

Is patience really a virtue?

Almost every philosopher, self-help guru and even your family and friends will say, "patience is a virtue."

The saying – "patience is a virtue," comes from the poem called "Piers Plowman," written in 1360, and the original author of the quote is credited to William Langland.

Patience might have been a virtue back when there were no smartphones, Internet, planes or email, but I am not so sure it is today since we are a society focused on instant gratification.

It is true that patience can pay off, but most people interpret the quote as the longer you wait, the luckier you'll get. But waiting doesn't get you anything but more waiting. My experience has taught me that good things NEVER come to those who wait. Good things come to those who take action, commit, put in the work, persist and persevere. Have you ever met a showman who waited to work with their animal until show day and won champion barrow at the World Pork Expo? Have you ever met a successful stockman who waits around to see what boars everyone else is going to use? Have you ever met a boar stud owner who said something to the effect of, "I'll just wait around and be patient, no sense in rushing to find a boar?" Have you ever met someone who has waited months for the right show barrow to come to them, instead of hitting the pavement to find that barrow themselves?

In all four of these scenarios the person is playing the waiting game. They are being patient, sitting still and expecting something to fall in their lap.

That's not how the world works. Nothing comes to you if you're waiting for it. You have to get off your rear, move and go get it for yourself.

Instead of waiting for a breeder to send out your registration papers, why not be proactive and contact them early and make sure you have all the information needed to have your pigs transferred in a timely fashion?

Instead of waiting to see what boars are going to be popular, why not jump in your truck, hit the road and see what boars will fit your needs best and help you make the most progress? Instead of waiting for new customers to find you, why not seek them out yourself?

Our industry moves fast. If you play the patient game without taking any action, how can you expect any real results? Yes, there are some areas where patience is needed, such as waiting to see how a mating for a group of pigs will turn out. But don't get caught up in the trap of waiting because you will get left in someone else's dust.

Many of us HOPE good things will happen to us. We HOPE that our bow-legged barrow will get better and things will work out. We HOPE the judge will know we took a family vacation the week before the county fair and that we will still be successful. Sometimes we are too focused on hoping things will turn out the way we want them to. There is no virtue in waiting around and hoping for something to happen. Results take hard work, persistence and dedication. The successful people I have met in our business don't wait for the right circumstances to pursue their dreams and goals. They commit and take action in order to create the right circumstances to achieve their dreams and goals. They hustle, work hard, persevere and have a plan for the future. I would encourage all of you to practice patience when you are waiting to unload your stock at the 2018 World Pork Expo or when you are waiting to check in your animals at the National Junior Summer Spectacular. Have patience with your family and friends. But when it comes to your breeding program, marketing your showpigs and your goals in and out of the show ring, take action, commit, put in the work and make results happen.

I am going to leave you with a quote from Alan Cohen, "Do not wait until the conditions are perfect to begin. Beginning makes the conditions perfect."

For many of us, we grew up in this industry. Generations before us raised hogs and worked in the agricultural field, and we were just next in line to carry on the tradition. For those of us that fall into that group, things sure are different from the stories that grandpa use to tell. I'm sure many people from my generation have had to find ag jobs that weren't on the family farm, like we hoped. So in our case, the pig deal has become a side job or just an interest. There is absolutely nothing wrong with that, it takes all sorts of people to keep the wheels turning on this metaphorical school bus. So is that a change for the good or for the bad? Or does it even matter? The fact that my age group, more times than not, works off the family farm, which might be good for some and it might be bad for some. The fact is that it is a change from generations before. We now have a group of educated and well-spoken individuals who grew up involved in the National Junior Swine Assocation who work off the farm and are advocates for agriculture. Don't we need more of that? As we work through the tough times of anti-GMO crops and hormone-free meat, isn't it a good change to have more people in the work place who get what we do? You call it whatever kind of change you want, but I call it one for the better.

A hot-button topic, in the showpig industry, is the change in the pigs we have been showing. We have all heard someone talk about not liking the look of a pig as trends change. We all joke about how the pigs in the old Seedstock EDGE magazines don't look like they have value, but at the same time, we have to remember that we didn't walk in the shoes of the guy who raised those hogs. While today we might not need hogs to look like that for the showring, back in the day they needed to for a certain reason. I'm sure none of those pigs would win a 2017 barrow show, but people made a living raising those types of hogs, and people bought farms and put kids through college by selling hundreds of commercial boars and gilts each year. Now on the other hand, people are doing the same thing today. There are breeders today that are making a living and raising families with pigs that look nothing like the ones I already talked about. They put more emphasis on marketing tactics, the youth and sell most of their livestock as little pigs. So what kind of change is that? A good or bad? If the hogs have changed how they look and if the industry has changed to meet the demand and if people are still able to do what they love, then what kind of change is that? I guess the point to my rambling is why does it even matter what the pigs look like? If judges started to pick three legged purple spotted pigs then I bet we would find a way to make them. If the export market takes a drastic change in phenotype selection then we would make those modifications too. Change doesn't always have to be bad, and it doesn't always have to be good, but it has to happen or we will cease

So, I have never been good at challenging people to do things. Sometimes I don't even consider myself good at giving life advice, but once a year the NSR ask me to put some words down on paper, and I just hope it makes sense to someone out there. As you move forward, don't be afraid of change, and don't worry about if it is a good or bad change, just change. If you get up every day and feed hogs that you don't like to look at, then change it; make your pigs look how you want or need them to. If you get up every day and go to a job you don't like, change it. If you have people in your life that don't better you, then change them. This whole industry is its own little world, and it's the best thing on the planet to work in, it's the best way to raise a family and it's the best way to do what we love with hogs.

Don't worry and stress about changes that have happened, and don't worry about the ones that are coming. Change is a necessary ingredient in what we do and in the entire world, so embrace it with a good attitude and see if it doesn't make a difference.



ean Value Sires, Ohio, is not new to the boar stud sector of the showpig industry. Established in 1992 by Dr. Gene Isler and Mary Pavelko, Lean Value has seen change after change occur in the swine industry and has adapted those changes to continually provide their clientele the product they need. Everything from English Large Whites, to Pietrain boars, to showpig sires and commercial semen has been inside Lean Value's coolers. Perhaps this flexibility and openness to change is what has proven so successful for the firm.

Naturally, since acquiring Lean Value in 2015, Bingham has made changes to the business, but he remains conscientious of the passions its founders possessed.

"Gene was a professor at Ohio State University, and Mary worked for another facility where they focused on reproductive physiology," Bingham says. "They saw the need in the showpig industry to adapt and go and provide that service. It [Lean Value Sires] was basically one of the first ventures out there in the industry to come about, as far as artificial insemination in swine."

campuses to speak in animal science classes about reproductive physiology and nutrition. Lean Value has also donated semen to these schools, which allows them to practice the skills they are taught. The Ohio State University, Modesto Junior College and Cal Poly State University are just a few of the colleges Lean Value is involved with. These speaking engagements have evolved into partnerships on upcoming projects.

"Kyle Mendes at the University of Florida approached me about speaking to a few classes, and now we are doing something in the

"One of the biggest things Gene always said was that there is always somebody new coming into the industry each day, and if we can educate those individuals on how to be better stockmen the better off we are going to make the entire industry as a whole," says Rusty Bingham, owner of Lean Value Sires. "So I've lived my life by that motto. Basically what I've done is the Al schools, the nutrition clinics; that's something that sets us apart."

Like Lean Value's first owners, Bingham and the Lean Value team work hard and collaborate with other members within the animal agriculture industry to provide additional services and educational opportunities that go beyond breeding sows. Bingham travels across the country to college Southeast," Bingham says. "As a whole, I see the showpig market here [Midwest] and the Southwest as being very heavily saturated. We decided to set up a sale and show series. So we are actually going to put on a sale in the Southeast and a sale in the Northwest. Then, we



are going to follow that sale up with a jackpot show. On top of the sale and show, we've worked with MoorMan's® ShowTec® and they are going to put on a feed and nutrition clinic at that same event."

Currently, there are approximately 50 boars housed at Lean Value Sires, and for the first time in the firm's history there is a sow herd. Bingham has grown his sow herd to almost 40 sows, allowing Lean Value to market approximately 400 showpigs annually. At the moment, both the boar stud and sow herd include Berkshire, Chester, Duroc, Hampshire, Hereford, Landrace, Poland, Spot, Yorkshire and crossbred breeding stock. Showpigs are marketed year round, targeting clients in all regions of the U.S.

Bingham's goal of staying connected and involved in Lean Value hogs that are located across the country sparked his most recent business change.


"We have decided to launch a different kind of program now," Bingham explained. "We are implementing a field staff team, so basically we are going to put five regional guys in place. With the amount of breeders that are out there in the industry now, it's hard for me to get out and see everybody. I think if I can get some field reps put together, I can have those guys look at those hogs and get back to me, and then we can provide some customer service. I think that's actually where the boar stud industry has lost track about what we do. It's all over

the phone; it's all people buying off of pictures or a video that's posted online. We've lost that personal interaction with our customer base to where we aren't going out and seeing them as much as we can. That's something I firmly believe in, the personal interaction with somebody."

A personal connection and the question, "What can I do for my customers?" is what Lean Value Sires prioritizes when it comes to selecting boars to add to their stud. Yes, Bingham has his list of phenotypic traits a boar must checkoff in order to come to Kenton, Ohio, but the top priority is whether or not a boar can be utilized by the right person and produce great results.

"I've said for a long time that a good hog is a good hog no matter whose name is behind it or what pedigree it is, or if it's a purebred or not," Bingham says. "I target the hogs that I like and the ones that my customer market is going to like. The mental checklist in my head is: are feet and legs good, is it balanced and complete, is it something that's going to be within the market and something that's going to be received well and when in the right person's hands is going to hang a banner or two. From my standpoint, that's what we [boar studs] need to focus on. For instance, we just had the Champion Yorkshire Barrow and Reserve Champion Overall Barrow down at Louisville that was raised by Final Drive Genetics, but it was out of a boar that we bought at Expo. He was a \$1,500 boar. Having somebody do well with the boars we have is more important to me than selling doses of semen. I'd rather have that every day of the week. I want people to win. I want my customers to be happy. It's hard to make everybody happy, but you know from that same standpoint, if I can put the right boar in the right person's hands and they are able to hang a banner, it makes me feel great."

You might say relationships are how Bingham initially got involved with Lean Value Sires. Growing up in Ohio, Bingham always had a few sows, raised and sold some showpigs and spent each spring traveling the Midwest with his dad attending pig sales where he got to know many breeders. He also worked as a barn boy at the Ohio State Fair, for several years. Managing the swine barn and working hurdles proved to be

advantageous for Bingham because it introduced him to Dr. Gene Isler.

"Gene came up to me at the Ohio State Fair, and he said Dave Runyan, who was the swine superintendent at the time, speaks very highly about your work ethic, your passion, your knowledge and the way you talk about hogs. How would you like a job at Lean Value," Bingham remembered. "I was 18 years old, straight out of high school. I was like are you kidding me? Lean Value Sires is offering me a job to come work for them. I jumped on board."

Bingham worked at LVS through college, but after graduation his lifestyle transitioned to living and working in Cincinnati, Ohio, as a supply-chain manager and then a transportation broker. During this time, Bingham still raised showpigs and would see Gene and Mary at shows, but he wasn't directly involved with Lean Value. In 2015, Gene passed away and the future of Lean Value Sires was uncertain. Always having had a special connection with Gene, Mary and the boar stud, Bingham had the opportunity to come back to Lean Value.

"My dad told me, 'Your passion is swine. What you were doing before, that was just a career. This is your passion, what you want to do. You live it," Bingham says.

And that is exactly what Bingham did; he made another lifestyle change and became the owner of Lean Value Sires.

"Now it's a different challenge all on its own," Bingham says. "I went from thinking I was going to be an Ad Ed major, then going into supply-chain management and then working for a logistics company as a supply-chain manager for 7 years. Then I worked as a transportation broker, and now I'm at a boar stud. It's totally night and day."


Owning and operating a boar stud has been more than a change in his career path. Bingham now spends the work day alongside his father, Bill, wife, Allissa, 15-month-old son, Kaveran, and herdsman, Ryan Rice, taking care of the breeders and livestock that make up Lean Value. "Some of the changes in my life now are my son," Bingham says. "He's so encompassed with this now. He's picked up on words and will be sitting there saying, 'roc' and points to a red pig, and I know he's talking about a Duroc. My son is picking up on things I'm doing on my end, so to see my family so involved in what we are doing is great."

So what does the future hold for Lean Value Sires? Several things are in the works, of which the most exciting is the plan to clone an iconic Duroc boar, MM1 Crown Royal 10-6. This will be the first clone to be in stud at Lean Value Sires. But of all the upcoming changes, the constant theme is adapting, growing and remaining connected to their customers.

"I'm going to say it's a coin flip," Bingham says. "I see Lean Value Sires thriving and growing, but I'm going

to adapt on which way it needs to go. That's the challenge of it, the fun of it. To not just sell semen, but doing my part to build the Lean Value Sires brand, to build the entire thing that I'm trying to achieve. That's the challenge, it's the fun, it's the excitement of knowing that I can have an impact on whether it is an old breeder or a 9-year-old kid who is starting to breed sows for the first time. That's the exciting part, knowing that someday down the line that 9-year-old kid that I'm influencing is just like that barn boy at Ohio State Fair that Gene influenced."



t's not uncommon for families in the swine industry to have deep roots in raising and showing pigs. What's rare is to find a family whose current herd has genetics tracingback 35 years like the Bartholomew's, Tennessee. Their red hogs go back to the same sow line Derek had in 1982. When Derek was around 8 or 9 years old, his father let him pick out two red gilts from their commercial operation, and he bred those females to a Hampshire boar. Those were the first pigs he ever showed, and he took the money he earned to start his purebred herd.

"We went to Sycamore Farms in Alabama, and the herd we have today still goes back to the boar and one of the gilts we bought then," Derek says. "We raised the mother and the daddy of that Belton boar, and I don't think that many people can say that anymore."

The Axl Rose son, now named Est, is housed at WinTex Farms in Lubbock, Texas. If you visit their website and read the description of Est, you'll learn he got his name because he was the boar with all of the extras.

Derek and Abi are both excited to see future Est pigs and to find out what he can produce.

"If you get a boar into a boar stud, he gets to see a lot of good sows," Derek says. "If you have your boar in a small herd with your own genetic line, you don't really know what they are really going to do."

For Derek, he knew from day one that Est was special, but Abi will tell you a different story.

"No, not really, and maybe that sounds like I wasn't paying attention or something," she says. "I made sure he was fed, looked good and that we pushed him to the highest level he could be at. However good he did was great for me."

Although they have raised other champions, and Est has been their high-selling boar, his mother is still Abi's favorite.

"She was the one that made him and all my other state fair pigs," Abi says. "She is really our foundation female that everything goes back to."

Est's mother is just one of the 24 females the Bartholomew's will farrow out twice a year. The female herd consists of mostly Durocs, two Chesters and one crossbred. They also have two herd boars they have raised and one they recently purchased in Perry, Georgia.

Both Abi and Derek will agree that raising and showing their own genetics is something they take pride in. They are no strangers to the bred-and-owned division in the National Junior Swine Association shows. Est's mother was the Champion Bred-and-Owned Duroc Gilt at the 2015 NJSA Southwest Regional in Chickasha, Oklahoma. She then went on to be named the Supreme Gilt at the Tennessee State Fair.

"It's very rewarding to me to be able to raise my own," Abi says. "I showed some cattle for my [FFA] advisor, but it wasn't the same feeling because I didn't work with them every day. I didn't see them when they were born or know who their momma was."

Blaine Evans, Eastern field representative, says while spending time on their farm during his herd visits, you can tell Abi is an integral part of their program. For this reason and many others led to Abi being recognized at the 2017 National Junior Summer Spectacular as the Herdsman of the Year.

"There are not many kids that know as much about their projects or their family's operation as Abigayle," Evans says. "She is a wealth of knowledge when it comes to pedigrees, and she has a passion for this industry. She's the kind of person that allows me to believe our industry is in good hands as we move forward."

Abi's obsession with knowing pedigrees has led her to want to study genetics once she graduates high school next May.

"I am looking at schools that have pigs," she says. "I have always loved looking at what a certain sow and boar can make and what can be done to improve or adjust."

Abi recently visited a purebredcattle farm during the Tennessee Governor's Schools program this year, which provides students a broad overview of the diverse fields of agriculture and natural resources. Through this experience, she realized her passion to pursue a career with a large-production scale swine herd. Eventually she hopes to get her doctorate.

"I have always been around 25 sows, but I would like to work with 25,000," she laughs. "I want to make a genetic line that really amps up production for the industry."

Until then, Abi is focused on continuing to improve the Bartholomew herd. Their breeding

selection process isn't much different than other operations who keep structure as the most important quality, Abi says.

"We look for little things because we want to perfect them so much," she says. "Right now we are working on a specific trait like our lower ham. That's why we bought the boar in Perry."

Abi explains that because their sows are so closely linebred they tend to all have the same strengths or weaknesses. They hope to offset the weaknesses with their boar selections.

"We go out and buy a boar maybe every year or two, so we do rotate them in and out," Abi says. "Every now and again we may have a sow that I say 'Hey daddy, there is this boar that I found, let's AI this one.'"

Abi manages the showpig side of their operation, while Derek handles the everyday maintenance and feeding the sows. Derek says Abi will get up before school to feed and then she comes home to walk her showpigs.

"People don't believe me but we don't watch much TV, and we are usually in the barn," Derek says.

This means there are a lot of hours spent in the barn together, and it

was in the farrowing house where Abi learned to count before she was in kindergarten by counting the underlines of baby pigs, Derek says.

"He tells that story to everyone, so I joke and say, 'Well the highest I learned to count is eight,'" Abi says.

Still at 17, Abi is responsible for counting the underlines, recording if it's a boar or gilt and writing down the ear notches when it's time to process pigs. She is also currently learning how to collect boars says Derek.

"Collecting boars and cutting boar pigs are the two things I am working on, and I'm still practicing," she laughs. "I keep telling myself that I have to get this down before I graduate. That sounds crazy and only something a pig kid would say, but I guess that is just me."

Not only has Abi been involved in raising pigs her entire life, she also first stepped into the show ring when she was 3 years old at the 2003 NJSS. Abi borrowed a gilt from Tom Farrer, a family friend, to show in showmanship. Besides that pig, every other pig she has shown in NJSA or National Swine Registry shows the Bartholomew's have raised.

Derek and Abi both credit the NJSA organization for Abi's ability to learn responsibility and a strong work ethic.

"You can work and work and not necessarily always succeed, but it doesn't mean you quit," he says. "She learns to be involved, be dedicated and be committed. She has a passion for it."

Derek says where they live there aren't many hog people, and the NJSA allows his daughter to make friends that have the same interests and goals as her.

"I have friends that say they are just going home and watching TV," she says. "I have 200 pigs that are depending on me to go feed them, so I've learned responsibility."

Abi has enjoyed learning about structuring breeding programs, breeding traits and medication programs. Her favorite event through the NJSA is skillathon because it's important for kids to understand the industry as a whole.

"Sometimes I think within this industry, if

you just show pigs you don't really understand the meat side of it," she says. "Something we learned at NYLC is that all the showpigs in the whole year could be slaughtered in like two hours, and there are slaughter plants working every day. I think sometimes the show ring doesn't give you the whole broad aspect."

Derek hopes that in the future he and his daughter can continue to maintain

their line of hogs and continue to help the swine industry grow and improve.

When you ask Abi what she enjoys the most about raising and showing pigs, her response is everything.

"I love it all, and I know that sounds really cliché," she says. "But you can't have one without the other."

Technology is constantly evolving and that is no different in the reproductive sector of the swine industry. The Seedstock EDGE team corresponded with Kara Stewart, assistant professor at Purdue University who specializes in reproductive physiology. Stewart provides her insight on today's reproductive technologies available in the swine industry. "A lot of the technologies that we utilize today have been around for many years and were used in other species before pigs," Stewart says. "Artificial insemination was performed by Chris Polge in pigs in the 1950s but not widely adopted by the industry until 30 plus years later. So, that tells me that it takes time to figure out how to implement new technologies into production systems."

Ovugel, timed-insemination

What is it? OvuGel® is gel containing the drug triptorelin, which is a GnRH agonist. It is administered into the vagina to post-weaned sows to facilitate single, fixed-time AI (SFTAI).

What are the benefits? In theory, in large scale commercial operations SFTAI would allow a farm to avoid having to perform heat detection, and it facilitates breeding ALL eligible females and not just the females that express estrus. I think OvuGel® might also have a place in the small-scale/showpig industry. For example, when very expensive semen, limited semen doses or frozen semen needs to be used to breed a sow, OvuGel® could be used to induce the sow to ovulate to increase the likelihood of conception. Currently, OvuGel® is the only FDA approved drug on the market in the U.S. to induce ovulation, and it is only approved for use in post-weaned sows. There are other drugs that

perform similarly to OvuGel® that are approved in other countires, except they are administered via injection.

What does the application process look like? OvuGel® is administered into the vagina. JBS United Animal Health provides an applicator gun and the catheters to deliver the dose into the vagina. It is very simple to administer.

Negative issues associated with this process – Any drug that induces ovulation will only work if the sow's ovary has a follicle capable of ovulating in response to the drug. So sows that have a delayed return to estrus following weaning (low feed intake in lactation, summer heat stress, etc.) will not respond to the drug treatment. Any time a farm is considering adopting a new technology, they need to be well managed before

and during the implementation to see its full potential.

Utilization within the showpig circuit could have multiple challenges. One, some showpig farms have extended lactation periods beyond 21 days. When this occurs, some sows will begin to cycle and develop follicles on their ovaries before weaning. Since OvuGel® is designed to work on follicles of a specific size, this could pose a problem if sows have follicles too small to respond. Another challenge for showpig breeders is that sows might skip heats to breed to create piglets for the fair circuit. This will also result in the potential for improper sized follicles on the sow's ovary for OvuGel®. OvuGel® is very effective at inducing ovulation in a post-weaned sow that has a normal return to estrus. The showpig industry has to produce pigs during very specific times of the year, which can make utilizing OvuGel® a challenge.

Post-cervical AI (PCAI)

How does it differ? When using PCAI, first heat detection is performed without breeding. About 30 to 45 minutes after heat detection, the AI technicians will then go breed the sows without the boar present. To do this, the outer catheter is placed in the cervix, similar to conventional Al. Then, the inner catheter of the Al rod is passed beyond the cervix and into the uterus. Semen is then deposited into the uterus by gentle pressure on the insemination dose by the AI technician (compared to stimulating the sow to accept the semen). The reason that the boar is not present during breeding is because when the boar is present and the sow locks into the standing heat reflex, her cervix will contract. Passing the inner rod through the cervix is challenging when this occurs as the contractions clamp down on the inner catheter. Some farms will run a boar after they are done breeding, to stimulate uterine contractions and move the semen through the uterus toward the site of fertilization. A good reference video can be found on Purdue Extension's YouTube Channel.

Explain the inner and outer catheter used for this process – The outer
catheter is the same or similar to
those used for conventional Al. The
inner catheter varies slightly based
on the brand that is used, but is a

flexible, smaller diameter catheter that passes through the outer catheter. The outer catheter is placed into the cervix and the inner passes into the uterus.

What are the advantages? PCAI has been thought to be necessary to facilitate the process of lowering the concentration of semen in the insemination dose. If higher indexing boars or boars of higher value need to be used over a large numbers of sows, the number of sperm cells used in an insemination dose for each sow would need to decrease. Historically, research has shown that placing the semen closer to the location of the ovulated eggs (closer to the ovary) would increase conception rates with

lower sperm numbers. Therefore, PCAI would be placing the sperm cells past the cervix and into the uterus, getting them slightly closer to the site of fertilization in the oviduct. However, more research likely needs to take place to determine how low the sperm numbers can be reduced before reductions in fertility occur. My best guess is that below 1 billion cells would reduce fertility in the best managed farms and that concentration would go up if management is less than optimal. Also, some European countries are reducing the sperm numbers using only conventional AI, so PCAI might

not be a requirement to lower the concentration of sperm cells.

One other advantage that has been seen is labor utilization. Where conventional AI may take 3 to 5 minutes per sow for insemination, PCAI is typically only 1 to 2 minutes per sow. Therefore, farms can have

their best heat checkers perform heat detection and then move that labor somewhere else on the farm. Their best AI technicians can breed in a shorter amount of time.

For the showpig industry, PCAI may have a benefit in placing the semen closer to the site of fertilization compared to CAI. The showpig industry typically uses higher sperm numbers in insemination doses compared to commercial farms (5 billion in show versus 2 to 3 billion in commercial), so the advantage of PCAI to facilitate low dose semen will likely be slowly adopted in the showpig industry.

Deep intrauterine Al

What is deep intrauterine Al?

Whereas PCAI deposited semen just passed the cervix at the start of the uterus, deep uterine AI (DUI) deposits semen further into the uterine horn, even closer to the sight of ovulation. To my knowledge, very little DUI occurs on commercial sow farms or showpig farms. DUI has been used historically to facilitate the use of frozen semen because frozen semen is thought to have a short lifespan and reduced motility once thawed and inseminated into the sow. DUI may also faciliatate very low dose semen because it places the semen much closer to the site of fertilization. DUI probably requires some additional training to learn to pass the catheter deep into the uterus.

What are the advantages of deep intrauterine Al? The disadvantages?

In theory, DUI could facilitate the use of frozen semen or very low dose semen, which could impact the showpig industry as more and more studs start to custom freeze semen. However, it is not a requirement to use this method of insemination if using frozen semen. Many research

projects have produced litters with frozen semen using conventional AI and/ or PCAI and I have talked with several showpig breeders that have used frozen semen with CAI or PCAI successfully. So, in my opinion, the advantages are somewhat theoretical. If frozen semen utilization increases, then DUI may have more of an application in the industry, but more research on the true advantages with modern-day semen extenders, etc. is probably warranted.

What effect does this form of Al have on conception rates and the litter size? To my knowledge, it is not used with liquid semen. Therefore, separating out the impacts on conception rates or litter size from just a catheter versus using frozen semen can't be done.

What risks are associated with using deep intrauterine Al? When catheters were first developed, there was some risk of damaging the uterine walls.

However, catheter designs today seems to have minimized this risk.

Is there any effect on getting the sows rebred? Not that I know of, unless severe damage to the uterus was done.

How do you think deep intrauterine Al will affect the showpig industry in the future? If frozen semen or very low dose semen (less than 1 billion cells) increases in utilization, then this method of insemination may also increase. Boar studs would only be affected if they begin to offer frozen semen or very low dose semen.

Dietary supplementation

What nutritional influences affect a boar's reproductive performance?

Historical research evaluated large deficiencies in macronutrients (energy and protein) and found that semen production was only reduced when large insults were made over a relatively long period of time. Most boar studs feed a boar-specific diet formulated to meet the boar's needs. Nutritional manipulations are likely only impactful on semen output and quality when the boar is stressed. Stresses include over collection (increased collection frequency), illness, lameness, or heat stress. Recently, some research has been evaluating various feed supplements fed to boars during stress with some promise. However, the impact of these supplements will be greater the more stressed the animal is or when management is poor.

Do feeding practices differ for different ages? Most boars are fed to grow quickly during pre-pubertal development and then to grow at a much slower rate after maturity. It is important to keep boars on a nutritional plan that is positive in energy balance and allows for a small amount of overall growth. This will maximize semen output for the boar. Mature boars are typically limit fed to maintain this slow growth and maintain body condition.

Does it differ for boars that are being used for natural service versus ones being collected for Al? This is a good question. I am not sure that I have ever seen any data on this. Most boars being used for natural service are on small farms where local food ingredients, such as apple mash, are sourced. Small showpig boar studs

typically feed a corn/soybean based

diet. So, feed ingredients can be very different and hard to compare. I don't think the actual nutrient requirements are different for a boar being used for natural service versus AI. However, I think both animals need to maintain good body condition and not be over or underfed.

What are the effects related to overfeeding a boar? I am not sure I am the best versed in this area, as most research has evaluated under feeding more than overfeeding. Overfeeding would result in boars that do not fit in crates and have lameness issues which prevents mounting a sow for natural mating or a dummy for collection. These would be the biggest reasons to not overfeed a boar to me.

When you add body mass, heaviness of structure, width and shape, you have a special one. On top of all that, he was level, stout and extremely square and opened up when he drove straight at you. It never hurts to have great sisters, and this boar had one that was named Reserve Champion Duroc Gilt in the NJSA Junior Show. Hi Point, Illinois, made a great buy here, at \$16,000. Thanks!

Swartzentruber Genetics', Indiana, reserve champion

and the winner of class 5 was next. This son of NBRP5 New Direction 15-3 was so attractive when you backed off and viewed him from the side. His ability to combine a stout boar head with extra extension and shape up high was really good. When you get behind this one and he had extra width of hip and stifle and continued that width all the way to the ground. He will also make his way to Illinois with the Hi Point crew. They valued this one at \$13,000.

Tres Amigos Showpigs, Indiana, class 1 winner entered the ring next. A son of the Reserve Premier Sire, this young February pig was a very intriguing prospect. This guy's balance, shape and ability to work his skeleton off both ends was exceptional. Hayden Everhart, Indiana, exhibited the class 2 winner. Sired by the Reserve Premier Sire, this young gilt was stout! She had a bunch of mass and an extra heavy skeleton. Combine this with a big rib cage and chest floor and Don and Preston Smith got a really good buy here for \$2,500.

Jada Johnson's, Indiana, class 1 winner and the Champion Duroc Gilt of Division 1 in the NJSA show came next. Sired by the JJG6 GRUS Clear Choice 7-7 boar, this was one robust, stout-skulled female with a bunch of muscle and a good workable skeleton. The Summer Type Conference always serves as a great end to the busy summer show season and the sign that state fairs are just around the corner. I always look forward to when the Hampshires hit the green chips in Louisville; there is something about the belts and green shavings that get me excited about the breed. This year was no different, and we were glad to have Ben Moyer, Ohio, serve as the judge for the Hamp portion of the STC. We would sure like to thank Ben for doing a great job lining up the show. Ben did so in an efficient manner, and I appreciate him taking the time to honor some great men during his grand drive speech.

The Premier Hampshire Sire this year was JGR5 Lethal 58-7, owned by Premium Blend Genetics, Indiana. Lethal was the 2016 STC Reserve Champion Hampshire Boar, from Grimm Purebreds, Iowa. The Reserve Premier Hampshire Sire was JLM3 Carry On 21-1. He is owned by Hi Point Genetics, J&K and Jerry McLemore. This hog has been doing a great job over the last few years. Congratulations to all those firms and the continued success with these boars.

This year's Champion Hampshire Boar was NAJO6 IR 6-5 x EC4 Real Tree 77-5, from Austin Joostberns, Michigan. The Joostberns family needs no introduction; they have been putting together hogs that have been working for people, and this boar looked like he will carry on the tradition. Austin's boar hit the ring with the look and presence of a show hog. He was tall shouldered, good looking and so comfortable in his skeleton. The hog had a bold rib shape, good shape up high and he was set wide at his hip with a flexible and clean hindleg. The Joostberns' hog sure looked like one that will go home and can help make hogs good looking. Check him out at Hi Point Genetics, Illinois.

The reserve champion was entry 245-1, from Dakota Wilson, Pennslyvania. The Wilson hog was sired by BOLN5 Maxed Out 19-3 and out of a JM3 Bumpercar 2-5 sow. I really like the pedigree of this boar when you dig into it; he has a lot of good hogs on both sides of the pedigree. Dakota's boar was one that when he hit the ring I liked his stout skull, big forearm and front leg. From there back, the boar was bold in his upper rib and productive bodied. He left with a wide pin set and a heavy duty kind of hindleg. He's a boar that looks like he can add stoutness and power without giving up some look. You can also check him out at Hi Point.

The next boar in the sale ring, on Saturday, was H&H Hampshires, Ohio, class 3 winner. His pedigree reads 1FHH4 Unbroken 24-1 x JM3 Blindfolded 2-3. Frank's boar was pretty trendy in his type and kind; he was tall shouldered, well balanced, good looking and very comfortable at the surface. His pedigree was a little different for some and sure looked like he could keep a sow herd in check.

Chad Day & JP Enterprises, Indiana, was next in the ring with their son of CFLK TCG Stop The Madness 3-1 and out of a BJKE4 Harbaugh 4-3 sow. That Harbaugh sow happens to be the littermate to the the 2016 Winter Type Con-

ference high seller, The Game, and New Recruit, that stand at Shaffer's Goldrush, Indiana, and Top Cut Gentics, Indiana, respectively. This boar has a really good pedigree that blends genetics from several very popular firms. Chad's boar won class 1, on Friday and did so with his ability to cover ground in an effortless manner; he didn't take a bad step the whole time he was in Louisville. On top of that he was as good as you can make one from the side, his top line, head carriage and belly line proportioned so well and his bone matched. He is now at Top Cut Genetics, Indiana.

Cason Edengield, Georgia, drove the class 2 winner into the ring next. A son of BBKB5 Point Maker 19-1 and out of a TSOB0 GRUS Capital Investment sow. I liked the way this boar was able to combine pattern with power. This hog's tallness of shoulder, build from the side and the way he matches it with plenty of muscle and body isn't always easy to do. Plus, he's good on his feet and legs, square chested and pulled open leaving you. Sharrett Family Farms, Ohio, will add him to their boar battery.

George and Mike Watson were next in the ring with entry 18-1, out of the Premier Sire JGR5 Lethal 58-7 and a KMRE GRUS Power Point sow. Watson's boar placed third in what turned out to be an over \$100,000 grossing class 4. I don't know where to start with Mike's boar except they are hard to make like that. This hog covered all the bases in terms of what Hampshire boars are known for. There is plenty of power, muscle and body, with a huge forearm and blade working in this guy. The center portion of his body was bold, and he carried a powerful rib cage. When he left you, he was just as impressive; plus, he was still a good looking hog that had a big hindleg while still being flat and clean in his joints. Boar 18-1 topped the Hampshire sale at \$70,000 and will take up residency at Shaffer's Goldrush, Indiana.

We had a great line up of Hamp gilts to sell on Saturday and the opportunity to lead off the sale with a very special gilt. Landry Rodibaugh, Indiana, exhibited the Third Overall Hampshire Gilt in the National Junior Summer Spectacular show and took advantage of the option to bypass the open show and go to the front of the line on sale day. Congrats to Landry for a good run with this gilt, and we appreciate the Rodibaugh family for having faith in the STC Sale to market this female. In the catalog, this gilt was paint brand 1914-1 and she is a JGR5 Lethal 58-7 x BJKE4 Harbaugh 4-3 sow from George and Mike Watson, Indiana. I talked about a Harbaugh sow earlier. This is the other littermate to the gilt that was bought down in Georgia. It was evident that Landry's gilt was special in many peoples' minds, and on Saturday she stood as the STC top-selling gilt. She sold to Russ Baize, Texas, for \$16,000. Congrats to the Rodibaugh family, and good luck to Russ with his new purchase.

The Champion Hampshire Gilt was entry 3321-10 from Payton Hines, Michigan, and a BOLN5 On Point $38-2 \times EBM3$ Breaking Bad 15-8. Payton's gilt hit Ben

hard when she came into class. She is one that drives at you wide and opened up underneath and has a great chest, rib cage and front foot laid in her. From the side she looked like a show gilt but had some extras like a stout jaw line, big blade and good angles to support all she carried up high. Really a great example of a Hampshire female. Congratulations to the Hines family, and good luck to the Gibson Girls, Ohio, with adding another tremendous Hampshire female to the herd.

The Reserve Champion Hampshire Gilt was from Earl Cain and Family, Iowa, with a daughter of EC6 Thunderbolt 23-1 x JL1 He's A Ten 10-10. The Cain gilt was one that had so many neat pieces. What a Yorkshire show and sale it was. At the conclusion of the show, there was a buzz of excitement in the barn and that buzz was even more intensified by our Yorkshire judge, Willie Kirkpatrick and his daughter, Hunter Mckinnon, both of Oklahoma. They did an outstanding job sorting through a deep and high-quality show that would turn out a record-selling boar and many high-selling gilts. As is always the case, Ronnie Kries did an outstanding job on the auction block. We would like to thank him for his efforts throughout the show and sale.

The Champion Premier Sire at the 2017 Summer Type Conference was awarded to RIY4 Gain Control 87-5, owned by Moyer Genetic Edge and Kevin Ricker, Ohio. The Reserve Premier Sire was garnered by RSY6 Amped Up 4-1, owned by Thompson Brothers Genetics, Ohio. Both of these boars have been highly influential within the breed and have done an outstanding job. Congratulations to everyone involved in these programs and these boars.

The first hog through the sale ring was the Champion Yorkshire Boar, belonging to Korb Farms Inc., Ohio. After being named champion he went on to set the Yorkshire world record, selling for \$350,000 to Upperhand Genetics. Indiana. This boar's pedigree reads RSY6 Amped Up 4-1 x CDNO4 In Control 3-7. The extended pedigree also contains influential boars such as Untouchable, Tug Boat and Symmetry. What makes the Korb Farms' entry so unique is his combination of an incredible head carriage and eye catching look, with a flexible skeleton and the right kind of power and feature to match. As Willie said during class, "They don't make them like that every day." He has the power and presence to make barrows, combined with the feature and skeleton to lay in functional females. It will be exciting to see the impact this boar is able to have on future generations. Make sure to look him up at Upperhand Genetics in the upcoming breeding season.

In what was a very deep and consistent Yorkshire sale, and the next boar into the ring was Malcolm Farms, Indiana, with their reserve champion. His pedigree reads RWG6 Gas Money 112-1 x HACO2 TCG Untouchable 153-6. This boar's width of chest, shoulder blade and rib shape was nothing short of impressive. He combined so much power with a neat look and comfortable skeleton. The Malcolm boar sold for \$20,000 and will stand at Shaffer's Goldrush, Indiana. If you need to add width and power without sacrificing skeleton and comfort, look him up.

The next boar through the sale ring came to us from Jason Lackey, Texas. Lackey's boar put together some things that are hard to come by in the Yorkshire breed. He combined an elite head carriage, correct front end design, great muscle shape, excellent pastern strength and a flexible skeleton. From a pedigree stand point he is a RIY4 Gain Control 87-5 x ABD2 Here and Now 8-6. He sold for \$12,000 and was purchased by Moyer Genetic Edge, Ohio.

Chuck and Ben Olsen brought us the next boar through the sale ring with their class 5 winner. This

boar was a littermate to the Reserve Champion Yorkshire Boar at the 2017 World Pork Expo. His pedigree reads RIY Capital Gain 72-1 x CDO3 Power On 282-7. Chuck and Ben's boar offered many current things in terms of elevation and look, but he combined that with feature, forearm and width. It took \$22,000 for Shipley Swine Genetics to take this boar back to Ohio.

Lorenzen Farms, Illinois, drove the next boar into the ring. Their JALR6 Kum N Go 20-4 x RIY3 Bone Buzz 87-7 son is so right in his angles, he's so flexible in his skeleton, and comfortable in his build. The impressive part about this boar is that he does all this while still opening up with power and true muscle. Crossroads Genetics made a great purchase, and took him home to Indiana, for \$2,000.

Next up in the sale order was the class 3 winner who was brought to us by Chad Day, Indiana. This boar's pedigree reads CDAY5 TCG Trademark 4-5 x DJDS5 BOB 5-4. This boar is incredibly square in his chest, neat headed and good jawed, yet he is still powerful in his hip and correct in his skeleton. Top Cut Genetics purchased him for \$1,200. It will be exciting to see how they make him work in the coming generations.

Kuhlow Girls Showpigs, Wisconsin, brought us the next boar. On show day, he was one of the most unique boars, and you probably heard Willie use the "pony keg" term to describe him. Incredibly bold in his rib shape, wide and square bladed, with great top shape, yet flexible describes this RSY6 Amped Up x CDO3 Bruno 273-8 boar. He sold for \$27,000 and will stand at Hi Point Genetics Illinois.

The class 5 winner was one of three littermates that all had quality and value. The 1-3 boar ended up on top of the class. Their pedigree reads RSY4 Buzz Saw 3-4 x CCF2 Stand Out 1-1. Of the littermates this was the most massive, opened up boar, that was impressive in the amount of power he offered while still having the ability to get out and go. He sold for \$400 to Ralph and Jim Bowling and families, Indiana.

Part of what made this show and sale so special was parading four exceptional females from the junior show. For the past few years, we give junior breeders who exhibit the top five gilts from each breed in the junior show the option to pass to the front of the line and sell at the beginning of the gilt sale. This year four of the top five junior show Yorkshire gilts took advantage of this opportunity.

The first gilt sold was Abby Taylor's, Indiana, RSY6 Amped Up 4-1 x RIY Gain Control 87-5 daughter that was named Champion Yorkshire Gilt and Reserve Overall Purebred Gilt. She was bred by Ricker Yorkshires, Ohio. Her elite look from the side is hard to duplicate. Her head carriage and design will be fun to see in the next generation. She was purchased by Wyatt Wilson, Indiana. It will be exciting to see how this \$6,500 purchase can help make the next generation better for them.

The next gilt into the sale ring was Connor Utterback's, Indiana, Champion Yorkshire Gilt, from the open show.

Her pedigree reads CDO3 Power On 282-7 x RIY4 Gain Control 87-5 and was bred by S&K Showpigs, Ohio. When this gilt hit the ring it was evident that Willie loved her squareness of chest, impeccable proportions and power. She was purchased by Ed Meers, Illinois, for \$4,500.

Brody Everhart, Indiana, exhibited the Reserve Champion Yorkshire Gilt in the open show. She was raised by Reynolds Farms, Ohio, and is a NBRP5 Fuel The Fire 39-4 x CDNO In Control 3-7. What set her apart is her incredibly bold skeleton, unbelievable mass and the fact that she handles it with comfort and flexibility. Russ Baize, Texas, will have a fun time mating and marketing offspring out of her.

Next up was Kendall Wills, Illinois, with her Reserve Champion Yorkshire Gilt and Fourth Overall Purebred Gilt, in the junior show. This gilt was another outstanding female raised by Ricker Yorkshires, Ohio. Her pedigree reads RIY5 Arrival 69-3 x RIY4 Gain Control 87-5. Her width of chest, body shape and incredible mass going away are what allowed her to be so successful in Thursday's junior show. She was sold for \$9,500, and will certainly make an impact at WinMor Farms, lowa.

Hunter Logue dropped his Fourth Overall Yorkshire Gilt in ring next. Here is one whose balance and proportions will always be relevant. Add in her incredible feature, sow-like body shape, and unbelievable power; her price tag of \$10,000 sends her to Steve Cobb and Family, Arkansas. They will certainly enjoy breeding on a female of this caliber.

The next gilt into the ring was a younger female, but her quality was still immense. Riley Rodibaugh, Indiana, sold her JRS6 Go Time 20-1 x DPK Buzzer Beater gilt, that was raised by Jack Rodibaugh & Sons. This gilt's look, presence and youthfulness are hard to come by. She's so square in her design and yet still has range of motion and flexibility. She sold for \$3,250 to Nelson Hanson, California.

The class 6 winner was Scott Gardner, Pennsylvania, brought his RIY Gain Control 87-5 x HAF Pants Down 18-5 gilt, raised by Will Hilty, Pennsylvania, in next. Her proportions, look and presence was impeccable. What made her so popular is the fact that her skeleton is so right and her length and levelness of hip was unmatched. She was purchased by Steve Cobb and Family, for \$10,000, and it will be exciting to see what is to come from her in Arkansas.

Next up was Bethany Sims, Tennessee, with her CDO3 Power on 282-7 x ARK1 Final Drive 130-1 gilt, raised by Kolton Knauth, Illinois. This gilt's look from the side is so current. Tall shouldered,

ultra-extended and still opened up. She sold for \$2,600 to Martin Family Showpigs, Missouri.

Kolton Kilmer, Indiana, brought his JRS5 Ghost Rider 113-1 x 6MSB4 Well Played 29-3 gilt, raised by Kilmer Swine Farm. This gilt had sow-like features and body. She is so stout skulled, big forearmed, opened up in her skeleton and bold in design. Chad Lyons, Florida, purchased her for \$1,500.

The class 4 winner was exhibited by Zachary Cline, Michigan. His RIY5 Capital Gain 72-1 x 1BSY Touch 'N Go 1-9 gilt was raised by Boblenz Genetics, Ohio. She had great range of motion, was elevated in her front end and still bold in her skeleton. She will have an exciting future for Greg Kneubuhler and Family, Indiana.

Next up was Travis Boeskool, Michigan, with his bred and owned gilt. Her pedigree reads RIY4 Gain Control 87-5 x LFC3 The Journey 34-8. His gilt had a great shape and depth to her body, as well as a bold build and athletic design. It will be fun to see how Denny Dorrel and Family, Ohio, is able to incorporate her into their breeding program.

The final class winner was Tyse Buck, Oklahoma, with his JKK5 Cobra 49-6 x TMF High Powered 70-9 gilt, raised by Randal & Terrell Buck. This gilt was very youthful, feminine, had a neat head carriage and tied all of that together with a flexible build.

The high-selling gilt, of the sale, belonged to Colton Zundel, Pennsylvania. Her pedigree reads RSY6 Amped UP 4-1 x TBRO4 GRUS Master Piece. This gilt was raised by Thompson Brothers Genetics, Ohio. This was a fun one to evaluate, because it is not often that you come across Yorkshire females with that combination of heaviness of bone, a bold skeleton and soundness. It will be fun to see how Steve Cobb and Family, Arkansas, are able to mate her and market her litters.

It was an exciting show and sale. From a recordselling boar, to numerous high-selling boars and gilts, the quality and consistency of the 2017 Summer Type Conference Yorkshire Show and Sale was immense. Again, I would like to thank Willie and Hunter for their job sorting the open show. Their excitement for the breed and passion to make Yorkshires better was apparent and added to the hype of this year's show. I would also like to thank Michael Lackey for giving me the opportunity to write this sale report. I hope you enjoyed reading it as much as I enjoyed putting it together.



Next in the ring was the entry from Tate and Karli Schwerdtfeger, Oklahoma. This son of Bone 'N Hand is freaky fronted. He was as long necked and clean fronted as any boar in the show. Shipley Swine Genetics, Ohio, paid \$44,000 to load him on their trailer.





Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow — DIVISION —

GENERAL INFORMATION:

- The Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow Division is a NEW division being added to the existing crossbred barrow show at the 2018 World Pork Expo Jr. National.
- The Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow Division is sponsored by the Hampshire Swine Registry.
- Participating barrows must be sired by a registered Hampshire boar. There are no regulations on the pedigree of a barrow's dam.
- \$5,000 in additional premiums, sponsored by the Hampshire Swine Registry, will be awarded to exhibitors of the top five Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrows.

- Division Champion: \$2,500
 » Reserve Champion: \$1,000
 - » Third Overall: \$750» Fourth Overall: \$500» Fifth Overall \$250
- The Champion Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow division winner will also compete against crossbred barrow division winners for Overall Champion Crossbred Barrow honors.
- The top five Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrows will be DNA parentage tested against their declared sire and must pass parentage testing.

BREEDER INFORMATION:

- IMPORTANT: Breeders MUST provide purchasers of Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrows with the sire's registration number.
- All Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrows MUST be sired by a registered Hampshire boar. Boars must be registered and have met all DNA testing requirements with a valid DNA sample on file at the National Swine Registry.
- In the event a Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow fails its parentage test against its sire, the breeder of the Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow is responsible for meeting all responsibilities outlined in the NJSA DNA policy found in the NJSA Handbook.

EXHIBITOR INFORMATION:

- World Pork Expo Jr. National exhibitors can exhibit two barrows per sex, per breed.
 Exhibiting one Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow counts as one crossbred barrow entry.
- In order to show one Hampshire Sired Crossbred Barrow, you MUST also show one purebred barrow (of any breed). This is the same requirement as the traditional crossbred barrow rule for all NJSA events.
- Barrows participating in the Hampshire Sired Crossbred division are not eligible for competition in multiple divisions (i.e.: purebred Hampshire

- barrow class or traditional crossbred barrow class)
- Exhibitors should enter Hampshire Sired Crossbred barrows in the traditional crossbred barrow section of World Pork Expo Jr. National online entry form. Hampshire Sired Crossbred barrows can then be designated during World Pork Expo Jr. National show.
- Exhibitors are asked to download the Hampshire Sired Barrow Information Sheet from the World Pork Expo Junior National section of *nationalswine*. *com*. This form must be printed, completed and presented during check-in at the show.



NSR Pedigree Staff NSR Pedigree Questions

What DNA requirements should be fulfilled for me to register a litter sired by my boar?

All sires are required to have a DNA sample on file with the National Swine Registry. From that DNA sample, all the NSR breeds are required to be tested and have a negative result on file for the Stress Gene. Additionally, Yorkshire sires are required to be tested and pass the DNA Breed Profile Test. All Hampshire sires are required to be tested for and pass the Hampshire DNA Color test. Landrace boars siring litters farrowed on or after March 1, 2018, are also required to be tested and pass the DNA Breed Profile Test. These items are required for all purebred sires whether they are being used on your own farm for breeding or for AI use.

Where can I obtain a DNA card, and where do I send it to test my boar?

A DNA card is \$6 and can be ordered from the NSR office. We have cards that can be used for hair, blood or semen collection. Once you collect DNA on the card, let it dry and mail it to the NSR office.

How long does DNA testing take?

Stress Gene testing can be completed within two to three weeks. However, Breed Profile testing and Hampshire Color testing can take six to eight weeks from the time the NSR receives the sample. It is very important to plan ahead and send a DNA card to the NSR before using a boar for breeding or selling semen.

What requirements should be fulfilled for me to register an AI litter?

All litters being recorded from AI will require a breeding/AI certificate from the family or boar stud that the semen was purchased from. Please call them and order the certificate before you

send in the litter application. The family or boar stud will need the herdmark in which you are recording the litter under. They will label your herdmark on the certificate and send it directly to us to match up with the litter application. The owner of the sire (family or boar stud) that you purchase the semen from, is responsible for completing the DNA requirements.

What is a herdmark, and how can I obtain one?

A herdmark is a four-letter prefix. You can get a herdmark established by completing the NSR membership application on our website, and mail, email, or fax that form into our office. Or simply call into our office to set one up if you already know you have an account or membership with us.

What requirements should be fulfilled for me to register a litter out of a bred gilt/sow purchase?

All litters being recorded out of a gilt/sow that was purchased already bred, can have two different scenarios. Scenario one being that the breeder of the litter is the owner or co-owner of the sire. If that is the case, no breeding certificate is needed. Scenario two being the breeder of the litter was not the owner or co-owner of the sire. If that is the case, the breeder of that female will need to purchase the AI certificate and place it under the herdmark in which the litter will be recorded under (purchaser of the gilt/sow).

Once I have fulfilled the requirements, how do I register my litter?

You can download a litter application to fill out and fax, mail or email to the NSR office with payment or be set up to register your litter online. Online registration requires a credit card to be kept on file with us, so you will need to contact the NSR office to register online.





THE BUTCHER'S BLOCK

FAIR FOOD

For many of us, it is once again county and state fair time, and that means fair food! There is always corn dogs and elephant ears available, but many livestock families bring their own food to the fairgrounds when they have to be there all day, every day. Here is a selection of recipes from *porkbeinspired.com* that are not your typical slow cooker pulled pork fare.



SLOW COOKER PORK CARNITAS 6 to 8 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 3 to 4 pounds blade (shoulder) pork roast
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 tablespoon cumin
- 1 tablespoon oregano
- Juice of 2 oranges

- 1 cup onion, diced
- 2 tablespoons garlic, minced
- 1 can diced green chiles
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- Small tortillas, optional
- Cilantro, optional
- Salsa, optional

COOKING DIRECTIONS

Pat your pork roast dry with paper towels.

Rub olive oil all over pork. Then coat pork roast with salt, pepper, cumin and oregano.

Place pork roast in slow cooker. Pour orange juice over the top of roast. Spread onions, garlic and green chiles over the top of the roast. Cover slow cooker and cook on low for 7 to 8 hours, or high for 5 to 6 hours.

Remove pork from slow cooker and shred with 2 forks, removing and discarding big pieces of fat.

In a large sauté pan, heat your vegetable oil over medium high heat. Add your shredded pork and cook until the bottoms of your pork is nice and crispy. Serve immediately on its own or on a tortilla topped with cilantro and salsa.

BLACK BEAN CHILL 4 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 pound boneless sirloin pork roast, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 2 15 1/2-oz cans black beans, drained
- 1 cup onion, chopped
- 1 cup yellow bell pepper, chopped
- 1 cup salsa, thick and chunky
- 1,15 1/2-oz can diced tomatoes, do not drain

- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- sour cream, (garnish)
- Cheddar cheese, shredded (garnish)



COOKING DIRECTIONS

Combine all ingredients except garnishes in 3 1/2-quart slow cooker. Cover and cook on low heat setting 7 to 8 hours. Top individual bowls with sour cream and cheddar cheese.



CUEAN-STYLE PORK BURGERS

6 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 8 ounces smoked Spanish chorizo, links with casings removed
- 1 pound ground pork
- 1/3 cup bread crumbs, dried
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1 small yellow onion, minced
- 1/3 cup green bell pepper, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 6 hamburger buns, split
- 6 tablespoons Thousand Island dressing
- 2 cups shoestring potatoes, (potato sticks)
- 6 green lettuce leaves

COOKING DIRECTIONS

Finely chop chorizo in a food processor or with a large knife. Gently mix together ground pork, chopped chorizo, breadcrumbs, egg, onion, green pepper, garlic and salt. Shape into 6 patties about 3/4-inch thick. Refrigerate for 10 to 15 minutes.

Prepare a grill for direct cooking over medium-high heat, about 450 degrees F.

Grill burgers, with the lid closed, for 5 minutes. Turn and finish cooking for 4 to 5 minutes more, until cooked through.

Toast buns on the grill, about 1 minute per side. Build burgers on buns with 1 1/2 tablespoons dressing, 1/3 cup shoestring potatoes and lettuce. Serve immediately.



COOKIE BACON STMORES

12 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 12 chocolate chip cookies
- 12 thick cut slices bacon, (hickory smoked, applewood smoked or maple)
- 12 large marshmallows
- 12 2-inch squares chocolate, good quality
- 12 skewers

DIRECTIONS

TO GRILL THE BACON: Heat a grill to medium-high heat. Thread bacon onto skewers in an S-shape. Place skewers directly on grill and cook 8 to 12 minutes, rotating as needed to ensure even cooking. Transfer to a plate, let cool and then remove bacon from skewers. Set aside.

MEANWHILE, ROAST THE MARSHMALLOWS:

Roast marshmallows directly over the grill using skewers or roasting sticks until cooked to your preference.

ASSEMBLE S'MORES: Flip one cookie over so it's upside down. Place a square of chocolate on top of the upside down cookie, then top with grilled marshmallow, bacon and a right side-up second cookie.

Serve immediately.

FOOD SAFETY

- Keep food and cooking appliances/utensils out of livestock barns.
- The safe internal pork cooking temperature for fresh cuts is 145° F.
- Ground pork should always be cooked to 160° F.
- Store food in watertight containers to prevent contact with melting ice water.
- A full cooler will maintain cold temperatures longer than one partially filled. Pack any remaining space with ice.
- Reserve one cooler just for beverages (which will be opened frequently), so that your food coolers will stay cold longer. Limit the times the food cooler is opened, and open and close the lid quickly.
- An appliance thermometer takes the guesswork out of knowing your food is safe to eat. So put one in your cooler, and make sure it reads 40° F or below.
- When the temperature outside is above 90° F, put perishable food back in the cooler within 1 hour after eating.

What is your favorite stock show memory?: Carter won the Eastern Regional Sweepstakes in 2014 and 2015, along with Champion Bred and Owned Duroc Gilt.

Best place you've ever eaten while at a show?: Anchor Bar in Buffalo, New York. Best chicken wings you will ever have.

Funniest/craziest/strangest thing that's ever happened to you at a show?: : In 2013, we had just arrived in Louis-ville for the National Junior Summer Spectacular and got into our hotel rooms. Avery, who was 4 at the time, opened the door to our hotel room and got her finger stuck in the inside jam of the door. The door slammed shut so hard it took her finger off just above the top knuckle. Luckily, we were at the hotel with friends and family, so they watched our son so we could take off to the emergency room. We didn't know where we were going so we put in "emergency room" on our GPS. Ironically, our GPS took us to a Hand Care Emergency Center. She had emergency surgery that day. This was Avery's first year showing pigs and she didn't want to miss it, so she showed the next day. I know one thing, she is a heck of a lot tougher than me.

What is the most valuable lesson you hope your children learn by showing livestock?: My hope is that my children understand the value of responsibility and hard work. These are values I hope stick with them through life.

What do you enjoy the most about watching your children show?: The amount of work my kids put into it is incredible to me for their age. They are in the farrowing barn when pigs are born: drying them off, helping me vaccinate,

ear notch, clip teeth, cleaning pens, filling feeders. They set goals for themselves before the show season starts, and we evaluate them at the end of the year. The experience and knowledge my kids have gained from the National Junior Swine Association shows has been tremendous. It is truly one of the most unique organizations for kids in this country. It is neat to see how Carter's knowledge and skills are passed on to his sisters and cousins.

What do you do to prepare at home before you head to a show?: The preparation starts months in advance. We wash, walk, evaluate feed, evaluate the pigs, study pig knowledge, etc. All this leads up to the actual departure. We have a checklist we go through and make sure everything is packed. Amanda checks everything over before we leave because the kids and I usually forget to pack something.

What advice do you have for other show dads?: This is supposed to be fun. It is ultimately about the kids growing up to be great, responsible, hardworking, kind, caring individuals. We need to remember this. We need to enjoy the memories and people you meet because before you know it, our kids will be done showing, and the memories and friendships will be all we have.

Anything you would like to add?: My family wouldn't be where we are today without the foundation my mom and dad have provided for us. They have been in the showpig business for 54 years, and their example and dedication to families and kids is why we do this.


