



2016 Saddle and Sirloin Club inductee



Dr. Maynard G. Hogberg is professor and chair emeritus of the Department of Animal Science at Iowa State University. A native of southwest Iowa, he received his B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. from Iowa State University. In 1976, he joined the faculty in animal husbandry at Michigan State University with a teaching, research and extension appointment in swine nutrition and management. Dr. Hogberg was appointed chair of Michigan State's Department of Animal Science in 1984. He led an effort that created a vision to strengthen animal agriculture in the state of Michigan, which resulted in substantial state funding for modernization of facilities and programmatic support of new faculty positions and operating funds. After serving on the faculty at Michigan State for 27 years, he was named chair of the Department of Animal Science at Iowa State University in 2003.

Dr. Maynard Hogberg is recognized

internationally as a leading authority on swine management. For three decades, he was the nation's premier university leader of animal science programs and one of the most respected leaders for animal agriculture in the nation. He is widely recognized as one of the most gifted and visionary department leaders in the history of Michigan State and Iowa State, partly due to his commitment to advancing the teaching, research and extension missions of the universities and agricultural colleges, but also due to his vast knowledge on the subject matter.

Providing monumental leadership in all aspects of his career, Hogberg encouraged a high level of engagement between academia and external stakeholders. His ability to build relationships and talk knowledgeably with great insight on the priorities of animal science and addressing the needs of the state and agriculture was remarkable and critical in helping fulfill the land-grant mission for both Iowa and Michigan. Hiring outstanding faculty and staff and mentoring them to excel has been his legacy. He succeeded in creating a supportive and positive academic environment and built his departments into fundraising powerhouses, enabling them to recruit talented faculty, staff and students through increased programmatic faculty and student support.

Dr. Hogberg and his colleagues developed a vision for animal agriculture in lowa that has become the guiding document for animal agriculture. He served as president of the American Society of Animal Science and the Federation of Animal Science Societies as well as being an active leader in many other scientific organizations throughout his career. Dr. Hogberg has been recognized for numerous awards and honors, including Distinguished Service Awards from the Pedigreed Livestock Council, the National Pork Board and the National Swine Improvement Federation. His service to numerous industry associations, state, regional and national professional societies, leadership to two universities and the many contributions to the communities where he and his family have lived make him exceptionally qualified for induction into the 2016 Saddle and Sirloin Portrait Gallery.

This past November, Dr. Maynard Hogberg's portrait was hung in the gallery of the Saddle and Sirloin Club in Louisville, Kentucky. Leaders throughout the livestock industry attended this event to recognize the contributions this gentleman made to our industry.

As a board member of the American Yorkshire Club (AYC), Maynard provided leadership in the formation of the National Swine Registry (NSR). The AYC recognized the skills Maynard exhibited and elected him to serve on the NSR Executive Committee. During this time period, the swine industry was experiencing some of the bleakest economic times in history; however, Maynard stood out as a leader and served as Chairman of the NSR **Executive Committee. As the** Chairman, Maynard, was directly responsible for the development and implementation of the Long Range Strategic Plan that serves as the operating format for the NSR today.

We say thank you for the contributions to our industry by Dr. Hogberg and recognize him as the newest member of the prestigious Saddle and Sirloin Club.

NJSA updates

Change is inevitable, but fortunately the National Junior Swine Association (NJSA) has a Youth Advisory Board consisting of eight individuals who excel in their careers and are passionate about the success of the NJSA. The Youth Advisory Board and NJSA staff work together to make tough decisions, while making sure we are providing growth opportunities for our junior members and their families. With the new year beginning, I think it's important I highlight several changes the Youth Advisory Board, National Swine Registry (NSR) Executive Board and NJSA staff have worked together to make. These changes will be taking effect at NJSA shows and events this year. However, before I dive into that, I would like to describe the process the NJSA staff goes through to have these rules put into place.

The NJSA staff, along with the Youth Advisory Board Chairman, work to create an agenda that consists of issues, concerns and new ideas to be presented to the Youth Advisory Board. After working through the agenda, the Youth Advisory Board is charged with making recommendations to be presented to the NSR Executive Board. For a half day, the Youth Advisory Board and the NSR Executive Board meet to discuss these recommendations. This discussion allows the Youth Advisory Board to explain their reasoning for proposed recommendations, while allowing the NSR Executive Board to ask questions to ensure they are clear on what the changes would mean for the NJSA. After the information is presented, the NSR Executive Board votes on the recommendations to be put in place. Although not every recommendation is passed, the NJSA staff feels confident in the decisions the NSR Executive Board makes.

A big change for this year is the wording allowed on pedigrees for junior members who participate in the bred-and-owned division. The rule now states only one junior member can be listed on the bred-and-owned pedigrees, and they must be listed as both the breeder and the owner. No other family members or farm names can be listed on the pedigree in order to qualify. Although the decision to adjust the pedigree requirements for bred-and-owned animals wasn't an easy one, we feel very confident we made the right decision.

For the past few years, this group has been working on several ideas to increase membership and involvement at the NJSA Western Regional. Although this has taken some time to get set in stone, the NJSA is happy to announce we have a date and location set for the 2017 NJSA Western Regional. The show will take place in Paso Robles, California, at the Paso Robles Event Center on Nov. 30-Dec. 3, 2017. We are looking for your support and generosity to make this event great.

I think too often people assume the NSR staff makes all final decisions, when in reality we work very closely with the Youth Advisory Board and NSR Executive Board to ensure we are creating the best version of the NJSA we can. Although people don't always agree with the decisions that are made, I think we can all agree we believe in what the NJSA does for our junior members.

Q: Why should I become a member of the NSR? A: Membership has its incentives.

NSR Active Senior Membership is provided per breed (Yorkshire, Duroc, Hampshire, and Landrace) and offers the following benefits for individuals 22 years of age and older:

- Record litters at member rates (1/2 non-member rates – see TABLE 1)
- Includes a 1 year Seedstock EDGE subscription per membership (\$25 value)
- · Allows breeders to exhibit at NSR open shows at member rates
- Provides voting rights to elect breed board members

NJSA Junior Membership is offered to anyone 21 years of age and under and provides the following benefits:

- Record litters at member rates (1/2 non-member rates - see TABLE 1)
- Make all transfers at a \$5 rate (see TABLE 1)
- Eligible for NJSA Scholarships
- Eligible to participate in NJSA shows and youth leadership activities

NSR Active Senior Membership is a one-time, \$10 fee for Lifetime Membership, plus a \$75 maintenance fee for the first year per breed (\$85 in year 1) and then \$75 for annual dues per breed each following year of Active Senior Membership status.

NJSA Junior Membership is free to all individuals under the age of 21.

What are non-member exhibitor fees and junior participation fees?

NSR open shows give exhibitors the opportunity to show their animals and sell the animal in our sales, if selected or consigned. NJSA shows give junior members the opportunity to exhibit their animals at the junior level. Collectively, we host 19 shows and events every year across the U.S. Any individual who is 22 or older, is not an Active Senior Member of the NSR in at least one breed and wishes to show an animal in an NSR open show will be required to pay a \$75 annual, non-member exhibitor fee prior to the show. This fee is charged annually during a calendar year. Non-member exhibitor fees expire Dec. 31, of each year.

Any individual who is 21 or younger is required to pay a \$15 junior participation fee for each NJSA show and each NSR open show entered. NSR, together with the NJSA, takes pride in the quality of the events, venues, judges and ring help of each show. As a result, these fees are used to fund the cost of the NSR shows and supplement NJSA premiums paid to our junior members.

Ross was preceded in death by his parents, parents-in-law, and one nephew.



Huinker brothers John and Wayne have the purebred swine business flowing through their blood. Their grandfather started raising Poland China hogs, in 1920, and their father switched to Durocs, in 1960. Today, the third-generation seedstock producers are carrying on the family tradition.

brothers have applied the lessons they learned from a young age on the Huinker family farm in their individual operations. The Huinker patriarch, Dennis, was a man of character, faith and optimism, as well as a sound stockman. He passed all of those qualities onto John and Wayne who are making their own marks in the purebred swine industry.

John has continued raising Durocs on the Huinker home farm, in Decorah, Iowa. He and his wife, Ruth, raise approximately 150 sows and sell semen on 25 boars. Like many producers of his time, John's operation initially focused on raising breeding stock to produce terminal market hogs for commercial producers. As the industry changed, share of power washing and handles the bookwork. Wayne and Roxanne were honored, in 2016, at the Iowa Pork Congress with the Iowa Master Seedstock Producer Award for their dedication to the purebred swine industry. Ruth, John's wife of 38 years, takes care of daily feeding, processing pigs and shipping semen, as well as the bookwork at Huinker Durocs.

The adage, "Behind every great man is a great woman," is not only true in the Huinker's personal lives, but also in their sow herd. The brothers agree the sow herd can make or break an operation.

"I was once told, 'Your sow herd owes you a living, you don't owe them a living.' Your sow herd is your factory for success. We put about a 70 percent emphasis on the dam Good things have happened for both John and Wayne in terms of show ring success. Wayne recalls when his daughter, Julie, won the Iowa State Fair 4-H Show, in 1993, which happened to be her first year showing at the state fair. Another daughter, Lisa, had the Reserve Champion FFA Market Hog, in 2004, with a purebred Yorkshire sired by a Huinker boar. Long-time customer Jake Keppy drove the Champion FFA Market Hog, in 2012, also a purebred Yorkshire. Those two hogs are the only two purebred Yorkshires to ever make the Sale of Champions at the Iowa State Fair, to date.

John fondly remembers showing the Champion Duroc Gilt at the Iowa State Fair, when he was about 10 years old. The gilt went on to be sold

John and Ruth transitioned their operation to raising showpigs. They now sell pigs all over the country through online sales, private treaty deals and National Swine Registry (NSR) events. Bred gilt and semen sales have replaced the income from domestic commercial boar sales, yet international demand for Huinker Durocs genetics has grown in the last few years.

Four miles down the road, Wayne also raises purebred seedstock. He began a partnership with his uncle, Dave, in 1977, which at that

time consisted of Spot, Yorkshire and Landrace hogs. Eventually Wayne and his wife, Roxanne, ventured out on their own with the Yorkshires. Today, they run 150 sows and 10 boars. Their focus has also changed over time, and now they mainly sell showpigs and gilts to make showpigs.

Both brothers are quick to tell you they couldn't run their operations without their wives. Wayne's wife, Roxanne, processes all the baby pigs, does her of our replacements," John says.

John goes on to say selection of replacement gilts and boars starts at the ground with quality toes. He also takes a close look at hip and hind leg, which for him is critical to longevity and functionality. Overall, he wants a balanced hog with a few of the extras – big blade, more rib shape and added structure – thrown in.

"If you select for these combined traits from your most productive, high-performing, top-end sows, good things will happen," he says. for \$4,000 to Tam Lee Farms. In 1997, John was asked to judge the Illinois State Fair. He picked a boar known as Red Ace to be champion. A record sale followed the show, and Red Ace sold for \$40,000. Another of John's favorite show ring memories is when his son, Lee, showed the Champion Duroc and Champion Overall at the Iowa State Fair 4-H Show, in 1995.

As competitive as the show ring can be, John has learned, at the end of the day, the industry is really about the people.

"I am in a business of passionate,

hard-working people that love to compete, but when the competition is over the people are friends forever," John says.

Wayne agrees that the best part of the swine industry is the people.

"The people we have met and come into contact with because of pigs is a long list. Many have been friends for a long time," he says.

All of John and Wayne's children participated in 4-H, and they are looking forward to

watching the fifth generation step into the show ring. Although the brothers may spend a lot of time trying to make the next generation of hogs better, they also know it is important to invest in the next generation of livestock enthusiasts.

"My advice to other producers is to take the time to support and encourage the young people. They are the future of our industry," Wayne says.

Wayne sees the popularity of showpigs for youth projects only increasing. He recognizes trends will constantly change, and producers have to be willing to make adjustments to stay relevant. However, he is confident the demand for sound, quality breeding animals will always be there, no matter the current trend.

"I think there will always be a market for good-doing, sound hogs. That will never change. We will continue to make sound, functional, all-around type hogs," he says.

John agrees that quality livestock will never go out of style. In his opinion, the future is bright for anyone producing showpigs or breeding stock, including the Huinkers.

"Our operation will continue to produce

genetics for both the showpig industry and breeding stock needs," Huinker says. " One thing that will stay the same is our passion and ability to breed the best genetics for



There is a long line of trailers slowly making their way to a station where a veterinarian will check your Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) and either give you the stamp of approval or pull you aside to answer more questions. So what is the trick to always getting the thumbs-up? The *Seedstock EDGE* team paired up with staff veterinarian, Dr. Justin Roach, of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, to answer your questions.

very clear that CVIs are not only important to federal and state officials, but equally important to producers, livestock shows, veterinarians and livestock markets.

This form of documentation serves two main functions:

- 1. It proves that animals are healthy prior to being transported.
- 2. It provides individual animal identification.

Each show's health regulations are determined months prior to the livestock show taking place. The health regulation and CVI approval process is three-fold.



Show management writes the show's health requirements based on the host state's health regulations. If the show includes a sale, show management will draft rules to effectively meet any additional regulations pertaining to where pigs will most likely be sold.



Show staff will designate an official show veterinarian. During the event, the show vet will inspect each exhibitor's CVI; making sure that all requirements have been met and that all necessary information has been provided. The official show vet works closely with their host state vet's office to ensure all requirements are met. In the event of a show and sale, the official show vet will also reconsign the CVI of the animal being sold to its new owner. The show vet works to meet import requirements from various states before and during the sale. This ensures animals being transported home with their new buyers are accompanied with a valid CVI meeting all specific state import requirements.

An example of a CVI

Everyday thousands of head of livestock are transported from one state to the next. Each of these states differs in terms of livestock industries and levels of health risks. Therefore, to help prevent, control and monitor both management and regulatory diseases, it is critical to always have an updated and accurate CVI.

The layout of a CVI varies from state to state, but all CVIs include the same information.

How often do I get a new CVI?

JR: A CVI is valid for 30 days for the listed destination.

Upon exhibitors arriving to the event location, what will health inspectors evaluate on the CVI?

JR: Our livestock inspectors are going to be asking exhibitors for the original CVI, commonly referred to as a health certificate. They are going to be reviewing this document to make sure that it's valid, that it's been issued at the correct time, that there is an import permit for out-of-state animals, that each animal meets the requirements for pseudorabies and brucellosis testing and that each animal has official identification. Lastly, they will visually inspect the animals in the trailer to make certain they are all identified, appear healthy and that the number of animals doesn't exceed that which is listed on the CVI.

Why do some shows require that pigs are blood tested for pseudorabies and brucellosis while others do not?

JR: Each state has different livestock industries, different diseases present within the state and different levels of risk they're willing to accept for each disease program. In regards to Oklahoma, we have one of the largest commercial swine industries in the nation, as well as one of the largest show swine industries. It's important to

CVI Checklist

Preparing for the next show? Use the following checklist to ensure CVI requirements are met.

- 1. Have a pre-established Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR).
- 2. Review the published health regulations for the show to determine both state AND show-specific requirements.
- 3. Schedule an appointment with your veterinarian to inspect animals heading to the event and provide you with a CVI. Be sure appointment date meets the show's cutoff deadline to issue the CVI but also leaves adequate time to complete any required blood testing.
- 4. Present the show's health regulations to your veterinarian and review requirements well in advance of the event.
- 5. Have your veterinary check the specific-state import requirements.

Definitions

Vaccinations: Any immunization specifically required for animal import or show.

Blood Tests: Any serologic tests required to prove animals have not been exposed to a specific disease.

Statements: Any miscellaneous statement about the disease/health status of an animal that has not been captured within the standard criteria of the CVI.

Entry Permit: A number issued by a state certifying that all entry requirements have been met.

Identification (840 tags preferred): Every hog is required to have official identification. This identification includes: sex, ear tag and ear notch. Additionally, every animal that is being transported must be identified on the CVI.

- Review your CVI with your veterinarian to ensure all information is correct and completed before traveling to the show. NJSA and NSR shows typically require the following sections to be included on a CVI:
 - a. Exhibitor (Consignor) Information:
 - i. Name, phone number, addressii. Premises ID number
 - b. Destination Information:
 - i. Name and address of show and fairgrounds (as posted in health regulations)
 - c. Animal Identification:
 - i. Federally approved, permanently numbered ear tag
 - ii. Animal Ear Notch
 - iii. Animal sex and breed
 - d. Required Statements (example listed below):
 - i. Must include the following "Farm or origin of swine" statements
 - Has not had Pseudorabies or swine dysentery in the last 12 months
 - Has not had any clinical signs or diagnosis of TGE or PEDv in the last 60 days
 - Feeds no raw garbage and uses no PRV vaccine
 - Is not under quarantine for any disease condition
 - Has not had vesicular stomatitis diagnosed within 10 miles of farm or origin in the last 30 days
 - e. Blood Testing: Remember to clearly understand the following
 - i. What is required for Pseudorabies (PRV) testing?
 - ii. What is required for Brucellosis testing?
 - iii. If testing is required on individual pigs, do I need an official test chart of the results?
 - Vaccinations (examples listed below): i. Leptospirosis (6-way) including Bratislava

and Erysipelas vaccinations, Mycoplasma vaccinations, Circovirus vaccinations

both of these industries to maintain freedom from both pseudorabies and swine brucellosis. However, a common misconception is that a state's "free" status for these disease programs means that the state is completely free of that particular disease. In reality, these statuses only apply to the commercial sector of the swine industry, and not to any outdoor, transitional, show or feral swine. The prevalence of these diseases in feral swine populations is relatively high, and we have occasional disease incursions into our domestic outdoor swine. In 1986, there was an outbreak of pseudorabies in show swine and the entire show season was shut down throughout the state. We want to avoid those situations and the impacts these diseases can have on markets and trade. Therefore, Oklahoma requires that all non-commercial swine be tested for pseudorabies and brucellosis prior to entry regardless of the exporting state's status.

In regards to the state of Oklahoma, do I have to have an entry permit to enter from out-of-state? If so, what is this for?

JR: Yes. An entry or import permit provides further assurance that the entry requirements (disease testing, official identification [840 tags preferred], etc.) are being completed. This is necessary since Oklahoma has the disease testing requirements that many other states do not. Without it, many veterinarians would complete a CVI without proper testing.

What happens if I don't have the proper information when I get to the show?

JR: If the missing information is simply a show requirement, but not a state entry requirement the exhibitor will likely just be inconvenienced until the proper information can be provided and validated. That trailer would not be allowed entry to the fairgrounds until that information has been received. However, if the state's entry requirements are not met, the consequences would likely be exclusion from the fairgrounds for the entirety of the exhibition and potentially regulatory enforcement actions.

What advice would you give to an exhibitor to make sure the required health regulations are met for a particular show?

JR: I recommend visiting the show's website or speaking with the show manager to determine the show-specific requirements. You should then take those requirements to your veterinarian and work with him or her to make certain that not only the show's requirements are being met, but that also the state's import requirements are being met. Many times the state import requirements will cover the show requirements, but sometimes a show will have additional requirements, like certain vaccinations or statements on the CVI. Lastly, review the completed CVI before you start the trip hauling livestock.

What are the most common CVI mistakes that you see?

- CVIs without an entry permit number
- Swine without official identification (840 tags preferred)
 - » Identification not applied to the animals but listed on the CVI
 - » Identification applied to the animals but not listed on the CVI
- "Delivery" swine that arrive without any of the state entry/show requirements because the transporter is "just" hauling them and delivering them to/for someone else



The crowds were enormous for the entirety of our stay, and the acceptance of the weanlings and open show hogs was excellent, as usual.

Rick Whitman, of Texas, judged the Duroc show at this year's Fall Classic and did a great job! Rick is one of the premier Duroc breeders in the nation, and it was interesting to listen to him describe the hogs after he finished judging each class. He was assisted by his wife, Niki. Thanks, guys. Job well done!

I would also like to thank the young men and women from Oklahoma State University (OSU) and Iowa State University (ISU) that worked tirelessly all day penning hogs and running hurdles during an active boar show. Thank you all!

As usual, Col. Kevin Wendt was outstanding on the block. He's one of the elite auctioneers in our industry. Thanks, Colonel!

We started the Duroc portion of the sale, on Saturday morning, with the presentation of this year's Premier and Reserve Premier Duroc Sires. The Premier Sire at the 2016 Fall Classic was OAB4 Can't Stop 8-3, owned by Upperhand Genetics and Blane Olson. The Reserve Premier sire was NBRP He's The One 15-6, owned by Hi Point Genetics. That's not the first time these two great sires have been honored this year at our NSR events. Congratulations to these three firms for their continued success.

We started the Duroc sale with this year's Champion Duroc Boar. The winner of Class 4, on show day, this Jack Rodibaugh and Sons entry was a son of NBRP Class Act 15-8. This one was as problem free as any red boar shown all summer, yet extreme enough in areas to make progress. Big chested, ideal on his feet and legs, tall shouldered, muscular and square made; he was just a flat out good red boar. He topped the boar sale at \$17,000 and went to Stewart's Duroc Farm, Iowa, and Schenken Genetics, Texas. Great boar buy!

Isla Grande Farms, Ohio, were next with the Reserve Champion Duroc Boar. Rick's boar won an extremely deep Class 3, on Friday. This son of MJFF5 Kingdom Comes 8-4 was one of the more extreme boars at this year's event. Huge-legged, stout-skulled and really opened up when he came straight at you, this one was really intriguing. Three Oklahoma firms teamed up to buy this one. Vaughn Jackson, Austin Kindschi and Rick May are the new owners of this one at the sale's third top figure, of \$7,000.

Big Papa's Show Pigs, Kansas, brought their Class 5 winner to the ring next. A son of MAFF4 Lifetime 4-10, this guy was one of the biggest-chested, biggest-ribbed boars in the barn. He was stout, moderate and extremely square made. He sold to Kent Foster, of Oklahoma, for \$2,800. It will be fun to see what he can do with this one.

Meeker Durocs, Illinois, won Class 2 with an extremely sound, muscular son of RLR4 Man Up 15-2. The winner of the youngest class was Alison, Gabriel and Lane Hartman, from Oregon. Their young August son of ZACH3 Crown Royal 33-4 was a stout, sound hog with really good shape.

The Todd Hopkins boar that was second behind the champion, in Class 4, was another popular boar on sale day. One of the stoutest boars shown, this one was really powerful in his shoulder, chest and ribcage. Combine this with an immense rear leg that was nearly ideal on the move and you've got one of the more interesting boars who was offered, on Saturday. This son of TPSP5 Impressive 8-3 was the second top-selling boar at \$7,500 and will be available for everyone to sample at Upperhand Genetics, Indiana.

A couple of other boars of note were the Palmer Show Team and Knight Genetics entries. The Palmer boar was an extra-attractive, super-sound one who still had a lot of mass and dimension. He was sired by the 1PST5 Head Hunter 22-3 boar that the Palmer family sold at the 2015 NSR Fall Classic to Crossroads Genetics and Beyers Durocs. It's always refreshing to see someone have enough confidence in their genetics to plug them back into their own program. This guy went to a couple of the top breeders, in Texas. Weldon Walser and Harman Farms teamed up to take this one home. He will get a great chance there. The Knight boar was sired by OAB4 Can't Stop 8-3 and came out of the deep class the reserve champion was in. This one was big centered, really opened up and had a ton of product. He also went to Texas with Chuck Real, James Holt and Doege Farms joining forces to acquire him. He should really get a chance there.

Knight Genetics brought their Champion Duroc Gilt in the ring to lead off the female part of the sale. These young men have had a tremendous summer and ended it on a high note, at Duncan. The winner of Class 2, this daughter of OAB4 Can't Stop 8-3 was an excellent champion. Feminine, attractive and sound, while still having a big chest and ribcage made this one really popular. We all know him for the great job he does in these roles and it is always fun to watch him judge a show, and even more enjoyable to give him a hard time during the sale. On behalf of the National Swine Registry (NSR) and Hamp Board, I would like to thank Kevin for doing a great job sorting the show, and as always for the professional job of selling the breed.

The Champion Hampshire Boar, at the 2016 Fall Classic, was entry 160-1 exhibited by Brenna and Macy Mortensen, Michigan. The Mortensen boar was sired by JKG5 BOOT-ED OUT 14-1 and out of a OTTN3 WEST POINT 60-3 sow. This boar's advantages of being so fault free and basic got him up to the top. This hog wasn't one I would say is out there in any one area, but very safe and practical in so many ways. The boar's joints, feet and legs all worked in an effortless way, he was fluid in his movement and when you study him from the side he was an attractive hog with the look we have all been seeking. I call him square underneath and a hog that matches that width at his blade and pin set. He has the kind of muscle that can be used to make females or showpigs alike. Congratulations to Zach Eastmand and Don Quesenberry, Ohio, for their purchase of the champion.

Kyle and Laura Baade, Nebraska, exhibited the Reserve Champion Hampshire Boar, their son of BOLN4 MAN AMONGST BOYS 22-3 was out of a GMW4 SILENCER 9-4 dam. Kyle's boar was what I call a moderate, heavy boned boar with a huge 11.1 loin eye. From the side, this guy had a stout head and jaw line, big forearm and above his skeleton he was huge bladed, bold in his upper rib, with a wide pin set. He is really a neat kind of boar that could help out a lot of firms. Congrats to Jet Aerospace Genetics and B.J. and Sue Orgis, Texas, for their purchase and good luck with him.

George and Mike Watson, Indiana, were next in the ring, on sale day, with the Class 3 winner. This boar is a son of JSE5 CHANGE UP 132-4. CHANGE UP is the new herdsire that Mike purchased form Steve and Derek Earnhart, Indiana, last year, and is doing Watson a good job. The dam of Mike's boar is a KMRE3 HAYMAKER 11-5 sow. Paint brand 18-1 is a boar that had a lot of places I really liked, in terms of being a tall-shouldered, good-looking hog who didn't give up any structure or muscle in the process. Wendt says he can make some females, and coming from Watson that is true, but I would say this guy has a chance to make just about anything you want him to. Joe Lancaster, Oklahoma, will put him to work; watch and see what happens there. Earl Cain and Family, Iowa, was next with their Class 1 winner; BJKE5 GRUS FUGITIVE 2-1 x FSF3 CLYDESDALE 12-2 is how his pedigree reads. One of the younger hogs in the show, but also one of the more interesting boars on show day. The Cain boar was a neat hog that was moderate framed, square built with a cool look from the side. When you studied him up high he had a big, grooved top and was big hipped and square going away. This guy had plenty of width leaving, but handled it well; keeping his hock inside his body and still having some extra bone and foot size. Lean Value Sires, Ohio, are the new owners of the Cain boar. Be sure to check him out when making some breeding decisions.

Steve and Derek Earnhart, Indiana, were next, in the ring, with this year's high seller. The Earnhart boar was a JSE5 DREAM SQUASHER 37-1. DREAM SQUASHER is a herd boar that Steve and Derek kept last year and has really made an impact in a short time for them. The bottom side reads JSE2 OZ 54-5, making somewhat of a lined up pedigree with lots of JSE genetics represented. The Earnhart boar had quite a bit of talk coming into the sale. He has a really different pedigree for most and is a good hog too. This boar was a notch bigger framed with the extension up front we have all been talking about; he was long hipped and had a flexible hind leg. I really like this guy from the side; good looking but still stout in his features with plenty of muscle. Triple B and Jerry McLemore, both of Oklahoma, went together to get him bought, congrats to all.

It seems wherever we have been this summer Hampshire gilts have had a great deal of quality, and with that quality comes really solid prices on sale day, the Fall Classic followed suit with that trend. Anytime we can have a gilt sale and average over \$2,500, I sure call it a success. Congrats to everyone who brought quality gilts to Duncan and keep up the good work.

We had a good gilt to lead off the sale with on Saturday. Entry 182-1, the class winner of Class 4, was our champion this year driven by Platt Showpigs, Indiana. This daughter of KORB4 ALL EYES 23-7, was out of a female that the Caldwell family, Illinois, drove to championship honors, at the 2014 World Pork Expo. The Platt gilt sure got a lot of attention when she hit the ring and really represented what a modern show gilt looks like. Really a good-looking, tallshouldred gilt who's angles laid in her skeleton correctly. Plus, this gilt had the extras in terms of bone and stoutness that it takes to be a champion nowadays, and still looked like a lady up front. Congrats to Platt on bringing one of this quality, and good luck to Shaffers Gold Rush, Indiana, on adding this breeding piece into their programs.

The Reserve Champion Hampshire Gilt this year is another one that sure represented what a Hampshire female needs to look like. Cody and Samantha Smith, Indiana, drove their BOLN4 MAN AMONGST BOYS gilt to reserve honors. If you have paid attention to their program, they have been using a pair of GMW1 LOOK AT ME 4-1 sows that have been doing a great job for them. Those sows have become famous for being the pair of show gilts the Smith and Malcolm Families drove at the Summer Spectacular a few years back now. I know many, like myself, that sure like to see those sows in the pedigrees of what Cody and Samantha bring out. The Duncan gilt sure did a lot of things right; wide made, heavy boned and so functional on her feet and legs. She really looked like a female about her head and neck and she still covered the bases of body and rib with a good underline. This one can sure make an impact in lots of herds.

Tim and Luanne Arkfeld, Nebraska, won Class 2 with a FNKA3 WILD TURKEY 2-2 x FSF3 CLYDSDALE 12-2 gilt. This gilt would be a full sib to the very popular Hamp gilt he exhibited at the 2016 World Pork Expo. What can I say about the Arkfeld gilts? I seem to always be a fan of the females they bring out and that is the case with this one too. She was one of the most unique Hamp gilts to be sold this year, in my opinion. So neat up through her front end, she was still moderate framed and square built. She had plenty of power up high, a bold rib cage and a very useful hind leg. Congrats to Arkfeld, and good luck to Jet Aerospace Gentics, Texas, with their purchase.

Lorelei Prichard, Georgia, drove the Class 1 winner. The Prichard family brought a pair of younger gilts to Duncan





This year's Champion Yorkshire Boar was the entry from Mark & Sandy Ottenwalter, of Colusa, Calif.; this herd sire won the oldest class of the day. He is sired by TBRO4 Yet Again 7-2. If you are interested in producing Yorkshires that will compete in the market hog shows than this guy should be at the top of your list. He is heavy structured, square underneath and has a great look from the side. He is square and true from hock to ground and sound on both ends of his skeleton, and does all of this in a moderate package. He will go to work for Brent Bolen (High Point Genetics), of Chrisman, Ill., for the price of \$37,000.

The Reserve Champion Yorkshire Boar was the entry from Oklahoma State University (OSU) of Stillwater, Okla.. If you are in need of a boar that will make them tall fronted and put a huge square chest in the next generation look at this guy. Plus he is very correct and balanced. He is big and bold in his rib, big skulled and from behind he has plenty of shape. This sound-footed and good-legged boar will head to Pleasantville, Ohio with Thompson Brothers Genetics. They paid \$12,000 to own this son of OSU4 Under Control 21-4.

Ricker Yorkshires, Fort Jennings, Ohio, was next with an entry that won Class 2 and son of RIY5 Spit Fire 59-5. If you like your Yorkshires wide and square at the top of their blades, big backed, square from behind and heavy structured; than this guy is one that you need to use. Look for him at Upperhand Genetics of Huntington, Ind.; they paid \$3,000 to load him on their trailer.

Next in the sale ring was Hahn Genetics of Wakarusa, Ind.. This boar placed second in Class 3. He is bold and massive in his rib shape, and wide and square in the lower third of his skeleton. After all the pen cards had been taped up and shavings bedded in the pens, it was time for the hogs and crowds of spectators and buyers to begin arriving. The crowd that showed up Friday afternoon to watch the crossbred show was HUGE. George Cooper and Ashley Flashpoler, Okla., had their hands full judging this large and deep set of boars. Thank you both for your time and positive comments about the entries, GREAT JOB. No records were broken at the 2016 Fall Classic, but we had a healthy sale, for all the exhibitors, and sold a large number of hogs that will be heard from in the future, and impact their breeds in a positive way.

Congratulations to Brinning Farms of Keota, Iowa for exhibiting the 2016 Fall Classic Champion Crossbred Boar. This off-belted son of Wedding Crasher was one that you needed to take a second look at. This guy is stout headed, huge legged and wide as he goes away from you. He has a huge, square back in him, plus he's tall fronted and looks like a show hog. This one has a lot of value and is correct enough that he won't get you into a lot of trouble, but just freaky enough that he will move you off center, if that's your goal. He sold to Ted Laird & Family (Premium Blend Genetics) for \$90,000.

I know that when Clardy Farms, of Haworth, Okla., loaded their Berkshire boar on the trailer, to head to the Fall Classic, they had not planned on exhibiting him in the crossbred show, but he was just a few days too old to show in the Berkshire show. Regardless of what ring he showed in, this boar is intriguing! It always amazes me that we can make them so extreme in terms of width, power and muscle, and still keep them square and correct enough in their skeleton, to make a change in the next generation. He is square and correct in his toe size and placement, and he is big legged and square underneath. This tall-fronted, level-made boar has a HUGE shape to his top and hip. If you are a Berkshire enthusiast, look up this son of King Kong 28-4; there was a lot of chatter about him in the barn. Call Crossroads Genetics of Clayton, Ind.; they paid \$60,000 to take him home. Congratulations, Clardy Farms on your reserve champion!

There were so many good boars at this year's show; from here on out I'm just going to give you the highlights. Get R Done Showpigs, of Yuma, Ariz., brought a pair of littermates sired by Pinnacle that had a ton of center and a soft, easy feeding look. Paint brand 92-13 is big and square as you study his loin, and has plenty of hip. If you need a stress negative version look at paint brand 92-14. This pair of boars look like they should sire a barn full of barrows that should be in the mix when you go to shows. HF Genetics loaded lot 92-13 on their trailer for the price of \$17,500, and Triple B Sires got 92-14 for \$10,000.

A.J. Lewis, of Center Point, Iowa, drove a belted son of Bad Donkey to the ring next and won the fourth class. He is taller shouldered, square built and has a great look from the side. If you are looking for a boar that will make hogs better and leave you some keeper gilts to build around give Purple Power Boar Stud a call; they paid \$21,000 to take this one to Indiana.

Cody Birt, of Prescott, Iowa, had a Visionary son that caused a buzz in the barns this year as well. If you need a boar that's more elevated up front and extended ahead of his blade and still really correct in terms of skeletal design, but without giving up muscle and look, than this guy will work for you. Top Cut Genetics paid \$16,000 for this winning entry from Class 1.

WD Swine Farm, of Calif., drove a popular Pick 6 son out of a Callin' Dibs littermate sister. His pedigree alone should have caught your attention. This guy is great on the profile, has a big top and tons of hip. Plus, his feet and toes all point in the same direction. He has a chance to make the next generation better. Jessie Heimer took him home for the price of \$20,000.

Daulton Family Show Pigs, Springfield, Ohio, had a popular Man Crush son that placed down the line in Class 7. If you need one that's extended up front, tall shouldered, athletic and still has muscle and shape, then look this guy up. He sold to Apex Sires for \$28,000.

There were lots of great crossbreds at this event, check out our website for a complete list of results and find the pieces you need to move your program forward.

Col. Ron Kreis, it is always a pleasure to work with you. THANK YOU for the professional work you do. I need to give a huge THANK YOU to the crew from Iowa for helping in the ring. With the class sizes we had this year we could not have done it without you. Thanks again to the Iowa State University (ISU) and Oklahoma State University (OSU) Swine Interest Groups that helped in the ring as well.

The Fall Classic is always a truly amazing event to witness; no matter what is going on in the rest of the country it always generates excitement for breeders and exhibitors that attend. I hope you have a great Holiday Season and we will see you in Georgia next year!



Trostel's Greenbriar Restaurant in Johnston, Iowa, has the best prime rib you've ever tasted!

Funniest/craziest/strangest thing that's ever happened to you at a show: Getting the front end of my truck smashed and partially torn away as we were unloading at Louisville three years ago.

What is the most valuable lesson you hope your kids learn by showing livestock?: We hope to use the NJSA show platform to help our kids build character that will stay with them for a lifetime. Learning the value of competition, building relationships and having a strong work ethic are at the top of the list we hope they'll take away from these experiences.

What do you do to prepare at home before you head to a show?: We try to walk every day. We work on skin and hair each day, as well. I always tell my kids that showmanship is often won at home in the barn during those early mornings before school or late nights after the sun goes down in the summer. The harder you work, the more success you're going to have. I believe it's important to drive your pigs like they're going to be shown, not just aimlessly walking them a few minutes each day. What do you enjoy the most about watching your kids show?: Of course I enjoy when they succeed. But, watching them improve their show skills and grow in knowledge and confidence is the most rewarding part. Like any competition, the more you practice the better you'll be. I tell my kids practice doesn't make perfect – perfect practice makes perfect!

Is there a piece of advice you always give your kids before they go in the ring?: Anticipate what the judge wants to see and where he's going to be. Keep your eye on the judge, and keep your pig's head up, but not too high. Have fun!

What advice do you have for other show dads?: It gets better, trust me! When your children start showing at 3-4 years old, you sometimes wonder if they'll ever be able to compete with the older kids. Don't get frustrated when they can't get their pig out of the corner. (Easier said than done, I know) Take lots of pictures and slow down to enjoy every moment together as a family. Don't let the pig show get in the way of building stronger relationships with your kids and spouse. Enjoy the hotel swimming pool and stuffed animals that make it into the truck before you pull out of the driveway. It'll all be gone way too soon.




