my #RealPigFarming story online," Marek says. "I've been able to make connections and have real conversations about what really goes on in barns today, and that is important for the future of the pork industry."

Funeral services for Jerry Leon McLemore, 80, of Chickasha, Oklahoma, were held on July 8, 2016, in the Ferguson Funeral Home Chapel with John Freeman officiating.





he barn Rosenbaum transformed was part of the farm he purchased from his great uncle, in 1991. Back then, Rosenbaum had a farrow-to-finish operation with 300 sows. When hog prices fell in the late-'90s, he knew he had to make some adjustments. He couldn't keep running the operation as it was, but he wasn't quite ready to give up on the swine industry. So, he changed to a farrow-to-wean operation and kept 15 sows to raise club pigs.

The only constant is change, and times started changing in the industry again. Rosenbaum knew he had to reassess his operation one more time if he wanted to make it in the business. As much as he enjoyed raising showpigs, he felt a need to contribute to the industry at a higher level. It was then he began tossing around the idea of opening a boar stud in southern Indiana. In June of 2012, Southern Gold Sires was born.

It's no surprise Rosenbaum went to the Shaffer family for advice on his new adventure. He and Terry Shaffer have known each other for 30 years. The Rosenbaum family purchased breeding stock and semen from the firm in Albany, Indiana. Over the years, they have watched each other's kids grow up, and Rosenbaum counts Shaffer as a mentor and great friend.

"Terry is the one who helped me get started in the business," he says. "He has taught me many things about the boar stud business, and I am truly grateful to have him in my life."

Another mentor of his is George Watson in Kentucky.

"George is a man I have always looked up to, not only as one of the greatest breeders of all time, but also as a great man. I have always admired George for his knowledge of pedigrees and his memory of them. This guy has been a true inspiration in my life and in the lives of many others in the business," Rosenbaum says.

Today, Southern Gold Sires is a family-owned boar stud with one fulltime employee. They house around 35 boars and farrow 12 to 15 sows twice a year. They have Duroc, Yorkshire, Hampshire and crossbred sows bred strictly for showpigs. When it comes to selecting a boar or replacement female, soundness and structure are at the top of Rosenbaum's list. He will also examine the bloodlines, because he believes the bottom side of the pedigree is just as important as the top. Only after he is satisfied with those qualities will he look for the most difficult combination to find in a boar - a powerful boar with a show ring presence.

Since starting in 2012, Rosenbaum has been able to find a few of those elusive boars. One of his first purchases was the Champion Duroc Boar at the 2012 Summer Type Conference (STC) in Louisville, Kentucky. Before the sale, he and his wife, Alisa, decided how much they were willing to spend. He wrote on a piece of paper, "Champion

Duroc Boar \$5,000 to \$6,000." As the bidding on the boar was slowing down, he found himself with the high bid at \$5,500. But, before the gavel fell former National Swine Registry (NSR) Fieldman Ralph Doak made one of his famous speeches. Shaffer leaned over to Rosenbaum and whispered, "That boar is going to go sky high now." To everyone's surprise, not another person bid after Doak's speech, and Rosenbaum left Louisville with the red boar they would name Mammoth.

"To this day, my wife and I say he was meant to be in our stud, and the good Lord has blessed us tremendously with him," Rosenbaum says.

Mammoth went on to sire two state fair champion gilts, the Champion Duroc Boar at the 2014 Winter Type Conference and several other champions. Rosenbaum also thinks X-Ray Vision, a crossbred he purchased online as a 2-month-old baby, and Up the Limit, the Champion Yorkshire Boar at the 2016 Winter Type Conference, will prove to be good investments for Southern Gold Sires.

But, when asked what he's most proud of, Rosenbaum won't rattle off a list of boars he purchased or titles his hogs have won. Instead, he'll talk about his family.

"I am most proud of the fact I was able to raise my family on a farm, and I am able to share my passions with them. By far, my fondest memories are all the evenings spent in the backyard with the kids when they were getting

their pigs ready for the county fair and national shows," Rosenbaum says.

Perhaps it was important to Rosenbaum to raise his family around livestock because of all the things he learned from a farm himself. He grew up in southern Indiana working with his brothers on their parents' cattle, swine and grain farm, as well as on both sets of grandparents' farms. He may not have appreciated at the time what his parents and grandparents tried to teach him – lessons like having faith in God, being responsible for what you have and a man is only as good as his word – but he now knows that was the best education he could have received.

Rosenbaum carried on the tradition and passed the lessons on to his kids. In his mind, there is no better way for

thing a parent can do for their child Rosenbaum considers even more valuable – spend time with them.

parents to teach their kids responsibility and a strong work ethic than giving them livestock to care for. He says, it's just as beneficial as any subject taught in school, because it will stick with them for the rest of their lives.

It's a philosophy he firmly believes in and will share with anyone who will listen. However, there is one

"I always tell the parents of kids who show livestock to enjoy every minute of it and to never be too busy to help your kids. You think it will last forever, but eventually they grow up, and the next thing you know they're no longer in the show ring," he says.

Even though his own kids are no longer showing, Rosenbaum can still be found standing ringside at most major swine shows. The people side of the business is the part he enjoys most, and going to shows lets him meet people he's only spoken to on the phone. He says, the swine industry has some of the most incredible people in the world, and he feels blessed to work in such an amazing industry.

The long hours it takes to operate a boar stud are worth it for Rosenbaum when he hears a customer won a show or did well in showmanship with a Southern Gold-bred hog. Every decision he makes in regard to Southern Gold Sires is done with the customer in mind. Rosenbaum only puts boars in stud he thinks will make future generations better and will help his customers

have success. He also provides highquality semen, because he understands how important it is to get sows settled, whether a person has one or 300.


"Believe me, I've been on the customer end of this business for 30 years. We will treat you just like we would want to be treated, because we know our success depends on your success," he says.

Putting the customer first is a principle Southern Gold Sires was founded on. It's just one of the things Rosenbaum doesn't see changing, despite how big the customer base gets or how many boars are in the stud. He plans to continue growing Southern Gold Sires, while maintaining their high standards for elite boars and quality semen.

No matter where Southern Gold Sires goes in the future, Rosenbaum is confident he made the right choice four years ago, when he transitioned from showpig producer to boar stud owner.

"Sometimes you just have to wait until the time is right and wait for an opportunity to be presented to you, because the Lord has a plan for everyone," he says. "I have no doubt in my mind this is His plan for me and my family, at this point in time."

BREEDING DECISIONS An art or a science?

Summer is almost over, which means the fall breeding season is right around the corner. As it becomes time to select boars, many breeders' problem solving techniques might be put to the test. Is there a secret formula to follow when making those mating decisions? Or are some people just breeding artists, and producing top of the line showpigs and commercial hogs is their natural talent?

Ithough there is not a Breeding 101 Manual to consult, no matter the operation, whether it is commercial or showpig, there are specific components to keep in mind when choosing a certain boar to breed that particular sow or gilt to.

Be the breeder, not just the trend chaser

Doug Stewart of Stewart's Duroc Farm, is one who knows what it takes to be a true breeder for both sides of the swine industry. Currently, Stewart has more focus on the showpig side and attends countless shows to get an idea of what genetic lines are proving to be successful.

"In my mind, true breeders need to have a goal of improving the breed; they aren't just trying to produce that champion showpig. They have other things on their mind," Stewart says. "One of the problems with the modern world is we have to raise what people want. Sometimes that may not be what you like."

While Stewart is concentrating on producing pigs that will be successful in today's show ring, he is also looking toward the future.

"I do some research and development, and I am breeding lines that are a little different, that maybe aren't winning in the show ring today. They might in five years and offer that breed something down the road," Stewart says.

On the other end of the spectrum, Director of Genetic Operations at Waldo Genetics, Nick Siedelmann, oversees the mating selections, plus the herd boar and replacement gilt selections for the operation. While working for Waldo Genetics, one challenge for Siedelmann is continuing to make advancements in a closed, small herd, while maintaining a high level of gene variation to still make progress in future generations.

"In the genetics world it's not as easy as putting everything into a program, and it spits it out and the computer tells you what to do," Siedelmann says. "You have to have foresight. You have to be able to look two or three generations down the road and figure out what you are going to have to work with. If

you only concentrate on the generation you have now, and you are just trying to make the best mating, two generations down the road you will have problems you created by doing that."

Chris Compart of Compart's Boar Store Inc., says it is important to recognize issues in your herd and make sure you are not continuing to breed those traits on.

"You don't want to propagate any problems such as hernias or genetic deformities. It's important for breeders to recognize that stuff. You want to keep the breed moving forward because we don't need to back up at all," Compart says.

At 4K Farms, owner Kirk Swanson tries to evaluate where his herd is at as far as strengths and weaknesses. He also looks at where he wants to be in the future. According to Swanson, life and breeding animals have a lot of things in common. The most common denominator is sometimes doing the most popular thing isn't always the right thing.

"Discipline of making breeding decisions long term that will satisfy your breeding ambition and goals is very important. If you always chase what is popular, I don't know if there will be very many people who have done that for a decade will have the title of being a breeder," Swanson says.

Functionality is key

"When you talk structure you are not just talking about flexibility, the looseness of structure. You are looking at the angles, the length of bones. It is a continual challenge," Swanson says.

If you want to produce the next winning show barrow, Stewart and Swanson say, first you have to produce a high-quality female to farrow that barrow.

"In my mind you will have better luck if you have the mind set of raising a champion gilt. If you have that gilt in your mind, you will be more concerned about structure," Stewart says. Swanson has found once you have a structurally correct female, that positions you to do about anything.

"Trying to identify those elite individuals who have the ability to make a positive change is a challenge," Swanson says. "There are sows who come along that are elite females. Find those and build off of them."

Although Compart's Boar Store Inc., and Waldo Genetics aren't in the business of grabbing the next champion barrow banner, build and skeletal design are important factors for sows and gilts entering farrowing crates.

"After I took over, we are a lot more critical on phenotype now.

Stewart has found this method has brought success to his own herd. Stewart does use his own boars the majority of the time, because he is more familiar with the pedigree lines behind them.

"When I use my own boars, I know how they were raised, and I know what I am going to get. I like a complete type pig," Stewart says. "I don't try to put muscle on muscle or bone on bone. If I am physically looking at an animal when I make my breeding decisions, if my sows are weak in an area I am trying to breed to a boar who is strong in that area."

Swanson asks himself certain questions about the females, when he

Before, we were very concerned with pushing indexes. We made great improvements with that, but we had issues with phenotype," Siedelmann says. "We are a lot more critical on feet and leg soundness of terminal hogs than what we used to be."

As Comparts are studying each sow based on their data, they also study the sow's build from the ground up. It doesn't matter if they are excelling data wise; if their feet and legs aren't correct, they won't hold up in the crate.

Complement your females

Across the board all operations say, the best offspring result from a complementary mating.

"As new boars come in, we get a list of the boars ready to use. We pay attention to the description on the boars, because you want to find a boar with strengths where the sow has weaknesses and put those together," Compart says.

is deciding what boar to use. Is she linebred? What are her strengths and weakness? However, Swanson will be the first to admit some of the selections made are somewhat by chance.

"The difficulty, is trying to breed a female who is too much like the barrow they want to show. With breeding, some characteristics are dominant and come through pretty easy, and some are almost recessive – power, width, spring of rib, looseness of structure and the stoutness of bone. I treat all of those like they are recessive. If you don't get them on both sides of the pedigree they will diminish," Swanson says.

Do your research

"The real interesting thing about breeding, there is not a recipe book that you can sit down and go make that cake. It is more like years taking a pinch of that and a touch of this," Swanson says.

Doing background research on the boars you are choosing may help lead to a mating that will produce the type of offspring you have been trying to achieve. Pay attention to pedigrees and ask others who have used those boars and have sows out of those lines.

"When I do go to shows I try to study what's working out there and what isn't. For example, there were a



lot of pigs last summer out of a great profiling, stout-boned boar. That boar was correct and sound. To me they were just borderline not being wide enough.

So, I used semen out of a boar from that line and I bred it to my sow who absolutely throws the widest-centered, heaviest-muscled pigs," Stewart says.


Swanson believes each breeder needs to have some type of model in their mind they think is ideal, and don't sway far from that type. Siedelmann finds having a backup plan is crucial to running any operation. If you have a boar fail or other issues you have to be able to think quickly and make the best out of a bad situation

"Each mating is like buying a ticket for a trip on a boat. When you make that mating you are going to go somewhere," Swanson says. "It is just whether you end up where you want to be."

Showpig breeders across the country are studying boar catalogs, watching state fair results and attending boar stud open houses to pick out the perfect boar to mate to their sows. When the order goes in, the boar studs have a lot of work ahead of them to deliver quality semen that will settle sows. Jon Fisher at Prairie State Semen, Inc. helps explain the process a boar stud uses to get semen from the boar to a customer's door.

PREPARATION



At Prairie State Semen, Inc. (PSSS), in Illinois, they use disposable collection bags with attached filters. Owner Jon Fisher says this helps separate the gel produced during ejaculation. They also use a two-glove concept to limit bacteria from the boar's sheath area being introduced into the collection. Collection cups are warmed up to 99 degrees Fahrenheit for at least 15 minutes pre-collection to avoid cold shock in newly-collected semen.

EQUIPMENT

A boar dummy is first and foremost the most important part of the process, according to Fisher. Ideally, the collection dummy will be in a clean/sanitized area that has been regularly disinfected. A rubber mat of some sort is also recommended to reduce the



chances for boars to slip off the dummy during collection, which can result in smaller collections and adds to boar frustration or temperament issues. The rest of the equipment is typically an insulated coffee mug to hold the collection bag, collection gloves and labels to properly identify the semen bag once it is passed through the laboratory window for processing.

DURING COLLECTION

Different collection pens are set up at PSSS, and they have realized some boars prefer certain dummies and/or pens. It is very important to keep the boar's penis at somewhat of an upward angle to keep unwanted bacteria from the sheath and hairs

from dripping down the penis into the cup. The collection process varies a great deal in time depending upon the boar, his age and the volume of semen he produces.



AFTER COLLECTION

A race against time and temperature begins from the second the collection cup is placed through the window into the laboratory. Fisher's goal is to have the semen processed within three to five minutes post collection. A semen computer is used to help with quality grades, as well as providing an accurate sperm count. After the folks at PSSS have a chance to go over the quality scores and sperm count, then they can proceed to extending the semen and determining the number of doses to prepare. Upon extending, they will do a second quality check to make sure the semen didn't get cold shock during the introduction of extender.

EXTENDING SEMEN

It is very important the extender is at the right temperature at the time of extension to avoid cold shock. PSSS uses a water bath to keep the extender at roughly 37.3 degrees Celsius, until they are ready to extend the semen.

DETERMINING SEMEN QUALITY



Fisher says, semen quality is pretty easy to determine, if you know what you are looking for. First and foremost, look at the semen to determine motility – are they progressively swimming across the microscope slide, or are they moving very slow and sluggish? After gauging motility, consider cell quality. Do the sperm cells have proximal or distal droplets? Are the sperm tails normal? Can you recognize any differences on the acrosomal ridge of the sperm head? These are the things Fisher looks for. Clumping can also contribute to fertility issues; however, if there is still some progressive motility in spite of the clumping, Fisher says his customers typically still have success settling sows.

COLLECTION STATS

At PSSS they probably average 12-14 doses per collection. They typically will have a couple of boars who only produce four to six doses at any one time, and sometimes they have boars who will average 16-20 doses. In Fisher's experience, boar studs that collect popular boars on a regular basis very seldom will have many boars who will routinely make 20 plus doses per collection.

The industry standard for collection is typically twice a week. In the studs that market semen nationally via the use of UPS and other shipping companies, collection days are typically Monday and Thursday. These days give the most time to maximize rest between collections, while allowing delivery during the business week.

SEMEN STORAGE

PSSS uses heat sealed tubes to package their semen. After the doses are sealed and individually labeled, they are transported into a dedicated "semen cooling room" that is routinely kept between 60-64 degrees Fahrenheit, depending upon the time of year and current weather conditions. While Fisher typically recommends semen be stored at 64 degrees Fahrenheit, a broader window

of 60-65 degrees will typically work for most customers who don't have a dedicated semen storage unit. He would much rather see semen at a constant temperature than in a storage situation where temperatures fluctuate wildly.



There are a number of factors Fisher has found that influence semen longevity. Initial semen quality, sperm count and type



of extender usually are the factors he feels most influence longevity. In most cases at PSSS, they feel the majority of the orders shipped out will last at least seven days, depending upon the boar. Most of the better-quality boars Fisher feels comfortable using semen up to 10 days. He says, they have had customers settle as late as day 16, but those kinds of success stories are usually rare. He cautions breeders to be wary of older semen. Even though it might still be exhibiting progressive motility, their acrosomal ridge can be denaturing and less likely to settle sows.

After the boar studs process the semen, it is ready to be shipped to the customer's door. Most studs will ship semen orders via Next Day Air. Once the semen is delivered to the customer's door, proper semen handling and AI techniques must be used to ensure the sows will settle.




Overall & Premier Duroc Breeder – Travis Hamilton, Colo.

Gregory D. Johnson Memorial Scholarship – Morgan Cox, Ind., and Matt Romoser, Iowa



This year's Premier Duroc Sire was NBRP5 He's The One 15-6, owned by Hi Point Genetics. He was also the Premier Sire at the World Pork Expo. Congratulations to the crew at Chrisman, Illinois. NWEI3 Impeccable 90-9 was the Reserve Premier Duroc Sire. This guy just keeps getting it done. Congratulations to Upperhand Genetics.

Dan Meeker's son of MEKR4 TCG World of Outlaws led off the sale on Saturday afternoon. This year's Champion Duroc Boar was out of Dan's Champion Duroc Boar at Expo last summer, and his momma was last year's record-selling gilt at STC. This one was a big, stout, heavy-muscled hog with as good a hip and hind leg as you can lay in a boar. Cain Super Sires believed in this one enough to take him back home with them for \$10,000. Good job! Give this one a try.



From the Field Blaine Evans, NSR Field Representative

If you missed out on the Hampshire show at this year's Summer Type Conference (STC), I would say you missed the excitement and momentum mounting around the Belted Breed. It was a pleasure to have Ben Moyer, Ohio, sort the Hampshires. Moyer might not have a bunch of them running around right now, but this breed is where he got his start in the business, and he still has a passion for them. Also, thanks to Justin Grinstead, Indiana, for helping him out in the ring. Justin's resume in the Hampshire ring speaks for itself. Thanks again to both these guys for doing a good job lining up the hogs, on Friday.

This year's Premier Sire for the Hampshire breed was BOLN4 Man Amongst Boys 23-3, owned by Hi Point Genetics, Illinois, and Lambright, Indiana. There has been a really good set of hogs out of this boar, and I'm sure we will be hearing more from him in the future. The Reserve Premier Sire was KORB4 All Eyes 23-7, owned by Upperhand Genetics, Indiana, and Kilmer Swine Farms, Indiana. All Eyes is the Champion Hampshire Boar from the 2015 World Pork Expo who has been doing a good job for lots of different firms across the country.

Derek Barker, Ohio, drove the Champion Hampshire Boar at this year's STC with a son of JM3 Bumpercar 2-5 and out of a BOLN1 Point Maker 118-3 sow. Derek actually purchased the mother of this boar as a bred gilt last year from the H&H Hampshires' herd in Ohio. Tons of genetic potential in this guy comes from a great group of sows, and this young man did a great job getting him ready for the hog show. This boar did a lot of things right. This is a hog with a really good pattern from the side. He was attractive up front, and his angles laid into his skeleton correctly. When this guy turned and left, he was square from his pin set to his hock, had a flexible hind leg and clean hock. His bone matched the amount of body and muscle he had and looked like one who can do a lot of good for a lot of different sows. Real McCoy of Ohio took home this good champion on Saturday. Be sure to check him out, this fall.

The Reserve Hampshire Boar, this year, was entry 8-1 from Grimm Purebreds, Iowa. A son of JLM5 Legacy 10-1

and out of a BEB3 Tiger 9-6 sow, Jim's boar was one I would call the extreme one in the lineup. In terms of rib shape, bone and muscle, this guy was out there. At first glance, his stout skull and huge forearm told the story — he was going to be one powerful boar. He didn't disappoint. When he came right at you, he was opened up at his chest and blade, and he carried that width and power into a huge rib cage and body. From behind, he was big hipped with a huge tail root, not to mention he set down with a tremendous amount of bone and giant feet. He was a neat boar to cover some sows with. Look him up at Premium Blend Genetics, Indiana, this fall.

Entry 217-2 from Mark Long and Ryan Bell, Ohio, won Class 2. We know what the Long sow herd has been able to do over the years, and the pair of boars from Long and Bell sure look like they will add to the reputation. 217-2 is a AAHH3 GRUS Outlaw 27-3 back on a GMW3 Flat Bill 1-3 sow. With all that Outlaw has accomplished the last two years, combined with the Long sow herd, the possibilities are endless with these boars. 217-2 was the one Ryan drove, and he sure did a lot of really good things. He was good footed and sound structured. From the side, the boar had a look of quality in terms of being tall fronted and longer necked. He had plenty of shape and power out of his blade and back to his hip. Top Cut, Indiana, bought this guy and will put him to work. He is one who should be on the short list when mating Hampshires, this fall.

Seth Giltsrap, Indiana, won Class 1 with a JKG5 Booted Out 14-1 x BOLN1 Point Maker 118-3. Seth's power hog was not only impressive in person, but when you talk to Seth, the sows represented in his pedigree are some real heavy hitters. Seth made this mating to line up some great females, and a stout-made, big-bodied boar was the result. This guy had barrow-like length of body and was really good in his center rib shape and body, yet still went to the ground with bone and feature. The boar had a current Hampshire kind of head that reads like a generator. Talk to Seth about this one. The sows and genetics behind him are first class.

Matthew O'Connor, Indiana, was next in the ring on sale day with entry 5279-6, a BOLN4 Man Amongst Boys 23-3 x

Representative Blaine Evans (I).

BOLN1 Point Maker 118-3. Matthew is a young man with a real passion for the Hampshire breed. He is not only starting to collect a bunch of them at his place, but he is doing a really good job getting them mated correctly and winning shows. Matt's boar, this year, represents a lot in the areas of look, design and flexibility. From the side, it is hard to make them any better. He was tall fronted and good in his top line with some extension of front and length of hip. His skeleton worked correctly, and he covered the surface with flex and ease. This boar still had more than enough in terms of muscle shape, boldness of rib and feature. Santoro Swine Genetics, Ohio, will give him a good shot with their sows. Be sure to talk to Tony when you are thinking of boars to use.

Long and Bell had another entry, 217-1, a littermate to their class winner. Mark drove 217-1 to be second in Class 2. In terms of flexibility, looseness of spine and ability to drive with comfort, this boar was as good as any, in my opinion. This boar was really attractive when you studied him from a distance, but still had plenty when you got up on him. His joints were clean, his feet were big, and he had the right angle to his pastern. Hi Point, Illinois, took him home on sale day. This is one you need to check into for sure.

Earl Cain and Family, Iowa, brought a good one to Louisville, a JLMJG5 Carry Out 7-8 x JL2 20 20 7-2. The Cain boar stood second in Class 1. Their son of Carry Out hit me as one who had a really good shot to cover lots of sows and make hogs who are tall shouldered and shorter bodied while still having muscle and plenty of rib. This guy was so good in his look and had a perfect top line with shape up high. He was square at the ground and heavy duty in his bone work. The boldness of rib and body in this boar was as good as any, and it looked like he could help out lots of people. Hi Point got him bought and will add him to their boar battery.

As we started the gilt sale, this year, we had the unique opportunity to lead off with a Hampshire Foundation Female. This year, the Foundation Female was donated by Real McCoy Genetics, Ohio. Jim and Mike certainly turned loose of a great one when they allowed us to name her one of the two Foundation Females this year, even though it took some convincing to bring them down to Louisville. When I talked with the McCoys, the only reason they would allow this to happen was because they believe in the National Junior Swine Association (NJSA) and what it teaches youth as future generations of swine producers. We can't say thank you enough to Real McCoy for donating this gilt. A huge thank you also goes to J.P. Enterprises and Malcolm Farms, Indiana, for laying out \$17,000 to take this JJG4 Raise 'Em Up 27-1 x BOLN3 Point Maker 72-7 gilt home.

Hadley Hendrickson, Indiana, won this year's STC Hampshire Open Show with a daughter of KORB4 All Eyes 23-7 and out of a BOLN3 Point Maker 90-1 sow. The mother of this sow was the record-setting gilt last year that sold at Louisville, driven by the Brattain Family, Indiana. That gilt brought \$37,100 and sold to Platt Show Pigs, Indiana. In her first litter, she raised the gilt Hadley drove to championship honors. She was made like a lot of the All Eyes hogs have been

– really attractive, cool looking from the side, long necked and stout headed. Then, from her blade back she opened up with a tremendous amount of power and mass. She was comfortable at the surface with big feet and legs. Wendt Livestock, Riley and Ethan Wendt, Ohio, added her to their sow lineup on Saturday. Good job, and good luck with your purchase.

As we often do at these shows, we had the opportunity to offer several of the elite Junior Show gilts for sale. We now allow any of the gilts in the top five of their breed on Junior Show day to bypass showing again in the open show and go toward the front of the sale order. This is a great way for NJSA members to be showcased one more time and allow them to offer their females for sale. The first person in the Hampshire division to take advantage of the opportunity at this event was Olivia Caldwell, Illinois, with her Champion Hampshire Gilt from the Junior Show. Olivia's gilt was a JLM3 Carry On 21-1 x SDF2 Peaches 9-6. The gilts at the top end of the show were so good this year, and the Caldwell gilt didn't disappoint in what a show gilt needs to look like as we move forward. She was sound structured, good looking and had the extras in terms of mass and bone to play at that level of competition. Congratulations to the Caldwell family on their success, and good luck to Ryan Stohlquist, Illinois, with his new purchase.

Bryce Jipping, Michigan, drove the Reserve Hampshire Gilt in the Open Show. A daughter of KORB4 All Eyes 23-7 and out of a EBM0 Bushwood 6-2 sow, the Jipping gilt looked like the kind of female who will keep a guy in business. She was sound structured, good designed and had a bold and pliable rib shape and body line. I appreciated her extension up front and the way she was so comfortable at the surface. This is one I think can be bred a lot of different ways and contribute to a herd. Peters Hamps & Showpigs, Indiana, will add her to their already high-quality sow herd.

John Veach, Indiana, drove a really good gilt into second place in Class 1. JKG5 Booted Out 14-1 x CFLK3 No Debate 14-5 is how her pedigree reads, and she hit me as one who would be fun to take home and find a boar to match up to. John has been raising Hampshires for a long time, and I can tell you he has built up an impressive sow herd. This gilt was good in terms of her skeleton and angles. She had the right slope to her blade and front knee. She was really square hipped and set them down square as she left. She had a neat kind of look and is one Kent Brattain and Family, Indiana, will give a good shot.

Blaine Stayton, Indiana, drove a really unique BOLN4 No Debate 18-8 x BOLN3 Point Maker 21-10 gilt. One of the more impressive gilts up front, she was really long necked and attractive headed. What continues to make her more interesting, she was shorter bodied, had spread up high and could handle it. Premium Blend Genetics, Indiana, are the new owners and have many different boars they can bred her to.

Lane Lewis, Indiana, had the class winner out of Class 3 with a JKK3 Bedlam 18-6 x MVLS1 Believe It 36-4 gilt. It is interesting how she is bred – the Bedlam boar is one I think we will continue to hear about as we move forward. Lane's gilt is one you can call complete and really functional. With a

good hip and hind leg, she looks like a lady from the side. She is good in her body and rib shape. Good luck to Mackenzie and Morgan Pierson, Indiana, with their new gilt.

Levi Carr, Georgia, drove a BOLN4 Man Amongst Boys 23-3 x DPK3 Believe It 36-4 gilt to win Class 1. Here was another high-quality, younger gilt with a neat kind of look. She was really long and extended up front with an attractive head. Yet, she was still good in her body shape and had muscle with a good kind of hip and hind leg. Andrew Frerichs, Illinois, took her home and will put her to work.

As you read down the complete results, it's easy to see this Hampshire sale really proves there is some momentum in the breed. Several different and new buyers bought some really good gilts all down the sale order, which shows the demand for Hampshires is high. We need to continue to make them and make them good. As always, special thanks to Kevin Wendt, Ohio, for doing the auctioneering duties on the Hampshires. It is always fun to work with him. Also thanks goes out to Mike Berger, Indiana, for helping in the ring all day and to our NJSA Junior Board for sticking around to help swing gates and assist in the sale. Entries were steady again this year, and the Yorkshire breeders brought us another very deep set of hogs that made for a competitive show.

Garry Childs and Phil Page of Georgia, were back again this year to sort the Yorkshire show. It's always a pleasure to have someone with Garry's background and experience to sort the show. Thank you, Garry and Phil, for doing a great job of lining up the show.

The Premier Yorkshire Sire of the 2016 STC was awarded to 1BSY5 Touch N Go 1-9, owned by Upperhand Genetics, Jack Rodibaugh and Sons and Ricker Yorksires. The Reserve Yorkshire Premier sire was awarded to RIY4 Gain Control 87-5, owned by Genetic Edge and Ricker Yorkshires, Ohio. Congratulations to both firms.

Ryan Stohlquist of Popular Grove, Illinois, had the honor of driving this year's Champion Yorkshire Boar. He is sired by RIY4 Gain Control 87-5. Ryan's boar looks like a 2016 show hog. This guy is wide chested, big centered and has a massive top. He is a powerfully-built boar with a killer look from the side and balances extremely well. He will help make better Yorkshires for Thompson Brothers Genetics and Schenken Genetics for the price of \$45,000.

The Reserve Champion Yorkshire Boar won Class 5 and was exhibited by Final Drive Genetics of Shipshewana, Indiana. He is a son of JDR3 Priority 116-6. This guy is extremely attractive from the profile. He's tall fronted and level designed. Plus, he has a big, square chest and a massive hip. Chad Lyons of Florida, and Malcolm Whiteshire of Indiana, paid \$1,250.

Next up was the entry from Western Illinois University in Macomb, Illinois. Their boar is sired by TMF1 Private Drive 10-2. He won Class 4. As you study this boar from the ground up, he is square at the knee, wide and expanded in his chest floor and opened up in his rib. He is thick and heavy muscled while still being attractive from the side. If you need to add look and muscle shape to your Yorkshire program, call Upperhand Genetics. They teamed up with Fecke Livestock to take this guy home for the price of \$30,000.

Chad Day of Kokomo, Indiana, drove the winning entry from Class 3. This son of DJDS5 Bob 5-4 is killer from the profile. He's tall at the point of his shoulder, level topped, great hipped and square on both ends. He will go to work for Top Cut Genetics. They paid \$25,000 to add him to their lineup of boars.

Christopher Fischbacher of Wildorado, Texas, won the youngest class of the day with his entry sired by RIY4 Gain Control 87-5. Chris' boar is square built underneath, square in his chest floor, heavy muscled and attractive from the side. He will now call Wauseon, Ohio, home and go to work for Genetic Edge, who valued him at \$21,000.

Grimm Purebreds' entry was one who raised some discussion around the barn. Jim's boar placed second in Class 3. He is sired by JDR4 Power up 89-9. This boar puts a lot of good pieces in an interesting package. He's stout boned, square on both ends, attractive and sound. This guy's skeleton and soundness can really help the Yorkshire breed. If you are looking for a Yorkshire sire who will leave a set of daughters you can build around, call Shipley Swine Genetics of Newark, Ohio. They paid \$70,000 to take this breeding hog home.

There were bargains to be had at the Yorkshire gilt sale, this year. Seven exceptionally deep classes made for a great offering, plus we had several of the top five Yorkshire gilts from the Junior Show consign in the sale. The gilt that made her way to the top of the offering to be named Champion Yorkshire Gilt was exhibited by Nathan Myers of Rensselaer, Indiana. Nathan's gilt is sired by TMF5 Control Factor 71-6. This lady profiles exceptionally well from the side. She's tall fronted, level designed, correct in her rib shape and powerful underneath. She will now call Ripley, West Virginia, home with Jacob Barr for the price of \$4,500.

The Reserve Champion Yorkshire Gilt was shown by Addison Hill, of Greenfield, Indiana. This daughter of RIY3 Ricochet 32-4 looks like a brood sow. Her toes all point in the right direction. She's square and wide at her knee, sound in her joints and man, is she powerful! Lawyer Showpigs of Indiana will take her home for \$4,000.

This lady has a great look from the side. She is good footed, sound moving and square built. She is a complete gilt with a lot of value as a replacement female. She sold to Bradey Newhouse and Clint Peacock for \$3,000.

Cole Wilcox of Bedford, Indiana, was next in the sale ring with a daughter of TPSP4 Private Eye 39-1 that was Fifth Overall Yorkshire Gilt in the Junior Show. This one is stout skulled, square chested, big centered and has plenty of muscle. She sold to Denny Dowel of Brookville, Indiana, for \$1,000.

Crossbreds were first out on the green shavings Friday morning at the Kentucky Expo Center for the 2016 Summer Type Conference (STC). A huge crowd gathered to watch Aaron Cobb of Lake City, Arkansas, sort through this set of boars. Aaron asked Jeremy Cantrell of Perkins, Oklahoma, to assist him in the ring, this year. Thank you, Aaron and Jeremy, for a great job in the ring!

Riggs-Thurston Show Pigs and Clark from Indiana, drove their son of Sky Wire to champion honors. If you like power hogs, this one was for you. He is a big-shouldered hog who is open in his blades and pulled apart underneath. He opens into a big, square rib cage, soft center body and tracks away wide. He is loaded with muscle from his blades back and pin set down. If you are looking to add power and not sacrifice show ring look, call Hi Point Genetics, Chrisman, Illinois. They paid \$40,000 to take this one home.

Reserve honors went to Pruet and Watson of Danville, Indiana. Their boar is sired by Betterman. This one has a killer look from the side. He's tall fronted, ideal in terms of length of body and has an awesome rear leg. He is square and correct on both ends of his skeleton and can motor around the ring. If you are looking for one with a big back and muscle from behind, he may be your kind. Shipley Swine Genetics of Newark, Ohio, made a great buy. They loaded him on their trailer for \$2,500.

Next in the ring was the entry from Jennifer Livermore of Media, Illinois, with a son of Fortune. This guy was built like an ideal show barrow. However, he is still stout enough and has plenty of muscle to move you in a positive direction and make change in a program. Hi Point paid \$18,000 to take him home.

Up next was the entry from Bodimer Brothers Showpigs of Gallipolis, Ohio. He is sired by Forbes and out of an Uncharted sow. This guy is tall fronted, level designed and has a great look from the side. He is a complete one with better days ahead of him. Mark Furrer and Kilmer Swine Farm, Indiana, will put him to work for the price of \$4,000.

Next in the ring was an entry exhibited by Carpenter Creek Farms of Remington, Indiana. He is sired by See My Point. This one is square at his knee, wide in his chest floor and square and correct in his center body. He is tall shouldered, level down his top and has a wide upper hip and square hock. He is probably one of the heavier structured boars we have talked about in the show. Hi Point Genetics added him to their lineup of crossbred boars for \$21,000.

The last boar I am going to talk about placed third in Class

4. He was exhibited by Newcastle Genetics of Elgin, Oklahoma, and sired by I'm the Man. Mick Bellamy, our Southwest Field Representative, told me about this boar before the show. Mick was right! I was a big fan of this guy. He may not be the most out there boar in the barn, but he is a good hog who has the ability to make the next generation better. He has a killer look from the side, and he's tall fronted, ideal in terms of length of body and has an awesome rear leg. He is square and correct on both ends of his skeleton and can motor around the ring. He is not the most powerful hog in the barn, but he's good looking, square built and sound. Complete hogs still win the majority of shows! Triple B Sires of Eufaula, Oklahoma, made a great buy. They loaded him on their trailer for \$50,000, making him our top-selling crossbred boar.

I want to give a huge thank you to everyone who helped make the 2016 STC a success. To all the volunteers who helped run boards, thank you. It made the show run much easier. Ron Kries, it is always an honor to have you on the block. We may not have set any records in the crossbred show, but the hogs were complete and deep. Keep up the hard work of making them better. See you all at the state fairs.

Skeletal width and muscle - where do we need to be?

I've been requested to speak about skeletal width and muscle as it relates to function. Their emphasis in the show ring is undeniable, but should it be?

The drawback has been the creation of a lot of pedigrees and hogs that are extremely bowed in their hock, which in my mind is the worst structural defect possible. Personally, I don't think we should tolerate it at any level. Not to mention, hogs are being made that are out in their elbow and pigeon footed up front. The positive has been an upgrade in the body and fleshing ability of hogs over the last 15 years. Originally, our desire to bust hogs open from a skeletal width standpoint likely stemmed from an effort to increase muscling as well. Logic would indicate that building hogs wider underneath and through their center cavity would provide a foundation to stage a larger loin eye area. I find this to be partially true, but highly dependent upon the weight at which we harvest. The major drawback to selection for added skeletal width is that it is negatively correlated to lateness of maturity pattern. In other words, if added frame size is not selected for simultaneously, then downsizing hogs will occur. Compositionally, hogs that are earlier maturing may have an advantage in muscle as it relates to lighter weights, but if the industry is harvesting hogs at advanced weights like we currently are, then that advantage is lost because their muscle growth is hastened too early; thus, their loin eye size relative to hot carcass weight (HCW) is not anymore impressive and may be at a disadvantage.

Do we want our target in the show ring to represent the perfect individual that is on the cuff of breaking over into an impractical animal to create and raise? Or, do we want our target to represent the absolutely optimal animal that can sit right at where we need our population mean so the majority of our normally distributed population fits within a window of practicality and profitability? Here's the unavoidable truth – every population is normally distributed for most traits. Therefore, we need to worry about where the animals to the right and left of the mean are falling.

Assuming you agree with a population mindset, let's talk about the optimal amount of muscle we need. Most lean value-based grids maximize carcass value between 52 and 58 percent lean. If the grid is more specialized the window will likely be 54 to 56 percent lean, so I will deem 55 percent lean as the ideal industry target. In my opinion, the optimal range for tenth rib backfat in



a show or commercial hog is between 0.6 and 0.9 inches. More specifically, 0.75 would be absolutely ideal. Assuming 0.75 inches of backfat, then a hog with an 8.0 loin eye area (LEA) would calculate with 55.1 percent lean, hitting the target nearly dead on. After reviewing the data from past carcass contests at the barrow show in Houston or San Antonio, I would conclude the standard deviation for loin eye area is approximately 1.0 square inches. Thus, if 8.0 in² were our mean, then 67 percent of our population would be between 7.0 and 9.0, and 95 percent of the population would be between 6.0 and 10.0 in². Even at a 6.0 LEA we would end up with a 52.1 percent lean value. At a 10.0 LEA we would have a carcass at 58.1 percent lean, which would both hit the boundaries of our optimal lean value range. Thus, collectively, I would argue that a LEA of 8.0 is the optimal hog. What does this hog look like? It would be one that is slightly above average in muscularity for a show hog. Definitely not those that are the most extreme for muscle.

To make an even stronger argument that we need to select for an optimal level of muscle instead of an extreme amount, just consider the other traits which are antagonistically related to increases in muscle in any species.

Consumer palatability is negatively correlated because added muscle is associated with increased muscle fiber size and decreased tenderness, not to mention the percentage of marbling is diluted. More importantly, muscle is antagonistically linked to structural soundness and longevity of breeding stock. Most maternal and reproductive traits are also negatively correlated.

In my opinion, we need to optimize muscle and skeletal width and move on to other traits that are economically worth perfecting, like structural correctness and balance. Personally, I think that most progressive hog judges are on this trail, and I encourage them to keep it up! As for

animal breeders, I encourage you to practice multi-trait selection, and focus on making the skeleton perfect generation after generation with no exceptions. Don't tolerate any structural deviations from entering your breeding program, and stay the course on this vision. One of my favorite quotes came from my father-in-law who bred hogs for a long time. He said, "There are animal multipliers, and then there are animal breeders. The difference is those breeders who have a committed strategy and those who simply throw darts and hope by chance they hit the target to chase trends."




